LANDON AND KNOX NOMINATED BY G. O. P. CONVENTION

MONOPOLIES, CHISELERS HIT BY ROOSEVELT

President, in Texas Talk, Calls for "Democracy in Opportunity" as National Need.

DALLAS, Texas, June 12.—(AP)—Striking at monopoly and "chiselers" and calling for "democracy in opportunity" as well as in government, President Roosevelt declared here today the new result of economic control by the few "has meant the ownership of labor as a commodity."

Standing in the packed Texas Centennial stadium, the chief executive asserted a "lesson of sectionalism" was apparent on every hand and the "good neighbor policy" should be extended across the border to Mexico and other lands so that war may be forever banished from this hemisphere.

"If labor is to be a commodity in the United States, in the final analysis it means that we shall become a nation of boarding houses instead of a nation of homes," he declared.

"If our people ever submit to that, they will have said 'good-bye' to their historic freedom. Men do not fight for boarding houses. They will fight for their homes."

Democracy Returning
"You found," he said, "that certain forms of monopoly—the combinations of public utilities and other businesses which sought their own ends, were undemocratic because they were bearing down heavily on the smaller competitors, and on the people they served. Because of this they

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PORT ORFORD JOBS TO BE CONTINUED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—(AP)—Gilbert E. Gable, mayor of Port Orford, Ore., told interviewers here work would be continued by the several corporations now engaged in development of the southern Oregon coast country.

"We are going ahead," he said in reporting that an immediate project will be rebuilding of the Port Orford dock, which was damaged by storms last winter.

Gable, who is interested in the corporations and who is attending a meeting of representatives of the groups here, said various plans "are being brought to a head."

He said some readjustment of finances may be necessary because of damage to the Port Orford dock but that no general reorganization or shift of control were contemplated.

Engineering problems are being worked out for the various proposed developments, the mayor said. "Included in the program are real estate projects, a sawmill now in operation, operation of the dock, and construction of a rail line from Port Orford to the Southern Pacific line at Leland, 30 miles inland.

Steam Mangles Teamboat CCC Camp Enrollee

St. Louis, Mo., June 12.—(AP)—A teamboat CCC camp on the North Umpqua river, 45 miles east of Roseburg, was brought to the veterans hospital here today suffering from critical injuries resulting from an accidental powder explosion. He was employed with a powder crew clearing right of way for the extension of the North Umpqua road.

He was reported to be suffering from a crushed chest, mangled face and broken leg and was said to be in a critical condition.

He recently came to the Steamboat camp with a group of recruits from Missouri.

HOUSING OF LEGION BRINGS BIG TASK

Reservations in Roseburg Thus Far Surpass All Convention Marks.

With a record number of reservations pouring in for the state convention of the American Legion to be held here in August, the housing committee of the convention is engaged in a most difficult task, that of securing sufficient accommodations for the largest attendance at any state meeting of the organization.

The number of reservations already received exceeds the number ever made so early for a state Legion convention. Percy Croft, chairman of the housing committee, has informed the convention committee. This condition confirms reports received from all parts of the state forecasting the largest state meeting the Oregon department has ever known.

Payment of the adjusted service certificates this year is believed to be one of the several reasons for the great interest being shown in the coming state convention.

Need Maximum Room
With 5,000 or more delegates and visitors expected to be present, housing facilities in Roseburg will be taxed to the limit.

Exceptionally fine cooperation is being secured from hotel owners and managers, Mr. Croft reports, the hotels having arranged to turn over all available space to the convention.

Lists are being made of rooms in apartment houses, private dwellings, auto camps, etc., and a systematic plan for assigning convention visitors to quarters is being arranged.

Arrangements have been made with the veterans administration to open the barracks at the former Oregon State soldiers home to house drum corps and other organizations. The heating plant will be put in operation to provide hot water and the rooms will be equipped with cots. Quarters will be provided uptown to store drum corps equipment, so that it will not be necessary to transport the instruments between town and the quarters of the reservation.

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LANDON ONLY ONE OFFERED CONVENTION

Kansan Wins on First Ballot; 19 Votes go to Senator Borah of Idaho.

Gov. Landon's Exceptions to Planks Jolts Borah, Whose Future Stand Is in Question.

CLEVELAND, June 12.—(AP)—Still alive from the veritable explosion of acclamations with which it was unanimously nominated, Alf M. Landon for the presidency, the republican national convention moved today to choose a running mate for what the Kansas governor heralded as a mighty drive to unseat the new deal.

Two names—Vandenberg and Knox—swept from mouth-to-mouth through hotel corridors as leaders and delegates struggled through the day and beyond to attain accord on the vice-presidential nominee so today's final session of the convention could complete the ticket and adjourn.

Both Senator Vandenberg of Michigan and Col. Frank Knox of Chicago had withdrawn from the presidential race to second Landon's nomination last night and called for unity in "this great crisis."

The Landon name was the only one ever presented, and on the roll call he received 954 of the 1,002 votes. The teller's announcement was drowned by the din of his shouting and parading followers.

Borah Receives 19.
Of the 19 non-Landon votes, Wisconsin cast 18 for Senator William E. Borah of Idaho, while a single vote from West Virginia's blue also went to the "lon of Idaho." Wisconsin then quickly moved that the nomination be made unanimous.

Another tumult spoke the affirmative answer.

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PICKETS SENTENCED, APPEALS IMPEND

PORTLAND, June 12.—(AP)—Circuit court, after disposing of the cases of nine of 15 pickets charged with contempt, marked time on the remainder today pending outcome of proceedings to be presented to the state supreme court.

Four of the nine were sentenced to 30 days in jail each for violating the court's order prohibiting picketing of three automobile plants and appeals were taken to the supreme court. The other five received suspended sentences after promising to abandon the picket line.

The arrests began early this week after the employers succeeded in obtaining a temporary injunction against picketing of their plants, contending that their employees had not joined a strike of automobile mechanics.

With issuance of the injunction, sheriff's deputies began arresting pickets who refused to leave the vicinity of the plants. The union replaced them as rapidly as officers took them away, although deputies said that no new pickets had appeared in the past 24 hours.

Along with the appeals, union attorneys prepared to place before the supreme court an action seeking nullification of the injunction.

Borah Withholds Pledge to Back Republican Nominee for President

WASHINGTON, June 12.—(AP)—Senator Borah of Idaho refused today to say whether he would vote for Governor Landon for president.

Back in Washington after being defeated by the Kansan for the republican presidential nomination, he told reporters he was "not clear" as to the meaning of the message Landon sent to the Cleveland convention before he was nominated last night.

Republican leaders had been waiting anxiously for word as to Borah's attitude toward the gold plank which Landon added to the convention platform. The Idahoan previously had opposed vigorously a return to a gold monetary standard.

"I do not care to comment on Governor Landon's message to the convention," Borah said at a press conference. "I am not clear as to what it means."

"If it means he is for the gold standard, of course, I am wholly in disagreement with that, but he says he is not in favor, as I understand it, of returning to the gold standard unless it can be done without penalizing our democratic economy and without injury to our producers of agricultural products."

"But it can not be done without doing both. There can be no greater threat to the producers of this country than a pledge to return to the gold standard."

2 CITIES CONTEST FOR D.A.V. REUNION

MEMPHIS, Ore., June 12.—(AP)—McMinnville and Bend loomed today as contestants for the 1937 convention of the Oregon state Disabled American Veterans of the World War. The vote for a choice will be taken Saturday afternoon.

The session here this morning was devoted to routine business, and the reading of resolutions presented by the resolution committee. The vote on the adoption or rejection of the resolutions is scheduled for this afternoon.

The delegates will be guests at a banquet to be held tonight. The convention will close tomorrow, with the annual election of state officers, and a grand ball at night.

PARLEY BEGUN ON COOS BAY STRIKE

MARSHFIELD, June 12.—(AP)—A committee of four union representatives and delegates from each employer in three plants sat down today in an effort to settle differences which led to a shutdown of plywood and veneer operations here, throwing 450 men and women out of work.

Operators contended that union sought wage increases despite the asserted payment of a scale above that prevailing throughout the industry.

J. W. O'Neal, union leader, said that at a meeting last night of union members "opinion was expressed that the strike was legitimate and picketing and other details had been well conducted."

Roseburg Band Gets State Fair Dates

The Roseburg Municipal band today received an invitation to furnish band music for the first three days of the Oregon State fair, Roseburg and Salem bands are being employed for the fair according to word received here.

The Roseburg, 30-piece band, directed by J. D. "Snapp" Gilmore, will play during the first three days, while the Salem band will supply music during the remaining days of the fair.

TOWNSENDITES TO CHOOSE DELEGATES

Holman Faces Jam Over Martin's Pay-As-You-Go Relief Decision

SALEM, June 12.—(AP)—Governor Martin's refusal yesterday to sign certificates of indebtedness for direct relief in Oregon today resulted in a "stopped payment" program by the state treasurer but only after an overdraft of \$13,454 was reported.

State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman today kept state police patrolmen and the telephone busy in an attempt to locate Governor Martin and Secretary of State Earl Snull to explain the situation to them and point out the necessity of issuing certificates of indebtedness. Both were reported in Portland this morning.

The stop-payment action, Holman said, meant that the relief administration would be without funds for the remainder of the month of June, and those dependent on relief would face the possibility of going hungry, because he was powerless to act.

The deficit was reported after allowing for the acceptance yesterday of \$150,000 from the state liquor control commission, Holman said. Checks presented to the state treasurer today by the local

banks here remained unpaid. Holman was conferring with state relief officials to ascertain how much money would be needed for relief up to July 1. He will ask the governor to issue certificates of at least \$100,000 on the liquor revenue funds, despite the governor's statement yesterday he would not sign any more certificates of indebtedness.

In making his request Holman referred to the state law passed by the second special session of 1933 which states that "if at any time the money in the unemployment relief fund shall become exhausted or pending the credit of revenues thereto, the treasurer shall be and hereby is authorized and directed to borrow from the most advantageous sources, such amounts as shall be necessary to pay all lawful claims filed against said unemployment relief fund with the secretary of state in pursuance of law, and the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, jointly, shall issue certificates of indebtedness therefor, which certificates shall draw not to exceed the legal rate of interest until repaid."

UNANIMOUS VOTES GIVEN BOTH MEN

Chicago Editor Given 2nd Place on Ticket When Vandenberg Draws Out.

Both Candidates Once With Bull Moose Faction of Party; Convention Ends Labors.

CLEVELAND, June 12.—(AP)—The republican ticket against the new deal is Landon and Knox.

The national convention overwhelmingly nominated Col. Frank Knox of Illinois for the vice-presidency today after Senator Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan had asked, in a letter read to the delegates, that his name not be considered.

The convention nominated Knox for the vice-presidency with the same unanimity that marked the nomination last night of Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas for the presidency. Upon completion of the ticket the convention adjourned sine die.

No Dissent Voiced
From the start of the call of the states, the delegates went for Knox without a solitary dissent; cheered a telegram from Landon saying the "road led to victory in November"; and disbanded for the

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LANDON TO WAGE VIGOROUS BATTLE

TOPEKA, Kan., June 12.—(AP)—Gov. Alf M. Landon told newsmen here today that any plans for his campaign for the presidency would await a conference with the new republican national committee which will meet in Cleveland after the close of the convention.

Among thousands of congratulatory telegrams received by Landon was one from former President Hoover.

"I propose to wage the most aggressive campaign the republican party has seen in years," the Kansas governor told newsmen.

The tumult among Topeka's 65,000—when the phrase "Landon nominated" rippled across the wires and through the ether—was unparalleled here since the World War armistice.

In the ear-splitting demonstration thousands thronged the way through the downtown district and surged across the lawn of the executive mansion.

There, near midnight, in the eerie glow of Kleig lights, and old fashioned political red flares, the governor came to his front porch and bespoke the "good will" of his neighbors.
