

BATCH OF DEMANDS VOICED BY GRANGE

ATLANTA, June 5.—(AP)—A resolution asking congress to require a 7 to 2 majority of the supreme court before the court can declare unconstitutional laws passed by congress was adopted by the Washington state grange today.

The resolution was one of four discussed. Others called for setting aside the power of the courts for requiring a unanimous decision for permitting congress by a two-thirds vote to override an adverse decision of the court. The resolution adopted was recommended by the convention's national legislative committee. It originated in Spokane county Pomona grange.

A resolution urging unqualified endorsement of the Townsend old age pension plan was tabled after less than 15 minutes of debate. The action was recommended by a majority of the national legislative committee. The motion favoring the Townsend bill was sponsored by Woodland grange.

Opposition to the military draft, which prohibits criticism of the army and navy, also was voted. The resolution was introduced by Hopewell grange. Opposition to the statute was almost unanimous.

THE DALLES FACES 'SKEETER PLAGUE'

THE DALLES, Ore., June 5.—Mid-Columbia residents complained today against one of the finest crops in years—a bumper crop of mosquitoes.

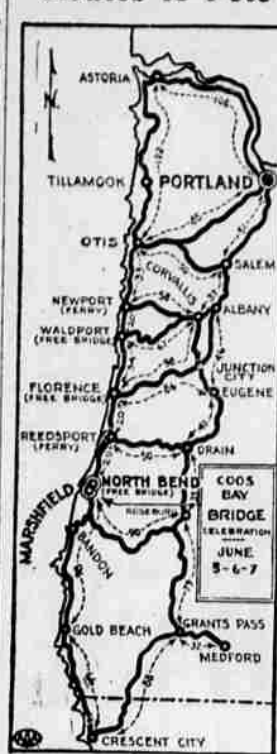

He said: "The provisions of the emergency relief appropriation act of 1935, insofar as they provide for 'housing' projects were held unconstitutional by our court of appeals in the case of the township of Franklin V. Tugwell... on the ground that they violated section one of article one of the constitution as a delegation of legislative powers to the president."

"If it could fairly be said that that case had gone so far as to hold all the provisions of the act to be unconstitutional, it would, of course, feel bound by it, but the only class of projects considered was 'housing.' And the counsel for the plaintiffs do not claim that it goes further."

"We have in the present case grants or loans to municipalities to carry out public works projects, as to which it is easy to find the 'well' bottom path."

"In the present case, the federal government retains no regulatory power over the operation of the projects for which it makes loans. I am unable to see how any reserved power of a state is infringed."

Dean Acheson, attorney for the utility companies, said that he would appeal the case immediately to the court of appeals for the district of Columbia. Government attorneys said they would not oppose continuation of temporary injunctions now in force, pending a final decision by higher tribunals.

Frank E. Gannett, Rochester, N. Y., newspaper publisher and prominent Borah supporter, called Idaho first ballot predictions "ridiculous."

"It's ridiculous to predict such a thing now," Gannett observed. "It's entirely too early for anyone to know. Today's talk comes from leaders of factions who are making great claims to bolster up their people."

Breach Not Healed

Meanwhile the Borah leaders and those of Knox remained across the fence from the Landon forces, but without any handclasp thus far on their own part which might start a "stop Landon" movement.

Hamilton, asked if he had seen any evidence of such a movement, replied:

"I think there are some people here who would like to see the government started, but they have no common interest and couldn't agree on a common candidate."

Raymond J. Jeffreys of Cleveland, prominent in the Townsend movement, said he telegraphed Senator Borah today proposing that the Idaho launch an independent third party movement. If the republican convention fails to nominate him for president, "You can be the next president," Jeffreys said he wired Borah. "The people need your guidance as our next president... in the event you do not receive the republican nomination here next week, I trust you will carry on the fight for the people by launching immediately an independent third party."

REPUBLICAN PLANK ON STATE RELIEF FORECAST

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Republican congressional leaders predicted today the convention next week would adopt a platform calling for return of administration of relief to the states.

They took the view that this had been established as the party policy by the futile attempt in both houses by republican forces to institute a program of state control for the administration plan of continuing federal work relief.

Virtually all of the republican presidential possibilities have declared for the decentralization of relief control.

Senator Borah of Idaho is the only declared candidate who has not supported the decentralization. He opposed the republican substitute offered in the senate by Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, another possible nominee.

Power President Hoover has declared for state administration of relief, with non-partisan boards to advise in expenditure of relief funds.

Republican congressional leaders who led the fight for the decentralization plan, said plans were being drafted for presentation at the convention in Cleveland advocating the state-control plan.

As in the Vandenberg amendment considered by the senate, each state could determine on how it took care of its unemployed, through work relief, or direct relief benefits. The federal government would contribute, but the states would be required to put up a share.

Court Clerk Ousted

Before Circuit Judge James E. Chenot had concluded the first session of his grand jury inquiry into the terrorism ascribed to the Black Legion, charges were made that his court clerk had attended a meeting of the order.

The clerk, Clyde Markland, denied any connection with the night riders, but resigned at the request of Judge Chenot, who said that "we cannot delay our investigation to determine the truth or falsity of this charge."

The accusation that Markland attended a Black Legion meeting was made at an informal meeting of the fire and police commission in suburban Highland park.

"Lawmen" Accused:

Of the six men seized last night in connection with the Penlan, flooding, James J. Pettibohn is clerk of Dearborn township and carries a deputy sheriff's card; Charles King is a former city trustee of Dearborn, and Harold Lawrence was a special deputy sheriff's badge.

The others are Ed Wineinger, George Harry Clawson, 21, of River Rouge, and James Stewart, a former Dearborn policeman.

Under \$50,000 bonds on kidnapping and assault charges are Thomas F. Cox, Detroit, and Frederick A. Gulley and Earl Angstadt, of Dearborn. They admitted yesterday they took Penlan to a Black Legion meeting, at stated points. Gulley said Penlan then was flooded.

Penlan, who has refused to talk, was held under \$5,000 bond as a material witness.

At nearly Pontiac, the circuit bench ordered a grand jury investigation of rumors linking the "Bullet Club," reputed affiliate of the Black Legion, with numerous acts of terrorism and attempts at political domination. Circuit Judge George H. Hartwick will open the inquiry Wednesday.

by the reported "declaration of war" from Canton.

Authorities insisted the Canton government had no authority to make war on anyone. They were inclined to look on the development as merely a reiteration of Canton's recent action in demanding national government resistance to Japanese military expansion in the north.

This has taken the form of strong reinforcements for Japanese garrisons in the Peiping-Tientsin area.

Nevertheless, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, the Chinese dictator, was forging ahead on a nationwide scale of military preparation. One outstanding manifestation of this campaign was the reported execution, at Hainan, of seven Japanese spies.

War Fever Rages

In the first national preparedness drive since China became a republic, officials and citizens alike were receiving military instruction, residents received air raid drills and Hunan province, probably major battlefield of any Sino-Japanese war, was a hotbed of defense activity.

New air bases were rushed to completion to accommodate increasing number of American-made planes; barracks, fortifications, machine-gun emplacements, bomb-proof shelters, trenches and block-houses were built.

Many of the airfields were being constructed in the vicinity of the Yellow river, which cuts through the northern part of the centrally-located province of Honan. Japanese, always in and out of the

area, knew of the activities. Countless "pillbox" fortifications, small, cement recesses built partly underground, were scattered through communities hidden in a grove of graves.

Towns strengthened their walls and moats; factories throughout China ground out sinews of war; provincial authorities accumulated vast quantities of foodstuffs.

Foreigners saw the great campaign a final awakening of the Chinese to the need of a national defense by arms, rather than by words.

Chinese authorities charged the Japanese, it was comes, planned to organize the native bandits who have plagued the countryside and to supply them with arms, food, clothing and narcotics for guerrilla warfare against the Chinese government.

The Domei (Japanese) correspondent in Canton reported today that the local Japanese consul-general had issued "stand by" orders to all Japanese residents warning them to be ready for eventualities.

The consul-general was stated to have told the Japanese to be prepared to move to previously designated localities at a moment's notice.

Bowles, it is stated by Officer Thornton, who made the arrest, refused to release the animals, demanding payment for feed, and seized Mrs. Creason roughly by the arm when she threatened to take the animals from the barn.

Bowles denied touching Mrs. Creason. A not true bill was returned by the grand jury which investigated the case.

The jury, after hearing the testimony, arguments and instructions in the case retired about 10 a. m. Thursday for deliberation. Shortly before 10 o'clock last night, a call was sent out for the officers of the court and the jury came back into the courtroom to have the testimony of Officer Thornton read by the court reporter.

Instructions Repeated

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly was requested to repeat his instructions with regard to the matter of conspiracy alleged in the complaint, and read these instructions from his original manuscript.

The jury again retired, shortly before 11 o'clock, and a few minutes later sent out a request for the judge to remain at the courthouse, indicating possibility of agreement. At 11:30, however, word was sent out that a hopeless deadlock existed and the bailiff was given orders to lock up the jury for the night.

Developments this morning showed that had the one juror not been confused by the terms "plaintiff" and "defendant" an agreement would have been reached on the first ballot yesterday.

It is expected that an appeal will be taken by the plaintiff from the jury's decision.
