Veteran Who Became Father of 18th Child at 96 Years For More Babies Before He Dies; Present Wife is 28

NEW BERN, N. C., June 5 (AP)—George Isaac Hughes, the man who became a father at 94 and again at 96 to prove it wasn't a fluke, said today he wanted two more children before he dies.

His eyes are blue as his 3-day old baby girl's, his carriage erect, his teeth nearly perfect, and his faculties well preserved, the old Confederate, veteran seems very much alive.

Somewhat bewildered, Hughes has wandered aimlessly through the simple four-room house he lives in, listening to the congratulations of neighbors, tourists and the curious.

Late last night, Dr. Charles Duffy, the youthful physician who brought Hughes' latest child into the world, answered a hurry call when informed the 95 pound Mary Gertrude was ill.

But he found Mary Gertrude in good health. She was just upset by the constant stream of visitors.

"The 28-year old mother is also 'doing nicely,'" Hughes wants the new baby to "get married and have children."

"You know," he said, "I believe in women having children. If they don't get married the race is liable to die out."

"Me! I want one more boy and one more girl in the family before I die."

But he couldn't talk long without getting around to Mary Gertrude, born Wednesday night.

"Mary Gertrude," he said, "is the most beautiful baby I ever saw."

The son born to the Hughes 17 months ago is now able to walk about and talk. The boy was named Franklin Roosevelt Hughes.

Hughes wants him to be a farmer.

"That's all I've ever been," he said. "I believe in working and making something to eat."
