

PORTLAND DOWNS SENATORS, 2 TO 0

**Caster Holds Foe to Lone
Fluke Hit: Oaks Defeat
Seattle, 5 to 1.**

(By the Associated Press.)
George Caster, Portland's swift ball artist, was deprived of a hit name by a blooming single by his Sacramento hurling foe in one of the standard pitching performances of the season last night.
Caster's performance was snuffed by Nathan Andrews, Solon Blinger, in the sixth inning of the game, which Portland won 5-0. Andrews swung wildly, the ball hit the handle of his bat and sailed weakly to the outfield for the only hit of the game. Caster didn't allow a runner to reach first base the first five innings of the game, and only four other runners reached first base thereafter on walks. Caster's triple started Portland's winning rally in the sixth.
Oaks Beat Seattle.
Ludolph, Oakland's perennial ace, boosted the A's to within a halfgame of the Seattle Indians by pitching five-hit ball for a 5-1 victory at Oakland.
Muller's home run accounted for Seattle's only run. While the Oaks drove Kounal, Seattle's No. 1 pitcher, from the hill in the first inning with a four-run outburst that won the game.
Thomson was touched for 11 hits by the Missions, but the Angels fielded sharply behind their undefeated pitcher and won their home game 5-0. Beck, the Red's hard luck pitcher, allowed only six hits during his tenure, but the spheroids made them count for four runs. Ten Mission runners died on base.
The San Diego Padres opened defeating the Seals, 7-3, behind their invasion of San Francisco by Salvo's seventh-inning. Vince Di Maggio, Padre right fielder and Seal cutoff, made Salvo's task easier by driving in three runs, and scoring two himself.

MAX BAER TAKES TO COMEBACK TRAIL

SACRAMENTO, June 10.—(AP)—Max Baer will start up the fight trail Friday in an effort to regain the heavyweight boxing championship. He has forsaken the idea of raising "white faced cows" and leading a dance orchestra.

Baer and his manager, Axel Hoffman, hope to crash the "big time" once more and will start the last of this week for Salt Lake City.
Hoffman said today he will put his former champion in the ring in Salt Lake City, then Boise, Pocatello and Rock Springs. Offers have been received from Texas, Oklahoma and other states.
The tour will be made by automobile and Hoffman plans to use Baer either as a fighter or referee and he expects eventually to reach New York.

A telephone call from Mike Jacobs, promoter of the Schmeling-Louis fight, ended Hoffman's tour. "Jacobs told me," said Hoffman, "to get Max in shape and hold him there for some future offers."

SCHMELING LOOKS LIKE SURE LOSER

NAPANOC, N. Y., June 10.—(AP)—Max Schmeling, 30 years old and slower, is ready for the worst.

As the former king of the heavy-weight fight industry neared the peak of form today for his battle against Joe Louis at the Yankee stadium, June 18, there wasn't an expert to be found in his camp who figured he had a good chance against the exploding dynamite packed in the fists of his 22-year-old foe. Max looked almost as good as ever, but the overwhelming opinion was that it wasn't good enough.
The black champion, who will have only four more workouts before breaking camp a day or two before the fight, has a lot of steam behind his punches. He doesn't appear scared to death of Louis' reputation and he doesn't talk about the Brown Bomber. Yet his timing looked too slow and his defense works far too feeble to hold any definite chance to score one of boxing's most startling upsets with a victory over the new scourge of fight.

HINDU LOSES FIGHT FOR CITIZENSHIP

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—Rabha Singh Ghoswala's 12-year battle to regain his citizenship in the United States ended unsuccessfully today.

Federal Judge James Fee denied his appeal for re-instatement. The high caste Hindu of Santa Barbara, Cal., renounced his allegiance to Great Britain and was made a citizen of this country in Portland in 1922, but two years later the government cancelled his papers on the basis that he was not a "free white person."

Subsequent appeals were unsuccessful since the government contended it could not be used in such cases. In 1935, however, Congress passed a special act enabling him to file the suit, termination of which left him today "a man without a country."

112 PICKETS NABBED IN CONTEMPT ORDER

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—Sheriff's deputies paraded to headquarters today with a steady stream of union pickets charged with contempt of court, while proceedings began by an automobile mechanics union to dissolve a circuit court injunction came to a standstill.

By noon, officers had arrested 112 pickets who converged on three automobile plants seeking to force higher wage scales. The pickets arrested were charged with violating a court order prohibiting them from frequenting the plants. All were released on their own recognizance, but union leaders said they would replace pickets as officers arrested them.

Among those named in contempt proceedings were three union leaders, J. W. Reardon, business agent, William Bundy, president, and Harley C. Weeks, secretary.

Circuit court postponed hearings on contempt charges when attorneys for the union petitioned the supreme court for a writ of mandate to invalidate the injunction.

SALEM, June 10.—(AP)—The state supreme court ruled today it had no authority to issue a writ of mandamus in a proceeding to compel Circuit Judge Crawford of Multnomah county to exact a \$5,000 bond from George B. Wallace company, to protect automobile mechanics local 1005 in Portland.

The proceeding was submitted by Attorney B. A. Green, at the request of Harley C. Weeks, William Bundy and J. W. Reardon.

The George B. Wallace company originally filed suit to restrain picketing of the property by the automobile mechanics union. A temporary restraining order was granted. Green then asked that the injunction be dissolved on the ground that the bond posted by the plaintiff was insufficient. This was denied.

At a conference with the supreme court here yesterday Green asked that the George B. Wallace company be compelled to file a bond of \$5,000, in compliance with a 1921 statute.

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SALEM, June 10.—(AP)—While thousands cheered Senator Vandenberg of Michigan stood on the republican convention platform saying "walla, walla, walla" over and over again.

Rep. Hamilton Fish of New York, Bronx booster, strode through a hotel lobby, wearing Kansas sunflowers all over his broad back. London reporters had planned them there when he wasn't looking.

By count, Sen. Steiwer's keynote speech was interrupted 67 times by applause.

CARDINALS STRETCH LEAD IN NATIONAL

**Pittsburgh Ties Giants in
2nd Place; Yanks Beaten
by Lowly Browns.**

The St. Louis Cardinals, who stretched their lead yesterday to 4½ games by finishing on top of the Boston Bees 7-5, appear the only group untroubled so far by a wholesale turnover.
An explosion hit the rest of the pack, however, and switched their lineup 100 per cent. The Pittsburgh Pirates pulled up all the way from fourth place to a tie with the slipping New York Giants in second, on the strength of a doubleheader win over the Dodgers. Weaver pitched seven-hit ball to take the opener 4-1, and the fives pulled all over the Brooklyn ace, Munro, in the first two innings to capture the nightcap, 7-5.

The Giants, meantime, were getting belted on all sides by the Cincinnati Reds, with the aging Kiki Cuyler leading the attack in an 18-11, 15-4 victory. This boosted the Reds into fifth place, turning sixth over to the Bees. Just to make the changes unanimous the Philadelphia Phillies, although they lost to the Cubs 6-3 through Henshaw's airtight pitching, climbed out of the cellar for the moment in their last-place game of hide-and-seek with the Dodgers.

The American league was more or less serene, so far as any switches in the standing went, but the Senators, the Browns and the Tigers did a bit of "worm-turning" on their respective opponents.

Browns Beat Yanks.
The last place Browns, handed the pace-setting New York Yankees a 5-3 setback, Hogsett limiting the considerably off-form "murderers' row" to five hits. The Tigers turned on the Boston Red Sox 8-4, just before their ailing manager, Mickey Cochran, left to return to Detroit for observation, which may lead to an operation. The Senators took advantage of the sliding Cleveland Indians and won a 2-1 pitchers' duel, with Apolton the four-hit victor.

The Athletics dropped to within one game of the cellar when their pitching weakened in the tenth inning and let the White Sox push across three runs for a 5-2 win.
