

TOWNSEND MISLED, McGROARTY CLAIMS

Pension Crusader Regarded
by Lawmaker as "Bad
Advice" Victim.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—(AP)—An assertion that Dr. F. E. Townsend "has recently been misled" by McGroarty, who has been away from the real purpose of his movement and set him to chasing rainbows" was made today by Representative McGroarty (D., Calif.).

One-time leader of the house bloc supporting Townsend's plan for \$200-a-month pensions to all past 60, McGroarty had his comment printed in the Congressional record.

"The self-seeking politicians who have lured Dr. Townsend's ear in the last few months and who have supplanted the real purpose of his movement and set him to chasing rainbows" was made today by Representative McGroarty (D., Calif.).

He said that, regardless of the findings of the house committee which virtually has completed an inquiry into the Townsend movement, he believed existing Townsend clubs should remain intact and work for election of congressmen favorable to his bill to put the Townsend plan into effect.

McGroarty said Dr. Townsend was about to announce his formal candidacy for president at the organization's leadership.

Jealousy Blamed

Charging "only personal jealousy and not the good of the Townsend movement" could have prompted Townsend's opposition to the McGroarty national convention slate of delegates in the recent democratic primary in California, McGroarty added.

"Dr. Townsend's frantic opposition to my well-meant intentions came without so much as a note of inquiry, much less a conference with him as to my purposes. I could not understand his attitude at the time, but I have learned that my announcement came only a few days prior to a long-planned announcement by him declaring himself for the presidency of the United States."

"When I learned these facts, I well understood that Townsend's opposition was caused by the jealousy that is born of thwarted desire. Unlike Dr. Townsend, I

SOUTH CHINA ARMY STARTS INVASION

SHANGHAI, June 3.—(AP)—Japanese advisers from Canton stated tonight that South China armies, advancing northward, had captured North China cities along Hunan frontier.

The Japanese said they were informed the Nanking government has massed 13 divisions and 29 bombing planes in Kweichow province, ready to repulse the attack from the south.

South Chinese cities, they said, were preparing to resist air raids by North China fliers.

Japanese sources reported the Canton (southeast Chinese government) has declared war against the Nanking Chinese government to forestall attack threats directed toward forcible coalition of the two regimes.

Chinese quarters, to the contrary, said such suggestions were made to deflect attention from Japanese smuggling in North China and reinforcement of Japanese garrisons in the Tientsin-Peking areas.

BLISTER RUST NEARS CALIFORNIA WOODS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3.—(AP)—The destructive white pine blister rust, which has destroyed millions of young white firs in the northern and eastern forests of the country, is within 48 miles of the California boundary on the north and may be expected in California at any time.

Dr. J. L. Bedwell of the office of pathology, forest service, at Portland, said sugar pine infected with the disease has been found in the Siskiyou national forest about 20 miles from the coast and also on the Metolus river, east of the Cascades in the central part of Oregon.

Dr. Bedwell said this was the first instance where the disease had been found on native sugar pine. Its appearance near California endangers the sugar pine forests of the Sierra Nevada and Coast range.

The white pine blister rust is thought to have originated in Russia, where it was discovered in 1914.
