

DOWAGER QUEEN OF G. O. P. UNNOTICED

Convention So Wild About Hoover, It Fails to See Mrs. Benj. Harrison.

CLEVELAND, June 11.—(AP)—Twelve thousand yelling republicans saw the dowager queen of their party last night at Cleveland's convention hall and didn't know it.

For thirty minutes Mrs. Benjamin Harrison, the oldest living widow of a president, stood and smiled understandingly at a sea of open mouths and waving arms waiting patiently to be introduced by Chairman Bertrand Snell.

But the crowd was in a mood for a hero; Herbert Hoover, who had just spoken not knowing who Mrs. Harrison was, the delegates kept "Let them alone," she smiled. "They're enjoying it. It's natural for convention crowds. It's Hoover they want."

Snell tried to wave the hysterical crowd into their seats. Twice he and Mrs. Harrison started to speak over the loudspeaker system. Each time a new yell went up for "Hoover!"

"But he's gone to the train," protested the perspiring Snell. The yelling drowned his voice. Mrs. Harrison stepped back several feet to chat with others on the platform.

She amazed the group when she told them her age, but she teased them first.

"Seventy?" some one guessed, uncertain, because her hair is still almost black, her figure erect.

"More," she smiled. "Seventy-two?"

"Oh, more!"

"Seventy-seven?"

"Right!" she said.

Then she told them why she was present in Cleveland.

"The country's in such a serious condition," she said. "So I came to the convention. I haven't been to one since 1912."

MUNGO WALKS OUT ON BROOKLYN TEAM

NEW YORK, June 11.—(AP)—Van Lingle Mungo, star Brooklyn pitcher who went on strike yesterday and quit the Dodgers cold in Pittsburgh, said today he would not don a Dodger uniform again "unless they treat me right."

"I haven't been getting the right kind of support from the team or the proper treatment from the club, and the truth of the matter is I want to be traded," said the fireball right handed hurler.

When Mungo failed to report to the Dodgers' dressing room at Forbes field, Pittsburgh, yesterday, John Gorman, business manager of the club, indicated Mungo would be fined or suspended, or both.

"I suppose the club is planning to slap a big fine on me," said Mungo. "I've heard it was going to be something like \$1,000."

"Well, you can bet I won't pay it or stay with the club unless I get assurance that things will be different in the future. I feel I've been let down in the field and the really best thing for me is to be traded."

"I'm not fussy about which team I'm traded to. The New York Giants? That's a good club. I wouldn't mind playing for it."

RELIEF FUNDS OPEN TO STATE WORKERS

SALEM, June 10.—(AP)—Relief funds of \$4,029 are available for present state employees and former employees who contributed to the voluntary fund late in 1931, who by unavoidable circumstances are in need of financial assistance.

Brigadier General Thomas E. Rilea, chairman of the voluntary committee, announced today.

The money is the balance raised at former Governor Julius L. Meier's suggestion when all state employees contributed one day's pay each month for five months to assist needy in the various counties of the state.

During that period before state and federal relief was available about \$35,000 was raised and distributed to the county judges for disbursement. Some of the funds were tied up when the First National bank of Salem closed. The balance available now resulted from the liquidation of the money which was held by the bank.

Only two members of the original committee, named by Governor Meier, are now in state employ, Chairman Rilea and J. M. Devers. The late Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss and William Elzing were the other two members of the committee.

To take their places, Governor Martin named Secretary of State Earl Snell and Dan Fry, purchasing agent. This committee will administer the balance of the money.

Persons applying for aid will be given upon the recommendation of the department heads under which they are now employed or were employed when the donations were made.

Method of distribution of the fund was decided at a meeting of the committee here today.

OLD U. OF O. LAWS NEVER REPEALED

EUGENE, June 11.—(AP)—Like the forgotten laws of many cities, regulations of olden days upon student life at the University of Oregon still live through lack of repeal.

One of these aged regulations forbids the football team to make any noise in the streets at night. Another permitted a student to remain in the gymnasium only an hour a day. Students were forbidden to attend dances, or loiter around doors or make disturbing noises in the halls.

PLEA FOR PRISON TERM IS DENIED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—A one-legged man asked today to be sent to federal prison so he could learn a trade.

Barney Walsh, sentenced to eight months in jail for transporting a stolen automobile, appealed for a change of commitment. He said his leg was amputated above the knee recently and he wished to go to federal prison to learn a new trade, even though the minimum sentence in prison is a year and a day.

Federal Judge James A. Fee denied the request. "After all, the question of due punishment is involved," he said.
