CIVIL WAR THREAT HOVERS OVER CHINA

HONG KONG, June 15.—(AP)—Well-informed sources predicted tonight Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek, leader of the central government, might order an attack by national troops on Kwangsi province in the south.

National government troops, day by day, are occupying more strategic points along the border of the southern provinces. Generalissimo Chiang's men have taken up positions in Yungting and Shanghai in Fukien province and Shanghai, Hengchow, Chuchow, Laying and Chanchow in Hunan province.

At some places, only 30 miles separate the northern and southern forces.

Kwangtung province is continuing its preparation for defense against an attack of national troops, but an imminent invasion between Kwangtung and Nanking government officials indicated Chiang would not attack Kwangtung.

The relations between Nanking and Kwangsi province, however, are more precarious, and persistent rumors are heard that the provincial leaders are receiving Japanese support.

It was said Generalissimo Chiang might move to eliminate unruly officials in Kwangsi, after which Kwangtung could be disciplined.

The authorities of Kwangsi province are recruiting soldiers feverishly, taking particular pains to capture men who attempt to evade the conscription law.

In order to outwit attempts to evade conscription through false declarations of age, the military age now is declared to be from 14 to 55 years.

Foreign travelers arriving here from the province say almost every Kwangsi man now is in uniform with the building of roads and

telegraph systems proceeding rapidly.

MORTICIANS BUY NEW FUNERAL COACH

A Henney-Packard, Nu-Way side servicing funeral coach has been purchased by the Douglas funeral home and is being put in service here.

The coach differs radically from the former type of hearse through the arrangement for putting the casket in place from the side, instead of from the rear, making possible a more dignified service.

The new coach is luxuriously appointed.

REYNOLDS HAS NEW PLANNING POSITION

Clarence W. Reynolds, for some time assistant on the staff of the state relief committee, has been named special executive assistant in charge of coordination activities for the Oregon state planning board, according to word received by J. A. Harding, chairman of Douglas county planning commission from Ormond R. Bean, board chairman.

Work of organizing and coordinating planning work in counties a project begun a year ago by Dr. P. A. Parsons, head of the sociology department of the University of Oregon, will be continued by Mr. Reynolds, Dr. Parsons, a member of the planning board, will continue as chairman of the coordination division of the organization.

A program of cooperation with county planning commissions is regarded as one of the most important functions of the state planning board, Mr. Bean stated. Planning groups are given the benefit of the technical and research facilities of the state board, and projects having state-wide significance are also worked out.

Mr. Reynolds has had considerable experience in public service, and is highly qualified for his place with the planning board, Mr. Bean said. Before joining the relief committee, which has granted him a leave of absence of six months to work with the planning board, Mr. Reynolds directed transient relief work in Oregon and worked out the program for this activity.

Mr. Reynolds is now on a tour of northeastern Oregon, where he is conferring with county planning groups. He will visit this county and other sections of the state during the next few weeks.

COLUMBIA ONCE HAD GIANT FALLS

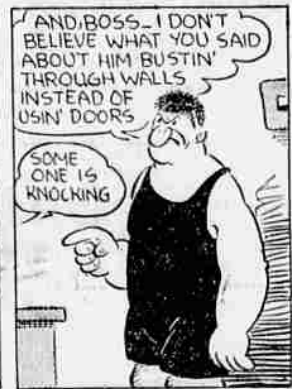
