BLACK LEGION HIT BY FRESH CHARGES

DETROIT, June 12.—(AP)—Prosecutor Duncan C. McCreia named 15 men, including Arthur F. Lupp, Michigan commander of the Black Legion, in asking warrants today on charges of conspiracy to murder a suburban newspaper editor and a village mayor.

Twelve of the men were named in connection with an alleged "blood pact" with Arthur L. Kingsley, editor of the Highland Park, a community newspaper in Highland Park, and the other three were charged with a plot to slay William W. Voisine, mayor of suburban Ecorse.

The warrant recommendations followed announcement of a new statement by Dayton Dean, Black Legion "executioner," who has admitted he fired the shots which killed Charles A. Poole on May 12 after a night ride with the terrorists.

McCreia said Dean's accusations were corroborated by confessions from Roy Hepler and Clarence C. Frye, who are held as members of the "night riders" "intelligence squad."

Named with Lupp in the Kingsley case were N. Ray Markland, a former assistant prosecutor whom McCreia suspended, and Leslie J. Black, a suspended clerk for Judge L. Eugene Sharp of common pleas court and president of the "Wolverine republican league."

McCreia charges that Kingsley was marked for death in August of 1935 because of the opposition of his paper to Markland, who was defeated in April of 1934 for reelection as mayor of Highland Park.

SCHOOL DISTRICT DEBT HEAVILY CUT

Obligations at Lowest Sum in Twenty Years, Clerk Geddes Reports.

The Roseburg school district has its lowest warrant indebtedness for a period of more than 20 years. A. J. Geddes, school clerk, informed W. F. Harris, chairman of the board of school directors, today. The figures on indebtedness were compiled by Mr. Geddes today in preparation for the annual report covering the past school year.

Warrant indebtedness of district No. 4 was reduced during the past year from \$57,654.40 to \$17,384.42. At the same time the bonded debt was lowered from \$95,000 to \$84,000, making a total decrease of \$59,264.98.

Total bonded and warrant indebtedness at the beginning of the year was \$152,654.40, while the present debt is \$101,758.42. The bonded debt was reduced \$11,000 and the warrant debt was lowered \$29,264.98.

Budget Saving Effectuated — Increased payment of current and delinquent taxes was reported by Mr. Harris to be the chief factor in permitting the school district to reduce its obligations. The schools during the past year, he reports, were operated at from \$2,000 to \$4,000 below the amount budgeted, and all money received from the county treasurer from payment of delinquent taxes was applied to the retirement of outstanding warrants.

Continuation of the trend toward payment of delinquent taxes may enable the school district to return to a cash basis after next year, providing policies of economies in operation are maintained, Chairman Harris said.

The bonds still unpaid are a part of the issue of \$165,000 sold in 1925 for the erection of the senior high school building. These bonds are being retired at the rate of \$11,000 annually, with final payment due in 1944. From 1940 to 1944 the payments will be \$10,000 per year.

Burden Greatly Eased — During the past 20 years the warrant indebtedness of the district has been a great burden, Mr. Harris stated. Since 1923, however, the school board and officials have concentrated on a retirement of this debt, with the result that the obligations at present are the lowest in more than 20 years.

Outstanding warrants for the past seven years are shown for purpose of comparison by the school clerk as follows: 1929-30, \$86,411.97; 1930-31, \$63,794.42; 1931-32, \$67,005.88; 1932-33, \$92,816.42; 1933-34, \$73,165.78; 1934-35, \$57,654.40; 1935-36, \$17,789.42.

MEMORIAL TO HONOR ACADEMY FOUNDER

Unveiling of a memorial tablet, surrounded by the large bronze bell which years ago summoned to classrooms many of Oregon's now prominent men and women, will feature the annual reunion of the Umpqua Academy association at Wilbur, Sunday, June 14, starting at 1:30 p. m.

The monument is being erected by the association in memory of

Rev. James H. Wilbur, Methodist missionary, who in 1857 established the Wilbur academy, which was for many years the principal school between Sacramento and Salem. The bell which hung in the original building, destroyed by fire many years ago, has been mounted on a rock base, upon which a memorial tablet has been placed.

The presentation of the monument is expected to draw a record crowd to the reunion of the association, composed of alumni of the pioneer academy, Sunday.

The program for the reunion Sunday is announced as follows: Song, "Land of the Empire Builders"; Prayer; "America," C. A. Edwards; Salute to the Flag; Unveiling of monument; Placing of wreath.

Benediction. Immediately following the memorial service the annual business session and pioneer reunion will be held in the school gymnasium, where several speakers will participate. The meeting will be open to the general public.

STREET BALL GAMES START CITY FUSS

PORTLAND, June 12.—(AP)—The controversy over whether boys shall play baseball in the streets threatened to develop into a war today, with rate makers all for chasing them into the parks.

The dispute started when one woman wrote the city council and demanded action against budding diamond kings. A man replied that it was only a group of "fools" who wanted to deny the boys the right to emulate Babe Ruth on the city's streets.

Today Mrs. Effie Moran, saying she represented a large group of women, called upon Mayor Joseph Carson to do something. The mayor promised that the boys would not go to jail even if an ordinance were passed prohibiting street games.
