Mrs. Wesley Brandhorst, student of Miss Ruth McManis of the conservatory, gave delightful dramatic art readings.

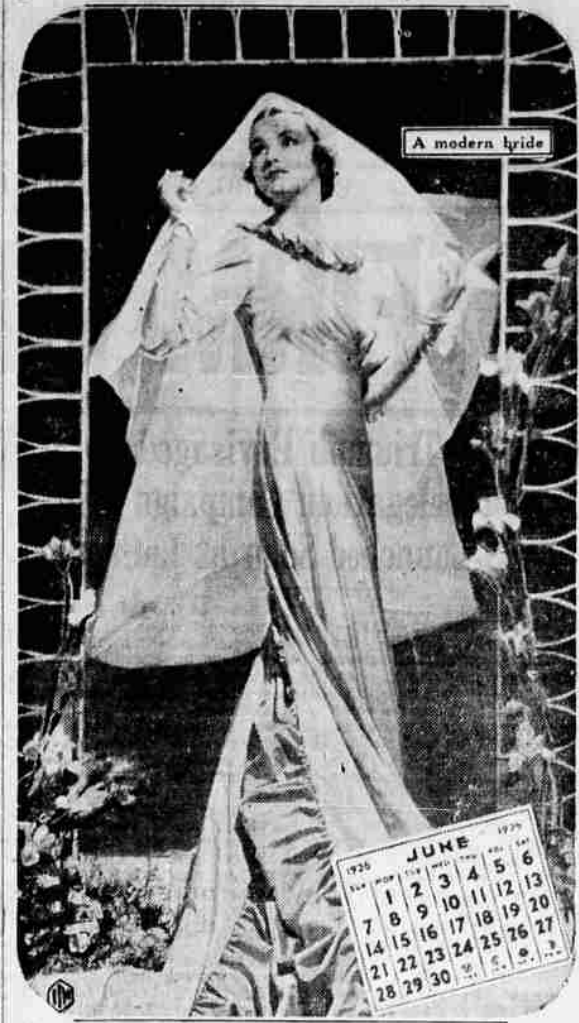
DELIGHTFUL FAREWELL PARTY GIVEN HELEN EVANS AT STANTON HOME MONDAY
