THE Oregon delegation to the Republican national convention announces that it will support Senator Borah as long as he is "definitely in the picture."

That is fair enough. By reason of the fact that Borah was the only Republican Presidential candidate to file in the Oregon primary, he is the unopposed choice of Oregon's Republican voters. That should entitle him to Oregon's votes as long as he has a chance.

If the time comes (as seems probable as these words are written) when he no longer has a chance, Oregon's delegates should be free to go where their judgment dictates.

ON the eve of the Cleveland convention, this headline looms: "Ickes Lashes Out at Republicans. Secretary of Interior Sees Hearst Influence in G. O. P. Convention."

He sees it, of course, as a SINCEREST influence, because Hearst is one of those who are opposing the New Deal.

If Hearst were supporting the New Deal, instead of opposing it, Ickes and all the rest of the New Dealers would regard his influence as DENIGN and helpful to him.

WOOL POOL SALE HELD IN ABEYANCE

Approximately 28,000 fleeces controlled by the Douglas county wool pool went unsold here yesterday afternoon. Directors of the pool, which is formed by 260 growers and represents from 150,000 to 160,000 pounds of wool, met at the Roseburg National bank at 2 p. m. yesterday to receive bids.

Directors reported that no formal proposal to purchase was received, due to it was believed to be unsatisfactory conditions of the wool market, but that numerous buyers manifested interest, and it is believed a future offering, contemplated by the directors, will result in satisfactory offers.

The officers of the pool held a lengthy conference and are to conduct further inquiry and investigation into marketing matters before again offering the pool for sale. The pool is the largest of its kind ever formed in Douglas county, and the outcome of the season's activities are being closely watched by sheepmen throughout the state.

The board of directors is composed of Joe Ledgerwood, Myrtle Creek; Charles Buxton, Brockway; W. L. Dixon, Dixonville; Irvin Rice, Oakland; and V. J. Philippi, Roseburg.

FLASHES OF OREGON EVENTS

YAMHILL, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—The accidental discharge of fireworks sent flames sweeping through a business building here and caused damages estimated unofficially at \$5,500. The old structure housed a market and confectionery. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

NEW CAPITOL MADE TARGET OF CRITICISM

Senator Bynon of Portland Sees Flaws in Details, Says Building Not Fitted to Site.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—Senator Allan A. Bynon of Portland criticized several points in the winning design of the state capitol architectural competition today and suggested they be remedied.

"As a member of the legislature which voted the new capitol, I feel it is my duty to present certain points in the winning plan which I do not feel are entirely satisfactory," he said.

Points to which he objected: Many rooms, among them stenographic quarters, are without outside light or ventilation. The legislative facilities are scattered, resulting in inconvenience and lack of efficiency. Corridors are twisting in arrangement.

There are nine elevators scattered over the building, whereas the \$9,750,000 Nebraska capitol has but four and the \$5,000,000 Louisiana skyscraper capitol but five.

"Elevators are naturally very desirable, but they represent a considerable cost, which may run four or five per cent of the total of Oregon's modest appropriation," he said.

"Then, too, it would be unthinkable to hire nine operators, so some of the elevators will be the con-fine automobile type."

There are 300 district flights of stairs in 24 locations. Despite Oregon's climate, there is no covered entrance.

Most of the full-time offices—secretary of state, governor, etc.—look out upon a parking lot rather than a greensward. "Instead of spreading out the building to fit the long narrow lot, less than half of the length of the 924-foot site is covered," Bynon continued.

Company officials said they did not oppose collective bargaining but would not negotiate through union leaders.

EUGENE, June 10.—(AP)—Possibility of the sale of the Pacific hospital, one of the largest in Oregon, to the Sisters of St. Joseph, a Roman Catholic order, appeared here today.

Discussions have been entered into by officials of the order from New Jersey, although hospital officers here could make no statement.

Visitors at Coos Killed as Truck Leaps Sidewalk

MARSHFIELD, June 10.—(AP)—A light truck, hurtling out of control on a curve, leaped a sidewalk here last night and killed Rosetta E. Carson, 55, and her daughter, Ida Maurine, 19, who arrived yesterday from Unity, Saskatchewan, Canada, on a visit.

Witnesses told police that the truck, driven by Earl Phillips, Myrtle Point, Ore., was traveling more than 60 miles an hour.

The two women were standing on a sidewalk before the lighted windows of a grocery store. Witnesses said the driver apparently lost control as the truck rounded a curve 200 yards from the scene of the accident, struck a parked automobile, injuring another woman, and plunged on to the sidewalk.

Mrs. Carson and her daughter were rushed to a hospital, the mother dying within two hours and the daughter succumbing early today. Phillips' legs were broken and he suffered cuts. Police said he may be held on charges of involuntary manslaughter.

HENDERER ROAD BUILDING RENEWED

The Douglas county court today sent heavy road building equipment to Elktion to resume construction on the Henderer road. This road, of which five miles was constructed last summer, is projected along the south side of the Umpqua river from Elktion to Scottsburg, a distance of approximately 17 miles. It will serve a number of families now having an outlet only by means of private ferries to the state highway on the north side of the river.

It is expected the crew will add about three miles of road grade during the coming summer, making a total of eight miles of construction. Work will be continued from year to year, as funds are available, until the grade is finished and surfaced.

The bulldozer and other equipment sent to Elktion today will be in charge of Everett Cooper. The construction crew of 12 men will be in charge of road supervisor Roy Fisher.

GUN ACCIDENTS ALMOST TRAGIC

MEDFORD, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—One boy was wounded and the lives of three men menaced by the accidental discharge of guns in Jackson county the past two days, the state police report.

A stray bullet yesterday passed through the windshield of the auto belonging to Earl R. Borden, narrowly missing J. D. Long and Samuel Jacobs, seated in the front seat. Borden was standing along side the auto which was standing in a hay field at the time.

The bullet passed diagonally through the windshield. Monday afternoon, Edward Scrivner, 17, Phoenix, was shot in the knee, when the gun held by a companion was accidentally discharged. The gun was fired when the shooter turned to speak to Scrivner. The boys were shooting at tin cans. The wound was not serious.

WALLA WALLA, June 10.—(AP)—Henry Lloyd, postmaster at Union, Ore., at the time he shot and wounded Beatrice Tyke here April 9, received a suspended maximum sentence of 20 years in state prison. Lloyd was relieved of his postmastership after the shooting.

T. B. Burnett to Drive Stage in Rose Pageant

T. B. Burnett of Round Prairie is leaving for Portland Thursday, where he will drive an old stage coach, entered in the Rose Festival parade Friday by one of the DeMolay chapters of Portland. Mr. Burnett is the last surviving stage driver of the Oregon-California Stage Co. in p a n y, which operated through Oregon before the railroad was built. Mr. Burnett has been a member of the Masonic lodge for more than 44 years and was invited by the DeMolay boys to be their driver.

BLACK LEGION INCENDIARISM UNDER PROBE

Home-Burning Confession Claimed by Prosecutor; Arson Squad Always in Readiness.

DETROIT, June 10.—(AP)—The Black Legion had an "intelligence squad" under orders to burn the homes of men they suspected of being communist leaders in the Detroit area, Prosecutor Duncan G. McCrea said today after a night of intensive questioning of four men held here.

McCrea said the four admitted setting fire to the home of William F. Mollenhauer in Oakland county in August, 1934, and that other cases of incendiarism are under scrutiny.

The four men held are Frank Rice and Clarence Frye, automobile factory employees; Albert Swanson, a gas meter reader, and Roy Hepper, painter and decorator.

The Black Legion "intelligence squad" was under orders to carry a loaded revolver, a can of naphtha, and a quantity of rags in the cars at all times so they could be ready to carry out orders to burn homes of communist leaders, the four told the prosecutor.

Dean's "Wife" Talks A supposed suicide was under scrutiny as a possible act of Black Legion discipline, while a woman who claimed the terrorists plotted to kill Father Charles C. Coughlin was detained as a grand jury witness.

The woman witness is Mrs. Margaret O'Rourke Dean, 34, who said she was the estranged wife of Dayton Dean, confessed slayer of Charles A. Pogue. She told of overhearing Dean and other Black Legionnaires discuss plans for slaying Father Coughlin.

Dean, she said, joined the priest's National Union for Social Justice as a Black Legion spy, but in his jail cell, Dean said he was

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STATE BANK PLAN OPPOSED BY MARTIN

SALEM, June 10.—(AP)—The proposed state bank will be the subject of Governor Martin's address before the state grange convention at Lebanon tomorrow afternoon, the executive said today.

The governor will speak against a state bank, one of the measures which has the endorsement of the grange leaders. He said he would not read from a prepared address but would speak "straight from the shoulder" to the grangers.

The governor was invited to address the convention by State Master Ray W. Gill.

PULP-PAPER STRIKE ENDED BY PAY RAISE

Nearly \$1,000,000 Added Annual Payroll; Loggers Still Idle Pending Another Vote.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—Signing of an operator-union agreement gave 11,000 employees of Western Pulp and Paper mills today a total wage increase of nearly \$1,000,000 over the next 12 months, and apparently insured the industry of continued harmonious working conditions.

The agreement was reached late yesterday by representatives of 28 major paper mills and the two unions involved—papermakers and sulphite workers.

The pact is retroactive to May 31 and extends until the same date in 1937. It called for 5 cents an hour more for male employees and 2 cents an hour more for women, and provided there shall be no strikes or lockouts. The wage increase was the third granted in two years and brought the total boost in wages since 1932 to 12 1/2 cents an hour.

The agreement also provided that employers will assist the unions to build up and maintain the membership in each mill.

A statement signed by J. D. Zellerbach, San Francisco representative of employers, and John Sherman, Port Angeles, Wash., international vice president of the pulp and sulphite workers' union, said signing of the agreement makes

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HALT ON PINBALL MACHINES ASKED

Resolutions opposing bank nights at local theatres, urging the city council to abolish pinball machines in the city and discontinuing the practice of union church services during the summer months were adopted at a meeting of the Roseburg Ministerial union Tuesday afternoon.

In past years the various churches affiliated with the union have united for outdoor services at Library park each Sunday night during July and August. Because the ministers felt the practice seriously affected the evening services after the summer meetings are over it was decided by the ministerial union that the custom should be discontinued.

Declaring the bank night at theatres to be a lottery and the pinball machines to be gambling, the ministers urged in resolutions that both be eliminated. The city council will be asked to take action against the pinball games.

SENATOR STEIWER LASHES NEW DEAL IN ADDRESS TO REPUBLICAN CONVENTION

Government Lacking in Political Morality Has Ruled Nation More Than Three Years, Keynote Declares; Pledges His Party to Slash Taxes, Halt Waste, and Warns of Opponents' "Falsehoods."

CONVENTION HALL, Cleveland, June 10.—(AP)—Calling the New Deal "convicted of retarding recovery," Senator Steiwer of Oregon, keynote at the republican national convention, last night asked the nation to return his party to power. "There are no party lines when human liberty is at stake," he said. Then added:

"Our purpose here is not only to adopt a republican platform and to nominate a republican president—a deeper and thoroughly American purpose is to start the drive to put an American deal into the place now usurped by a self styled 'New Deal.'"

Although he did not refer to President Roosevelt by name, he referred to a "new deal Caesar" and to a man "without a conscience" who was "destructive of the basic essentials of popular government."

Steiwer said that during the 12 years of republican administration, between the Wilson and the Roosevelt regimes, taxes were reduced five times and "what we have done once we will do again." He also promised the party would "reduce forthwith the size of the federal government" and "stop its wasteful spending."

On relief, he said the republican party "will make sure that public funds voted to feed hungry mouths

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PRUNE GROWERS TO ELECT DIRECTORS

All prune growers of Douglas county are being called upon to meet in Roseburg Saturday, June 20, for the purpose of electing two directors to represent the county on the Oregon Prune Control board.

The meeting is called for 2 p. m. at the city hall, and it is the desire of the leaders in the organization movement to have all growers of the county in attendance. Plans are being made to have delegations of growers present from Salem and Dallas to discuss organization and marketing with the Umpqua valley growers.

The efforts of prune growers to continue the operations of the Oregon Prune Control board through voluntary agreement has met with marked success, and latest reports from Marion and Polk counties indicates a large sign-up of growers in that section of the state.

The present plan of operation is identical with that of the former control act, which was invalidated by a court decision as a compulsory measure. A great many growers, however, are desirous of continuing the plan of operation on a strictly voluntary basis, and it is believed a majority of the tonnage of the state will be brought under the organization this season.

As Douglas county is entitled to two directors on the board, an effort is to be made to secure a representative attendance at the meeting June 20 in order that the selection of directors may meet with the approval of the greatest possible number of growers.

TEXAN THREATENS TO PUNCH TUGWELL
AUSTIN, Tex., June 10.—(AP)—Rexford Guy Tugwell may get a punch in the nose from Eugene Wardley, Texas Pinhead legislator, for the resumption administration chief doesn't remove his "dust box" moving picture from circulation.

KEYNOTER'S SPEECH ADDS TO PRESTIGE

Oregon Senator Facing Opposition, However, From Backers of Favorite Sons.

Platform Framing Proving Difficult Task; Hoover Will Be Convention Speaker Tonight.

CONVENTION HALL, Cleveland, June 10.—(AP)—A republican convention quarreling within itself listened restlessly today to a second critical appraisal of the new deal, waited anxiously for the platform committee report, and prepared to settle all differences in the open tonight if possible.

Assuming the permanent chairmanship, Representative Bertrand Snell of New York called for a "crusade to restore to the American people their constitution and their liberties."

Senator Frederick Steiwer of Oregon was given an ovation as he relinquished the temporary chairmanship to Snell. Talk about the far westerner for vice-president persisted, but some easterners did not want their section left out. Steiwer was given four votes for the presidential nomination by the Pennsylvania delegation at their caucus today.

Previously mentioned only tentatively, Steiwer's speech encouraged some delegates to boom him into line for second-in-command in the ticket.

Texas delegates launched a vice-presidential drive for Colonel Frank Knox, Chicago publisher, a candidate for the presidential nomination. Whether Knox would accept the second place on the ticket remained to be seen.

Favorite Sons Boomed Out of the east came campaigns for three "favorite son" candidates for the number two position. New Hampshire delegates worked for 38-year-old Governor H. Styles Bridges, New Jersey sounded off for former Senator Walter E. Edge while the call of Maryland's Governor Harry W. Nice for an eastern vice-president was looked upon by many observers as a bid for the post.

Thoughts of many delegates evidently were elsewhere. Impending state caucuses which could clinch
