YAKIMA FORCED TO IMPORT POTATOES

PORTLAND, June 8.—(AP)—One of the most unusual potato markets in the history of the northwest took the attention of buyers today.

Gus Dindia, executive of a fruit distributing firm, returning from a trip through the Yakima and Walla Walla sections of Washington, said that for the first time in history foreign potatoes are being sold in the Yakima market, normally one of the greatest producing regions.

The market here has been receiving old crop Canadian potatoes for some weeks. Inclement weather holding back the new crop. Buyers here said that leading producers of early crop potatoes in the northwest are nearly sold out and mid-season producers report a small crop, although western Oregon prospects are more favorable.

Prices here recently skyrocketed to record quotations because of the domestic crop shortage and buyers said there was little prospect of a decline for the present.

SEATTLE, June 8.—(AP)—Potato prices soared to new ten-year record highs when produce row reopened with scanty supplies. California Shafter Whites, scarce because of the tuber moth embargo at the Oregon line, jumped \$1 a hundredweight, to \$7 and British Columbia Netteed Gems at a new peak of \$4.50.

Jobbers forecast added upturns before sufficient potatoes are available.

The week's trade ended Saturday with no Yakima or British Columbia Gems available and only a limited supply of Idaho imports.

The current rains made strawberries scarce here today and some dealers were sold out at \$2.75 a crate.

HONORARY DEGREE GIVEN VAN DUZER

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., June 8.—(AP)—Union college, one of the nation's famous small educational institutions, conferred today upon Henry Brooks van Duzer, "Portland's first citizen," the honorary degree of doctor of humane letters.
