BOOK "CADDIE WOODLAWN"
PLACED IN ROSEBURG
LIBRARY YESTERDAY

The John Newbery medal winner for 1935, "Caddie Woodlawn," by Carol Ryrie Brink, niece of Wanda Armour, of Roseburg, and granddaughter of Mrs. Caroline A. Watkins, formerly of Roseburg, and now residing at Vancouver, Wash., was placed on the Frank Clemens memorial shelf of children's books at the Roseburg Public library yesterday as a gift from Wanda Armour. She is placing a copy in every library in this city.

The Newbery medal is the highest award offered for juvenile works and Carol Ryrie Brink has received the nation's acclaim for her unusually fine book, which is the true life of her beloved grandmother.

The synopsis of this delightful story is as follows: "It was Civil war time but the Woodlawns, a pioneer family on the Wisconsin border, seemed far removed from the affairs of the north and the south. They were more concerned with breaking in new farm land and maintaining friendly relations with the nearby Indians. Caddie, the liveliest of the six Woodlawn children, had once been a frail baby, so her father urged that she be allowed to run wild with the boys. She learned to plow rather than to make samplers. Caddie grew up a tomboy, but at twelve she was healthy and strong, a child of great spirit who enjoyed life to the full and found everything about her exciting and interesting."

Our first glimpse of the Woodlawn is as they wade the deep river up to their necks, carrying their chins high, to visit the Indian settlement. The story which follows tells us not only of Caddie's friendship with old Indian John, but also of threatening massacres and thrilling pledges of faith. We read of the eventual visit of the circuit rider who brought the Woodlawn news of national affairs and clocks to mend, and of Caddie's discoveries in the old trunk in the attic. We hear of Uncle Edmund, the practical joker who got Caddie into many an escapade and of Cousin Arabelle, a tenderfoot from Boston, and how the sheep ate the eighty-eight jet buttons of her elegant corset. There are lively days at school with songs and recitations, exciting tramps in the woods with Nera the dog, and happy hours in the Woodlawn home where there was sometimes too much turkey to eat, but always the right kind of understanding. We watch Caddie growing up from an impulsive little tomboy to an understanding young lady.

There is a moment of great suspense in the story when a letter from England makes it necessary for the Woodlawn family to decide whether to accept a family inheritance and go back to England, or to stay on the frontier farm. How glad we are with Caddie when the votes are counted and the "stays" are unanimous! The Woodlawn belongs to America.

Built out of memories of the author's own grandmother, the real Caddie, this is a story not only of exceptional charm and lively plot, but of great historical significance because of its rich authentic background.

The book is illustrated by Kate Seredy, whose charming and lovely illustrations have caught all the vigorous charm of Caddie's appealing personality and have contributed a great deal of beauty and interest to Mrs. Brink's book.

The author has enjoyed many years of writing. Her short stories, poems and plays have appeared in many important magazines. Her first book for children, "Anything Can Happen on the River," a boy's adventure on the Seine, was enthusiastically received two years ago, to be followed this season by the distinguished Newbery medal book.

Mrs. Brink was born in Idaho. Both her parents died when she was very young and she was brought up by her devoted aunt and grandmother. It was "Gram's" stories of her own pioneer childhood that she later wrote together into Caddie's story. After several years at University of Idaho, Carol Brink received her degree from University of California. The Brink family has spent a number of years abroad, and the French backgrounds are very dear to Carol Brink and find a place in much of her writing. However, her frontier heritage is closest to her and out of a great wealth of vivid memories she has given her finest piece of writing in "Caddie Woodlawn." She now lives at St. Paul, Minn. D. W. Helliwell and James Dexter, who her husband is professor of mathematics at the university. She has two children, David, 16, and Nora, 9. Her next book, "Madeleine's Misfortune," a French story will be out in October.

COURTYARD MINING
BANNED IN JACKSON

MEDFORD, Ore., June 2.—(AP)—The Jackson county court has denied scores of requests of miners to dig for gold on the former county courthouse grounds at Jacksonville. It was revealed to day by County Judge Earl B. Day. The plow-courthouse grounds lie in the midst of former rich diggings, and are skirted by Daisy creek, the largest early day producer.

Judge Day said the rejections were based upon the liability of the county for damages in the event of an accident, and a desire to preserve the scenic and historical value of the property.

Since the depression there has been a gold revival in the pioneer town of Jacksonville, famed in Oregon history. Practically every vacant lot and some with houses have been mined.

W. A. Gogward, Jacksonville merchant, estimates that more than \$200,000 has been taken out by backyard miners in the past five years.

HIGHWAY MEASURE
SENT TO ROOSEVELT

WASHINGTON, June 2.—(AP)—The \$485,000,000 Hayden-Cartwright highway bill went to the white house today when the house adopted a conference report on the measure authorizing the 1935-1939 program.

The measure, which continues the road program expiring in 1937 under the present act, authorizes the following for each of the fiscal years ending June 30, 1938, and June 30, 1939:

\$125,000,000 for regular federal aid highways, to be matched on a 50-50 basis by the states but with the secretary of agriculture authorized to disburse the matching requirement if all the state's motor vehicle receipts are used for road purposes.

\$50,000,000 for grade crossing elimination, not to be matched.

\$25,000,000 for farm to market roads, not to be matched.

\$10,000,000 for surveys in forest and other public lands.

\$7,500,000 for national park roads.

\$34,000,000 for Indian land roads.

\$5,000,000 for roads in public lands.

\$14,000,000 for forest roads.

South China War
EDICT IS REFUTED

SHANGHAI, June 2.—(AP)—Japanese sources stated tonight that the South China government of Canton had declared war against Japan and the Chinese national government at Nanking.

The South China provinces concerned are Kwangtung and Kwangsi.
