

MINING JUBILEE DATED AT BAKER

BAKER, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—All eyes will be turned on Baker July 3 and 4, when the historic mining town will again celebrate its mining jubilee.

An event that heretofore has attracted thousands, bids for additional attention this year when state notables will gather to witness its great parade, rock drilling and log sawing contests, baseball games, children's sports and pyrotechnics.

Gov. Charles H. Martin will address the Baker county pioneers and their families at their annual picnic in the park July 4. The state executive and other officials will also meet with the state mining planning board here and attend the eastern Oregon mining and mineral association convention July 3.

No where in the state are the old days harked back to so realistically as in the rock drilling contest staged by seasoned miners. Competition for cash prizes in this event is expected to be stronger than last year, when five teams pitted skill and brawn against flinty granite rock. Six or eight teams are expected to enter the log sawing contest.

Miss Helen Densley of Richmond has been chosen queen of the 1936 jubilee, and will be attended by other eastern Oregon girls as princesses.

The celebration will be terminated with an extravaganza in fireworks.

ADULT COURSES TO CONTINUE IN JUNE

The adult education program will continue in Douglas county, at least through the month of June, Mrs. Stella Quinn, supervisor, reports. It is possible that by request some of the larger classes will continue on through the summer.

Teachers in piano, radio, knitting, sewing, typing, shorthand, art, crafts and lip-reading are arranging their courses so that anyone wishing to enroll may do so now.

The instructions are free of charge and anyone interested in learning to type, obtain help with their sewing, paint a picture, knit a suit, play the piano, etc., is invited to attend.

The adult education program in Douglas county has been very successful this year, with 14 teachers and about 450 attending classes weekly.

Classes have been held in Roseburg, South Deer creek, Glendale, North Deer creek, Oakdale, South Deer creek, South Deer creek, Camp Bradford, Tennille, Camas Valley and Kelly's Corner.

Plans are now being made for a recreational program for children, starting the latter part of June.

JAPAN FOR PEACE, MISSIONARY SAYS

PORTLAND, June 9.—(AP)—Ninety-nine per cent of intelligent Japanese oppose war, Dr. Toyokuni Kawano, of Japan, one of the four recognized living religious leaders of the world, said on a visit here today.

Half blind from disease suffered in 15 years of missionary work in the slums of Shinkawa, Dr. Kawano quietly but decisively spoke his opinion that threats of Japanese aggression were empty ones. He said the emperor is committed unreservedly to a program of peace.

Dr. Kawano, a devout Christian, has written 106 books. "My books are for the use of Japanese people and are written largely for the agnostic and atheist living in a Buddhist country and not for use in a theological seminary."

STATUTORY OFFENSE JURY SAYS GUILTY

SENATOR STEIWER LASHES NEW DEAL

ever the platform, he declared, "a competent government, founded on conviction and conscience," could be restored.

Warnings of Falsehoods. "But it will not be done," Steiwer boomed. "If we permit ourselves to be deceived by the deplorable talk of our enemies, the nation knows by this time that the administration is equipped with a monstrous, reckless propaganda machine operated with taxpayers' money to advance its own ends."

"In the face of advances in the campaign, we will hear the false cry that our efforts have fallen flat. These falsehoods will be recognized and rightly rejected by the people. The people will make the world know that this nation cannot be bluffed and cannot be bought."

"For more than three long years we have had a government without political morality. I propose to show you that government endowed with conscience will bring us a prosperity not built on promise and pretense, but built with the bricks and mortar of fundamental principles. This prosperity will not be measured with the crooked lines and crooked trick phrases of the constitutional legislation, but by lines that square with the rules of honesty and morality."

Steiwer was not loath in expanding a hard spoken assault upon the new deal with direct criticism of President Roosevelt, himself.

Turning back to the time when former President Hoover left office, he declared that if Americans would assert their heritage they would never again need to fear "such a debacle as we had in March, 1933."

At that time, he said, "a president-elect without a conscience refused for four months to cooperate with a president who had a conscience, resulting in a bank crisis and a panic of fear and flight."

A few minutes later, Steiwer quoted Mr. Roosevelt as saying that the issue in the upcoming presidential campaign would be "the retention of popular government."

"We agree," the Oregonian continued. "But we do not agree that the people's government is retained under a system headed by a

New Deal Caesar. An administration in which substantially all power is concentrated in one branch is not in keeping with the principles of popular government."

No "Dole Slavery." Generalizing near the outset upon the aims of republicans, he said:

"We propose to carry forward the lamp of American progress; the lamp which has been dimmed by the depression and which the new deal has tried to extinguish. We propose to show those who have waited for more than three long years for a real job how that job is to be obtained. We propose to show further to those who have jobs how those jobs can be protected against the ravages of the collapse which is inevitable under the new deal."

"The ten million unemployed shall at last get the consideration which they deserve—and with it the privilege of honest work. They must be permitted to work again as free men and not languish as vote-slaves, nor as slaves of the dole."

"We propose to show the forty million now in gainful employment upon adherence to a system under which their pay envelopes will not shrink and under which their life insurance policies and savings bank deposits will be protected."

Steiwer devoted the main body of his speech to an attack upon the new deal reciprocal trade program, its farm and money policies, and its present and past tax bills.

Offers Program. But before discussing the present administration also of extravagance and "politics in relief," the keynote listed the following eight-point system he said must be put in force "if we are to recover from the new deal."

"(1) Our government must provide an honest money and banking system which will permit the free and uninterfered exchange of wealth and will not be subject to the sinister control of any group. Whether the group be politicians in Washington or speculators in Wall street, the consequences to the public are the same. The money system must not be any man's toy."

"(2) Our government is a vast business enterprise. But it is not run as a business enterprise. It is run as a political machine."

"(3) Foreign trade may create either an asset or a liability. If we import goods which could be made or grown at home, we deprive American workers or farmers of the opportunity to earn livelihoods, and break down the American standards of living and thus compel a dependence upon foreign sources of supply."

"(4) Agriculture's prosperity is fundamental to the prosperity of the nation, and farm income must be kept in balance with industrial income."

"(5) Ours is an economy of profit and loss. It cannot thrive without both. Law or regulation to guard against the losses inevitable in competition freezes industry and prevents progress."

"(6) Government regulation of business works to destroy business."

"(7) A dollar primarily belongs to the man who earns it. Taxation is a seizure of purchasing power from the hands of its owner."

"(8) Under the American system, it is the business of government to govern according to the will of the people as expressed in the laws. No one can excuse the bureaucrats' use of taxpayers' money to write laws and to buy propaganda in order to force the same laws on the people. The nation owes to our people the duty to take advantage of our fortunate geographical position and to avoid all foreign entanglements."

Mentioning the fact that he himself had voted for some new deal measures, Steiwer said the "failure of the new deal" could not be charged to republican obstruction. He complained, however, that measures started as temporary steps were being made permanent.

Farm Policy Scored. He followed this statement with criticism of the new deal farm policy and its administration, concluding:

"Our great domestic markets should be restored to the American farmer—in full. The problem of surplus which glut the domestic market must be solved. We should consider the case of export crops where tariff protection is ineffective. The scientific development of industrial uses for the products of agriculture opens a wide field which has been blocked off by the present administration."

World Peace Objective Urged in Plea to Christian Scientists at Annual Meeting

BOSTON, Mass., June 8.—An appeal to Christian Scientists to work for the demonstration of world peace, the reading of reports by church officers on the various activities of the movement throughout the world and sustained demand for the writings of Mary Baker Eddy, discoverer and founder of Christian Science, marked the annual meeting today of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

Election of Mrs. Elizabeth Cadwell Tomlinson of Boston as president of the Mother Church was announced. She succeeds Dr. Frank C. Colby, Mrs. Tomlinson was born in Byron, Wisconsin. After graduating from St. Helen's Hall, a well-known Episcopal private school, she received a remarkable healing in Christian Science which brought her into the practice of this religion. She was at one time a delegate appointed by the governor of Oregon to a conference of women's organizations in Paris, in 1914, she was in London, England, at the outbreak of the World war and did service under Mrs. Herbert Hoover in relief activities.

The addition of 22 new churches and eight new university organizations, making a total of 2751 branches of The Mother Church and 55 college and university organizations, was announced by the department of branches and practitioners.

Among new societies was one formed by the natives in a mountain province of the Philippine islands. They had been holding services over a period of years and this past year came to the point in growth where they were able to go forward as a branch of The Mother Church.

Approximately 6000 Christian Scientists representing every state in the union and practically every civilized nation in the world attended the meeting. The main floor

and three galleries were filled within a short time after the church doors were opened, the overflow being accommodated in the original Mother Church where amplifiers were installed.

As retiring President Dr. Frank C. Colby declared in "encouraging" to find that Christian Scientists are realizing more fully and more keenly that Christian Science is something more than a glorified "theory." He introduced Mrs. Elizabeth Cadwell Tomlinson as the new president of The Mother Church.

Edward L. Ripley, ex-rector of the Mother Church, expressed gratitude that the indebtedness of a year ago, resulting from the remodeling and returning of the former publishing house to serve as the church administration building, had been met in full through the active co-operation of the field together with the earnings of The Christian Science Publishing Society.

Also re-elected was Ezra W. Palmer, clerk of the church. One of the principal duties of the clerk and his co-workers is the handling of applications for membership in The Mother Church.

His report included information as well on the relief work done by the church. The relief fund of The Mother Church alleviated distress caused by hurricanes in Florida; by earthquake in Montana; continued work at the veterans' hospital, Oteen, N. C.; aided those whose property was damaged by tornado in Mississippi and North Carolina; and assisted sufferers from floods in southern and eastern states. Relief was dispensed among Christian Scientists and non-Christian Scientists in 14 states. In the course of this work assistance was given to or through a number of ministers of other denominations who have expressed much appreciation for the assistance and the spirit in which it was administered.

"The greatest help for agriculture would be a national administration which would rebuild the great American market by policies assuring the reemployment of the 10 million unemployed. The farm problem must and will be met, without violation of the constitution, program of curtailment or curtailment or ruthless destruction of food needed in a hungry world."

Tariff Policy Hit. He attacked the reciprocal tariff program, saying it had failed, and added:

"The combined effort of reckless and uninformed trade agreements plus the administration's monetary policies are fast putting our nation under foreign control."

Turning to the controversial question of amending the constitution, he did not mention any instance in which such a step should be taken, but added that although a way had been provided the present administration had moved by "indirect means" which in some cases amounted to "nullification."

On taxes, Steiwer said: "Above all was needed the 'old fashioned idea of thrift, a resolute and uncompromising purpose to secure a balanced budget and honest assurances of reduction in debt.'"
