EUGENE, June 12.—(AP)—Future plans of Hugo E. Rossion and N. Thomas Stoddard, retiring graduate manager and assistant at the University of Oregon, were made known here today.

TWO WIVES GIVEN DIVORCE DECREES

SCHOOL ELECTION ROUSES INTEREST

Much interest is being shown in the school election to be held next Monday, June 15, at the junior high school, to select two directors for three-year terms. Due to the fact that there are four candidates in the field for the two positions to be filled, a rather large vote is anticipated, district officers report.

The election will be held between the hours of 2 and 7 p. m., and any person who has resided in the state of Oregon for a period of six months and with the district for thirty days is entitled to vote. Registration is not required.

31 INDICTED FOR ILLEGAL SURGERY

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—(AP)—Thirty-one persons were accused of being involved in a coast-wide illegal operation syndicate in an indictment voted by the San Francisco grand jury today.

Nine doctors and R. L. Rankin, head of the Medical Acceptance corporation, whose offices were raided by police, were among the 31.

The jury voted the indictment after hearing Dr. Charles E. Pinkham, secretary of the state medical board, charge the syndicate financed and performed operations to abort childbirth.

Testimony on which the indictment was based, Deputy District Attorney John McMahon said, included: That the ring has been netting between \$250,000 and \$500,000 annually.

That women, loaned money for operations, were forced to repay it with exorbitant interest. That approximately 4,400 cases have been handled annually.

That physicians and others performing operations have been paid as high as \$1,000 monthly. Dr. Pinkham said he had been attempting for three years to smash the ring, which he declared had connections throughout California and in Oregon and Washington. The present investigation does not extend beyond California.

CROFT TO MOVE TO HOOVER BUILDING

Percy Croft, local Hudson-Terraplane dealer, who recently leased his building on Jackson street to Montgomery Ward company, will move into the Hoover building, formerly occupied by the 7X Supply company, he announced today. The Hoover building is to be remodelled preparatory to being occupied by Mr. Croft. The change will be made late in the month.

The Montgomery Ward company is making preparations to take over Mr. Croft's property on lease July 1. It adjoins the store's present quarters, and the two buildings will be thrown together to more than double the sales display capacity of the local branch store.

Extensive alterations are being planned by the company's engineers and will be made before the building is occupied for store purposes.

PORTLAND, June 12.—(AP)—Mayor Willis Mahoney, of Klamath Falls, democratic nominee for United States senator, became a member today of the Oregon delegation to the national party convention at Philadelphia starting June 23. He was named as alternate by D. A. Hart, of Forest Grove, who told W. A. Delzell, Portland, chairman, that he would be unable to attend.
