HIGH TRIBUTE PAID LOYAL B. STEARNS

High tribute to the memory of the late Loyal B. Stearns, former Oakland resident, for many years an attorney and jurist at Portland, is paid by Judge Wallace McCann, of Portland, in a letter received by a brother, A. F. Stearns, of Oakland.

"Your brother was on the bench when I came here," Judge McCann writes. "I practiced in his court. The courtesy and kindness with which he conducted his court and his dependable common sense solved many problems and protected the rights of many litigants."

Judge Stearns was my neighbor for forty years. He was one of the most genial and companionable of men, kindly, interested in others and happy when he could render service. He was a public-spirited citizen interested in all that made for the welfare of the community.

"Your brother was a real man; the soul of honor. He rang true to every testing."

The letter contains a number of personal reminiscences.

FORECLOSURE SUIT HALTS LOCAL PAPER

Suit for foreclosure of contract has been filed in the circuit court by the Marion Finance and Credit corporation against Bert G. Bates, Nova G. Bates, the Roseburg Publishing company and the American Type Founders Sales corporation. The Marion Finance and Credit corporation is a concern directed by Robin Reed, former owner of the equipment which the Roseburg Publishing company, which publishes The Times, Roseburg daily, contracted to buy, according to the complaint.

The action for foreclosure alleges that the terms of the contract were violated by failure to pay taxes and to maintain insurance, together with damage to the "good"

will" of the business by "vicious" attacks upon individuals and firms, and by threats to prevent further use of the publishing plant by injuring or damaging equipment.

The complaint also declares a further violation of contract by transfer or sale of machinery and equipment which, according to the terms of the agreement, was to remain in the possession of the defendant during the life of the contract.

A decree of foreclosure, judgment in the sum of \$2,000, a restraining order to prevent damage to the equipment, and appointment of a receiver in the event of suspension of publication is requested.

The plaintiff corporation is represented by Attorney Ray B. Compton.

The Times, formerly published as a morning daily, failed to appear in print today.

DUTTON WILL HEAD RANGE MANAGEMENT

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(AP)—Appointment of Walt L. Dutton, a native of eastern Oregon and for several years range inspector of the forest service in the Pacific northwest, as chief of the division of range management, was announced today by F. A. Wilcox, chief of the forest service.

Dutton will have headquarters here, succeeding C. E. Rachford who recently was named assistant chief forester. As chief of the range division Dutton will be responsible for administration of more than 80,000,000 acres of range lands on national forests.

He has been stationed here the past year and a half as assistant to Rachford.

OREGON FEDERATION OF LABOR CONVENES

KLAMATH FALLS, June 15.—(AP)—One hundred and fifty delegates to the Oregon State Federation of Labor convention arrived in Klamath Falls today for the first sessions of the five-day meeting.

Resolutions brought before the convention included a change in the tax base for schools in Multnomah county, changes in the industrial type of labor organizations and a move to take the profits from war.

The resolutions were not discussed. They were assigned to committees to be brought out on the floor of the convention.
