MARTIN PAROLEES
EIGHT CONVICTS

SALEM, June 3.—(AP)—Governor Martin issued paroles to eight state penitentiary prisoners which will reduce the population at the institution from a record high today of 971 men and women.

The paroles were issued to six who had previously been denied release from the penitentiary and two who had not appeared before the parole board before. The paroles were recommended by the board following the new policy outlined after the attorney general held good time could not be allowed automatically to those with indeterminate sentences.

The executive department did not announce the names of the paroled prisoners.

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OREGON'S RELIEF
CASES NOW 29,000

SALEM, June 3.—(AP)—Oregon's case load of persons who will always require direct relief was estimated at 29,000 men, women and children, Governor Martin said today at a conference with Elmer Goudy, state relief administrator.

These people cannot be employed, even in berry picking, and "will always be with us," the governor said. "The direct relief list was pared as much as possible during the conference, the governor said, and it was revealed 11,061 persons, with dependents, had to be given aid.

MILK PRICE PLAN
OPPOSED LOCALLY

Roseburg milk distributors and producers generally are opposed to the increased uniform milk price proposed by the Oregon milk control board, according to sentiments expressed at a hearing conducted by the board here yesterday.

While a few producers spoke in favor of an increased minimum to 11 cents, in place of the 10-cent price now prevalent here, the distributors, principally, and several of the leading producers expressed the opinion that an increased price would cut consumption.

The 10-cent price, many declared, is ample for a fair margin of profit to producers and dealers in the Roseburg area, and it was felt that a minimum price made uniform for the entire state would be unfair to consumers in the Roseburg area and would not improve conditions for the dairyman.

NEGRO. 110. VOTES
AT FLORIDA POLLS

ST. CLOUD, Fla., June 3.—(AP)—A 110-year-old negro walked calmly to the polls here and cast his ballot in Florida's democratic primary Tuesday unchallenged by officials.

Today party leaders were afraid that Scott Gore's unprecedented action would imperil all results in the Osceola district. The democratic primary by resolution of the state committee is open to whites only.

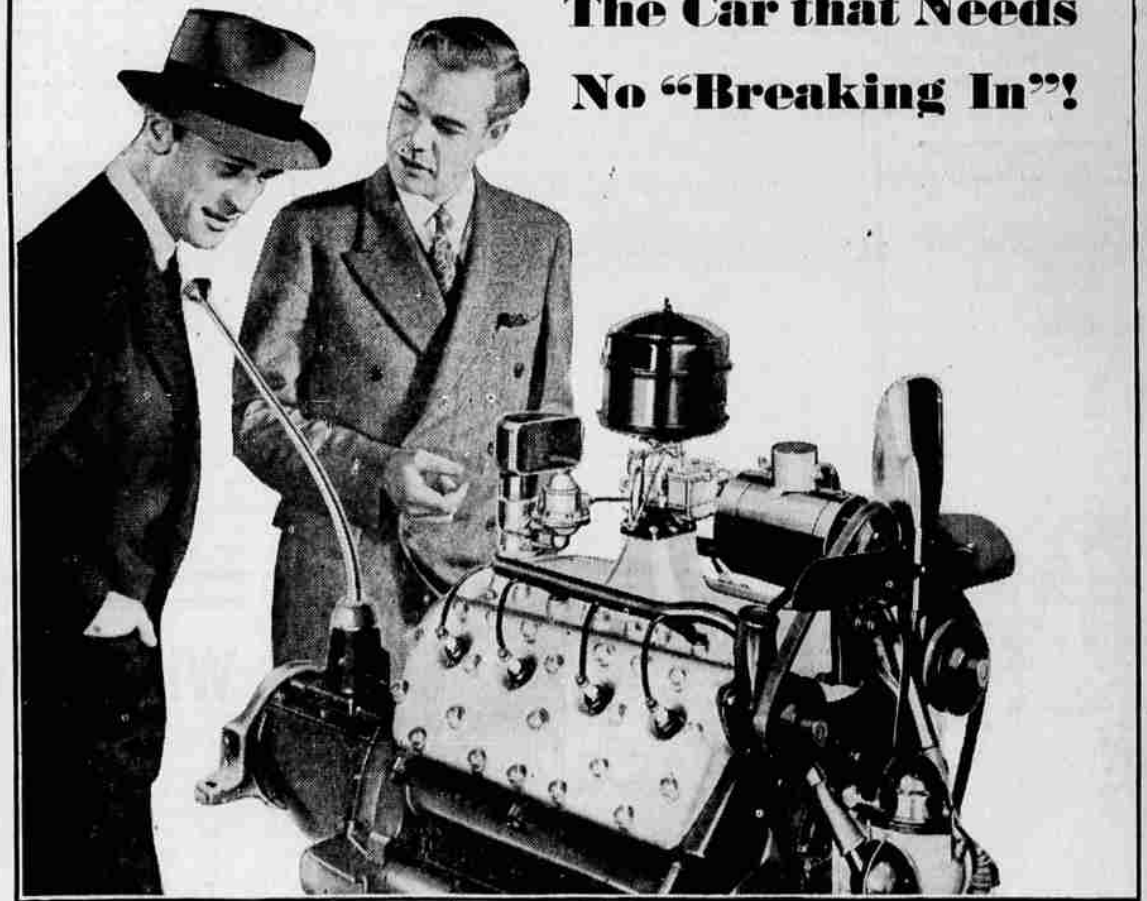
