

Roseburg Legion Juniors Beat Myrtle Creek 6-5

ANDREWS VICTOR IN PITCHING DUEL

Batfests in Opening Inning Followed by Tight Game Here Sunday.

In a brilliant pitchers' battle between Andrews of Yoncalla and Elliott of Myrtle Creek, the Roseburg Legion Juniors won from the Myrtle Creek Juniors 6 to 5 in an exciting baseball game at Finlay field Sunday afternoon.

After Elliott relieved Runk for Myrtle Creek in the second inning, the game settled down to a pitching duel, with Andrews striking out 13 Myrtle Creek batters to nine innings, while yielding seven hits and issuing three passes. Elliott pitched 10 in seven innings, was rapped for four hits, and gave one walk.

Each team scored three runs in the opening inning. Weaver, first man up for Myrtle Creek, drew a walk and was advanced by singles by Metzger and Anlauf. McLain's double scored three runs, leaving McLain on second.

Crouch drew a walk as Roseburg's first batter, was sacrificed to second by Morgan and scored when Anlauf failed to handle Roberts' hard drive down the third base line. Ball was safe on a fielder's choice, Roberts scoring on the play, and scored when Neal's smashing grounder to short bounced off Weitzel's glove into the out-field.

After the first inning the game settled down to a grueling mound battle, Runk being replaced by Elliott, following Andrews' smashing four-base drive into left field.

In the last of the fourth inning, E. McLain dropped Sporer's short fly into left field, Sporer taking second base and scoring when Andrews lashed out a double.

An error by Sporer at shortstop, fast base running by Curly McLain, and a passed ball save Myrtle Creek a tally in the fifth. Sporer booted McLain's grounder, and the veteran catcher, proceeded to puffer second and third, scoring when Andrews threw wide to third in an attempt to catch him off the bag.

In the last half of the inning Neal lifted a hard drive over left field to complete the circuit.

Neither team was able to threaten until the first of the ninth when Runk drew a walk, and scored on Anlauf's sharp single. With two down and a runner on second, Curly McLain drove a fly deep into right field, but Roberts made a beautiful running catch to shut off the score and end the game.

Incidentally, Roberts' work in right field in Sunday's game, virtually assures him of a spot as catcher of that garden for this season, the coaches report. Roberts was "discovered" by Toner and brought from Yoncalla the week before for a tryout as catcher. Yesterday he was put out in right field where he demonstrated plenty of ability as a fly chaser. He is a good hitter, and is expected to find a regular berth in the pasture and will be available as a substitute catcher.

(By the Associated Press.) The once exclusive Oakland A's had the company of the Seattle Indians at the top of the Pacific coast league today after taking the worst shelling the circuit has seen this season.

Only one game of an eight game series was salvaged by the A's as the Seattle tribe swept the Sunday double header 5-1, 16-1. It was the second series the Oaks have lost this season.

Third Triumph In Speed Classic Puts \$30,000 In Meyer's Pockets

INDIANAPOLIS, June 1.—(AP)—For the third time in eight years Louis Meyer of Huntington Park, Calif., will step to the front tonight when his name is called and receive the \$20,000 first prize check for having won the 500-mile Memorial day automobile race at the Indianapolis motor speedway.

Prizes for the first ten finishers and the consolation awards for all starters in the race will be presented to the drivers at the annual speedway dinner tonight.

Meyer raced to victory here Saturday in the record breaking time of 109.665 miles an hour. The previous record for the long grid was 106.240 set by Kelly Petillo, of Huntington Park, Calif., last year.

Trailing him to the finish line were Ted Horn of Los Angeles, second; Doc MacKenzie of Eddington, Pa., third; Mauri Rose of Dayton, O., fourth; Chet Miller of Detroit, fifth; Ray Piley of Fullerton, Calif., sixth; Wilbur Shaw of Indianapolis, seventh; George Harpinger of Houston, Tex., eighth; Zeke Meyer of Germantown, Pa., ninth, and George Connor of Los Angeles, tenth.

Meyer won the race in 1928 and repeated in 1932. He is the only man ever to win three times.

Meyer said yesterday he will continue around the race circuit in an effort to win the national driving championship. He said he will engage in three match races with Babe Starn at Boby, Ind., next Sunday, and then will compete in the 100 mile race at Goshen, N. Y., on June 13 and the 100 mile race at Lanesboro, Pa., June 14.

"When ever there is racing you will find me," he said.

ed for forgery in an alleged attempt to conceal violation of the law. He won his freedom on a writ of habeas corpus.

The law fixed the minimum wage for women laundry workers at \$12.10 a week.

It was enacted and signed by Governor Herbert Lehman in 1933.

A similar law for the District of Columbia was held unconstitutional by the supreme court 12 years ago. New York attorneys said, however, their statute took into account the value of services rendered while the district law dealt only with the cost of living in determining the minimum wage.

Private Right Violated

The majority opinion today held that the law violated the "due process" clause of the constitution in that it deprived persons of the right to make contracts. This was similar to the grounds given in the action 12 years ago.

In the NRA and Gutty coal cases, the court also had overruled efforts of the federal government to provide for minimum wages.

The notice is not to be accepted as identification for delivery of the registered letter," the department warned, "and should be so worded."

Other Means Available

For veterans who miss the postman when he rings at their homes, the packages will be made available at special windows in the post office.

The windows will be manned by specially trained clerks, with officers of local veterans' organizations assisting them to identify veterans.

To meet inquiries of men who do not get their hands on the first day of delivery, postmasters will be kept informed on how many bond packages they may expect and what part of them are being delivered on June 15.

The present indications are that all the registered letters will not be presented to the postoffice department for mailing by June 15," the department said.

WEEK-END TRAFFIC DEATHS TOTAL 118

(By the Associated Press.) The Memorial day week-end death toll from motor car accidents stood at 118 lives today—152 short of the national safety council's estimate that 270 persons would die in traffic fatalities during that period.

Six died near Richmond, Va., when an automobile crashed into a lumber truck. That was the heaviest loss reported in a single accident.

Scores were injured and in many cases were reported in critical condition.

A passenger train struck a motor car near Youngstown, O., killing three.

New York, where the double holiday marked the launching of a state safety campaign, led the list of states reporting with 13 known dead. However, the national safety council said rural areas contributed the largest number of traffic fatalities, with cities reducing deaths by 13 per cent.

The death toll reported to the Associated Press showed Ohio was second with 12 deaths during the week-end. Pennsylvania and Virginia had 8 each, California and Indiana 7 each.

Trojans Triumph In Track Events

Archie Williams and Phil Levy Apparently Earn Trips to Olympiad.

BERKELEY, Calif., June 1.—(AP)—Rubber-legged Archie Williams, University of California's speedy negro quartermiler, and Phil Levy, Stanford discus thrower, appear almost certain of berths on the American Olympic games squad following brilliant performances in Saturday's Pacific coast conference meet here.

Running with the same powerful stride which has carried him over the 440 yards in increasingly faster times this season, Williams won his favorite event in 46.8 seconds. He finished easily, in a few paces ahead of Al Fitch, of University of Southern California.

Williams placed second to Fay Draper, U. S. C., in the 220-yard dash and ran a fast final lap in the mile relay.

Levy, who has tossed the Greek disc past the 160-foot line frequently this season, topped his collegiate competition with a heave of 170 feet 10 7/8 inches, just 1 foot 1 1/8 inch short of the world record held by Harold Anderson of Sweden.

University of Southern California's powerful track and field squad collected 53 1/2 points for the team championship, Stanford placed second with 41; California, 39; Oregon, 31; Washington State, 11; Washington, 7 1/2; Idaho, 6; University of California at Los Angeles, 2; Oregon State, 2; and Montana, 0.

Ten conference records were smashed and one tied at the meet held for the first time since 1927.

The first three point winners in each event are eligible for competition in semi-final Olympic games trials at Los Angeles June 26 and 27.

Ackerson put Oregon State in the scoring column by tying with Janek of Oregon for third place in the high jump, going six feet two.

Other University of Oregon scorers:

Janek, four-way tie for third in pole vault; Hollund, fourth in discus; Lloyd, fourth in broad jump; Foskett, fourth in shotput; Miller, fourth in half mile; McQuarley, third in two-mile; Schmitt, second in the mile.

The only objects on the floor were a police electric lantern and a first aid kit.

Exhausted from the struggle, Zioncheck finally fell back against the seat.

The police car, with a motorcycle officer clearing the way, sped down Constitution avenue past the capitol and on to the hospital.

Without resistance, the congressman was led into the institution.

Bride Is Missing

Officials decided on the arrest while Zioncheck was driving around the city looking for his missing bride.

Zioncheck's ramblings started early in the day.

He left a brief case containing empty beer bottles and a can of moth balls at the executive offices, saying these were "for the president."

Police on guard there talked with him briefly and he left, driving his automobile to the courthouse midway to the capitol.

Quiet prevailed at the Zioncheck apartment after a weekend of encounters with the police.

The bride of 30 days was still away, however, with no one making public her exact whereabouts. Lucius C. Q. Lamar, Zioncheck's attorney, said she was staying with friends.

Mrs. Benjamin S. Young—who sublet the apartment to Zioncheck last December only to return 10 days ago and charge her furniture had been damaged—was confined in a hospital.

Declaring she was forcibly evicted from the apartment which she sought to occupy with the Zionchecks, Mrs. Young charged the congressman and his bride were responsible.

CLEVELAND CROWDS YANKEES AND SOX

Tribe Spurts to 3rd Place During Week; Giants Begin to Crack.

Those Indians from Cleveland are on the warpath.

Tomahawks, swinging, they're hot on the trail of the American league's leading and most highly priced scamps—the New York Yankees and Boston's million dollar Red Sox.

Pulling up from fifth to third place last week, the Tribe camped today only half a game back of the Sox, after stretching its winning streak to five straight with a 7-5 victory over the Chicago White Sox yesterday.

The Indians' surprising showing in the last several days, particularly in a generally better performance record by the Cleveland pitchers, was climaxed yesterday by a whole landslide of surprises all down the line in both leagues.

For instance, in the American, the hapless St. Louis Browns upset the Detroit Tigers 11-10 for the third straight time, and the Yankees, with Joe Di Maggio again in the hero's role at bat, made it three out of four in a week over the supposedly mighty Red Sox with a 5-4 triumph. Rounding out the day for the league, Appleton, in a six-inning relief trick, out-pitched three members of Connie Mack's up-and-down Athletics hurling staff for 6-4 win by Washington.

Giants "Cracking"

The unexpected was even more marked in the National league. Brooklyn handed Bill Terry's Giants, who seem to be cracking a new straight at the Dodgers' hands; the Boston Bees, after taking four losses on the chin from the Phillies, turned on the heat and came through with a 6-5 win in 11 innings; Dizzy Dean was belted for 19 hits by the Cincinnati Reds, but the Cardinals slugged just as hard and came through 8-7 in a 12-frame thriller, and the Cubs, on the strength of Ethan Allen's timely single in the tenth to score the winning run, outlasted the Pittsburgh Pirates 8-7.

However, some of the boys who've been around longer shared the glory. For instance, Rogers Hornsby, the Browns manager, came up as a pinch-hitter in the ninth and drove over the winning run against the Tigers in his first playing appearance of the year.
