HOOVER WAGE PLAN BACKED BY MARTIN

SALEM, June 8.—(AP)—Governor Martin said today he would be unable to attend the conference of governors at Washington, D. C., to consider the future relative to minimum wage laws for women and children. The meeting was called by Secretary Perkins for June 15.

Seventeen states were affected by the decision of the supreme court invalidating the New York wage law. Oregon's law was similar to the one invalidated.

The governor said he was in favor of Herbert Hoover's suggestion that the states should be given authority by constitutional amendment if necessary, to regulate both the hours and wages of women workers. "The states should be given these rights before it is too late," the governor commented.

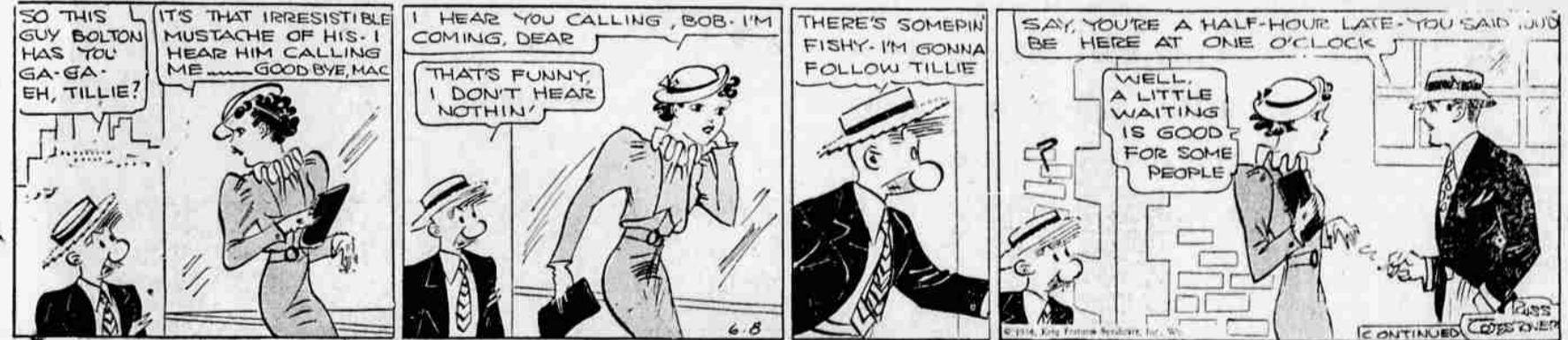
