LOS ANGELES, Calif., June 13.—World-famous creative artists and electrical engineers are combining their talents and ingenuity in preparations for the Elks motion picture electrical pageant, being arranged as a super-feature for the Elks' 72nd national convention in Los Angeles the week of July 12th.

This gorgeous illuminated night event will not only present scores of dazzling floats embodying the most advanced features of electrical wizardry, but startling demonstrations of nature's most baffling mystery-forces.

The motion picture industry will contribute heavily to the show, in the participation in the program of internationally popular screen stars. A fortune will be represented in the floats alone, no expense being spared in their design and construction.

By the Associated Press. The central government of China increased its military preparations today as civilians in both North and South China demonstrated against Japan.

CHINESE CONTINUE "BLUFF" AT JAPAN

The Nanking government reiterated more men into the national army as a threat to South China, which, last week, sent troops northward into Hunan province.

In Peiping, 3,000 students marched through the streets shouting epithets against Japan; in Canton, the southern capital, 100,000 civilians, shepherded by soldiers, marched in a similar demonstration.

Since the Cantonese had withdrawn their armies slightly from the farthest north point of advance and since the central government forces apparently have made no move to attack the southerners, observers leaned to the opinion that the danger of civil war was fading but that civilian demonstrations would be used to force the Nanking government to strengthen its opposition to Japanese encroachments in the north.

Maj. Gen. Kita, military attache in the Japanese embassy to China, asserted: "Both sides are bluffing."
