Rehabilitation of Many Oregon Farm Families Progresses Under Govt. Plan

PORTLAND, June 11.—Bridging the gap from poverty to independence in Oregon rural areas and waging a concerted attack on land misuse, the resettlement administration had 1933 farm families under rehabilitation, 578 workers from WPA rolls on conservation programs in depleted range and forest areas, and 5,300 acres of good farm land optioned for resettlement, today announced Walter A. Duff, regional director.

Rehabilitation of Oregon farm families, through cash loans for capital goods, backed by workable farm plans, is allowing approximately 5,400 people to remain on their farms without relief and with every hope of regaining a self-sustaining basis and repaying their loans.

An additional 24,400 men, women and children, representing farm families and farm laborers have been assisted through the emergency advance program providing subsistence goods pending rehabilitation or reconveyance through seasonal agricultural work.

Oregon's 1,200,000 acre forest conservation area in the coast range, 200,000 acre Jefferson county grazing conservation area and the 6,000 acre Silverton recreation area, is giving employment to almost 1,000 men transferred to WPA rolls. Development work of WPA rolls, the development of the land to its most beneficial public use for forest, range, recreation and wild life.

Community and cooperative services for rehabilitation and low-income farm families are being organized as rapidly as possible with application completed or pending for five farm machinery cooperatives, two community canneries, one lime grinding cooperative and two purebred sire rings.
