Bankhead, New House Speaker, Product of Alabama Hills; Objection of Mother Prevented Him From Becoming Actor

WASHINGTON, June 5.—(AP)—William Brockman Bankhead, elevated to the speakership of the house of representatives today to succeed Joseph W. Byrns, hails from the west Alabama "hill country."

Born April 12, 1874, near Moscow, Ala., he was the second son of John Hollis Bankhead and Tallulah Bankhead. His birthplace was a farm to which his father returned after service as a captain under the confederacy.

"Will," as he is known by friends, went to the University of Alabama and played fullback on its first football team. He won the university medal for oratory.

His father was a well along the legislative path which two of his sons were to follow.

After finishing at Alabama, Will joined the elder—then a member of the national house—and entered Georgetown university here to study.

He became class president. With a law degree and a lot of ambition, Bankhead set out for New York City to hang out his shingle. He joined up with Tammany hall.

Nearly Became Actor

Good looking and conceded to have unusual dramatic talent, he all but scrapped his legal training for the stage while in the big city. A theatre manager offered him a job and he was about to take it, when his mother frowned.

It is said Bankhead vowed then that if any of his own children ever wanted to tread the boards, he would not oppose them. In later years his favorite actress was his daughter, Tallulah, a name passed down from the tragic heroine of an Indian legend and now known from Hollywood to Broadway and London.

In 1914 Bankhead entered the congressional race against William B. Oliver, the Alabamian who placed his name before the democratic caucus of the 74th congress for floor leader.

"Back," as Oliver is known to his friends, whipped Will. But during the next two years the Alabama legislature cut off a part of Oliver's district and created the seventh.

In the following election Bankhead was sent to Washington and is only representative the seventh ever had.

Father in U. S. Senate

When Will entered the house, his father was in the senate. It was no unusual occurrence for the senate and house gavel to fall with a simultaneous bang, each wielded by a Bankhead, father and son.

In later years, after the death of the senator-father, John H. Bankhead Jr., succeeded him in the senate.

The brothers have often presided on the same day on either side of the capitol in recent months.

Will recalled that when he came to congress, the first thing his father told him was to learn the rules.

Soon recognized as an able parliamentarian, he became chairman of the rules committee in the 74th congress.

In this position his gift for drama played him well, and on numerous occasions when President Roosevelt's "new deal" legislation found tough going, Bankhead was called upon to get it moving again.

The democratic caucus on January 2, 1935, elected him the house majority floor leader. He lay ill at the Naval hospital at the time. For weeks it was feared he might not fully recover.

Many observers looked upon the Alabamian's victory as the greatest blow at sectionalism since the war between the states, since the caucus—numerically dominated by democrats of north and east—already had decided upon Byrns of Tennessee for the speakership.

A speaker and floor leader, both from the region of the old confederacy previously was unheard of.

The Bankhead family—father and two sons—has been represented on Capitol hill for half a century.

Another brother, Henry M. Bankhead, is a retired army colonel, and a sister, Mrs. Marie B. Owen, is head of the Alabama department of archives.

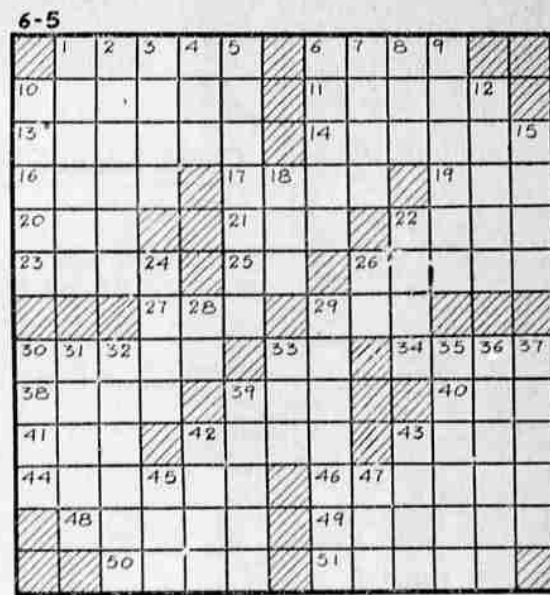
