Any way you look at it Pittsburgh and the champion Cubs of Chicago seem to be the boys to supply whatever headaches come to the St. Louis Cardinals in the current National league race.

They're chasing each other right up the ladder, resting in second and third place, respectively, today, now that what is generally regarded as the New York Giants' long-predicted blow-up has come to pass.

The Pirates drubbed the Dodgers 6-3 yesterday for a clean sweep in their four-game series, and the Cubs took their third in a row from the Phillies, 4-3, in a major league program that found the weatherman getting most of the laughs by raining out half of the scheduled hit in each loop.

Their victories, along with the surprise walkout of Mungie, the Dodgers' number one speedball pitcher, from the Brooklyn's temporary camp in Pittsburgh, featured the shortened program, in which Cleveland's 16-2 triumph over the Senators, and the Boston Red Sox' 4-3 win over Detroit, furnished the only other competition.

Over in the American league, while the leading Yankees were idle, the Red Sox pulled up to 23 games back of the pace with their win over the Tigers, while Cleveland again became a threat for third place in taking the Senators.

PENSIONS OF \$80 FAVORED BY BORAH

CLEVELAND, June 11.—(AP)—Senator Borah said today he favored a \$80 a month pension for persons over 60 years of age.

He made the statement to newsmen in discussing republican platform plans.

Although he had taken no part in discussions of the social security plank, he had favored a plank calling for an old age pension.

"I am in favor of old age pensions of \$80 per month for people over 60 years of age," Borah said, "and I expressed that view in conversations with some of the subcommittee members. I did not, however, submit a plank on that question."

Borah explained that he had set \$60 as the figure because "that would take care of the old people, and it is about the amount the economic condition of the country would permit."

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PORTLAND REVELS IN FLORAL PAGEANT

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11.—(AP)—This "City of Roses" gave full reign to its favored flower today as Queen Janet Sooy-Smith and her royal court of seven princesses took the limelight at the 25th annual Rose festival.

Myriads of roses, a 60-piece orchestra and thousands of visitors provided the setting for elaborate coronation ceremonies at Multnomah stadium last night.

In the spectacular musical ride of Canadian Northwest Mounted police, a horse that collided with another and spilled its rider stole the show by "soldiering" along with the other horses through their intricate maneuvers without a guiding hand. Several times the mount attempted to catch his charger, but without success until after the drill was completed.

The queen and her court will officiate today at the official opening of the annual rose show and tomorrow will take part in the huge floral parade, one of the highlights of the four-day tribute to the flower for which the festival was named.

Honorary degrees of knighthood will be conferred by the order of Royal Rosarians Friday night.

The Junior Rose festival and coronation will be held Saturday and the Mardi Gras Saturday night.

Special luncheons are on the program each day. The contingent of Royal Canadian Mounted police, the Vancouver, B. C. constabulary band and other musical organizations will give programs each evening.

Ski races on Mount Hood and vesper services later at Portland will close the festival Sunday.
