

OAKLAND DEFEATS PORTLAND, 13 TO 3

Seattle Takes Two Games From Senators; Homers Feature Games.

(By the Associated Press.) High-powered bats kept the Oaks and the Indians on in front of the tight Pacific Coast league pennant race today.

Oakland smothered Portland last night 13-2 to keep two points ahead of Seattle which downed Sacramento 8-2, 4-3 in a doubleheader under the lights.

A game behind were the Missions which won from the San Francisco Seals 6-4 while the Los Angeles Angels celebrated the arrival in California of owner P. K. Wrigley by blasting down the San Diego Padres 11-2.

Flocks of home runs featured the night games while pitchers who hit were on the mound for most of the winning clubs.

Glynn and Gordon drove out homers for Oakland, Gordon's coming with two on in the seventh. Gordon had a double and two singles for a perfect day at bat, bringing in four runs and scoring three himself. Flynn added a double and a single to his homer in four trips up, driving in three runs and scoring three. More remarkable was the work of Tobin, Acorn hurler, who hit a double and three singles in five times up and crossed the plate four times himself, one more run than he allowed the Beavers out of 11 scattered hits. One of those hits was a home run by Earl Brucker.

Gyselman hit for the circuit in each half of the Seattle doubleheader. His second homer broke a 3-3 tie in the brief second game. Spindel led the tribe's big stick men with a home run, a triple and three singles in seven times up.

Koupal, who held the Senators to seven hits in the opener, also drove in two runs. Craddock did a five-hit job in the other encounter.

Adams of the Senators got a four-ply swat in the first game and hit three out of six tries. Nicholas of the Missions was the other batting pitcher, driving in two runs in the sixth to provide the winning margin.

The Angels landed on three Padre hurlers for 14 hits, while the San Diegans helped them along by contributing five unearned runs through three errors.

TENTATIVE COAST GRID DATES DRAWN

SPOKANE, Wash., June 5.—(AP)—Graduate managers of Pacific coast conference colleges, completed the work of their semi-annual meeting here yesterday, including the drafting of a tentative football schedule for 1937.

The 1937 football schedule, which probably will be adopted, does not carry games for either the University of Idaho at Moscow or the University of Montana at Missoula. This is the first time these two schools have not been included on the schedule.

The University of Southern California, the tentative schedule showed, will meet Washington State college at Pullman on October 30, the first trip to Pullman for the Trojans since 1931.

"JINX" CONTINUES TO HOUND TIGERS

Mickey Cochrane Latest to Be Forced Out of Game; Yanks Badly Mauled.

One of the most persistent injury "jinxes" to dog any one club in years, is doing its best to count the Detroit Tigers out of the pennant chase and wreck the world champions' hopes of hanging onto their honors.

A series of tough breaks, beginning with the loss of the star Tiger pitcher, Hank Greenberg, and following up with the removal of the number one pitcher, Schoolboy Rowe, and the outfield slugger, Al Simmons, all laid up for repairs, was climaxed yesterday by an illness which took Manager Mickey Cochrane out of the lineup, suffering from a nerve ailment.

His illness struck him suddenly, shortly after he had smashed out a homer with the bases loaded to spark the Tigers to an 18-9 victory over the Athletics.

The win gave the Tigers undisputed possession of fourth place in the American league race, for the Washington Senators, with whom they have been neck-and-neck, lost their apparent stranglehold on the St. Louis Browns and fell 6-2 in the series finale.

In the rest of the American league, the Boston Red Sox made it three straight over the Cleveland Indians 4 to 3, as Lefty Grove chalked up his eighth win of the season, and the Chicago White Sox handled the New York Yankees their most lopsided whipping of the campaign to date, 16-3.

Cards, Giants Lose
Over in the National league, the St. Louis Cardinals lost 4-3 to the Brooklyn Dodgers, but maintained their three-game league lead as the second place New York Giants were trimmed by Lon Warneke and the Chicago Cubs, 8-5, despite two home runs by Mel Ott. Cy Blanton finally rounded into some measure of his 1935 hurling form and pitched the Pirates to a 7-5 win over the Boston Bees, although he failed to last the route, while the Reds sank the Phillies deeper into the cellar with a 5-3 trouncing.

The loss of Cochrane from his catching position was the toughest break of all for the Tigers to hear, for Mickey has been the spirit behind the winning ways of the champions over the last two years; in fact, ever since he went to Detroit from the Athletics.

He suffered a fainting spell shortly after he belted his homer, and left the game immediately afterward. He was helped to the clubhouse, where a physician looked him over. Then Mickey left with the team for Washington. He hopes to be back in the lineup in a few days.
