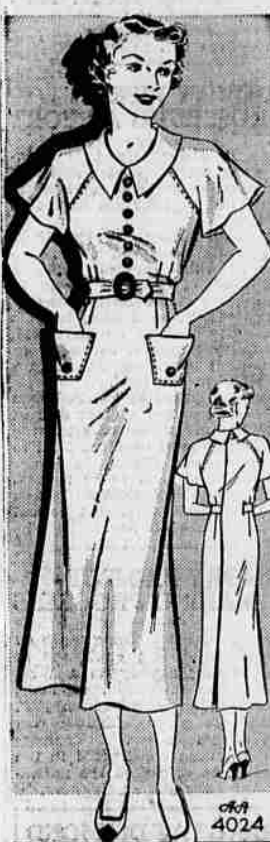

JOE CHAMBERLIN WINS SCHOOL POST

CORVALLIS, June 16.—(AP)—Joe Chamberlin, former state commander of the American Legion, and R. J. Starke, professor of forestry at Oregon State college, won places on the school board today after one of the hottest election battles in 10 years.

Chamberlin and Starke, favoring the use of a part of school property for the erection of a combined armory and community center, defeated E. B. Lemon, a board member, and Henry Lehner, J. J. margins of approximately nine to seven out of 1570 votes cast.

THE DALLES, Ore., June 16.—(AP)—Edward Kurtz and Glen Corey won positions on the city school board in yesterday's balloting by the largest number of school election voters in 12 years.

Tabulations today showed Kurtz received 533 votes for reelection, and Corey 402 to beat out Charles Roth whose friends sought his reelection but failed to file his petition in time. Roth received 220 write-in votes.

MANY APPLY FOR SWIMMING COURSE

Numerous registrations are being received for the Red Cross swimming school which starts Monday, June 22, at Umpqua park, Dr. H. C. Church, chairman, reported today. Persons desiring to take the course are urged to register as soon as possible, as efforts are being made to organize the schedule and it is desired to secure an estimate of the number of persons to receive instruction.

Classes for beginners, both children and adults, will be provided, together with a course in advanced swimming and courses in junior and senior life saving.

Stanley Kieder and Edna Brown are to serve as instructors. Persons who hold senior lifesaver certificates are asked to volunteer their services as guards during the school and are asked to register with Dr. Church and receive assignments for time of duty.

Work is being started today on the construction of a float, life-line, etc., and every safeguard to assure the greatest possible safety for swimmers will be provided.

Registration fee is 25 cents for all courses except lifesaving, where the fee is 50 cents.

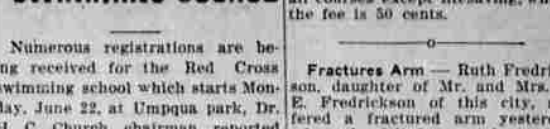

TRANSPORTATION OF PUPILS MANDATORY

SALEM, June 16.—(AP)—Voters within a school district cannot legally rule a suspension of a school without providing transportation of the pupils to another district, the Oregon supreme court held today in an appeal from Union county.

The opinion stated that school district 67 in Union county was suspended by vote of the people within the district, who voted at the same time to provide for instruction of the pupils in district 45, but not to pay for transportation of some half dozen pupils.

This action, the opinion written by Chief Justice J. U. Campbell held, was contrary to law, since the statute makes it mandatory upon the district to provide transportation. "The school district cannot, by vote or otherwise, avoid the discharge of a duty plainly imposed upon it."

The action was brought by Garrett Rydman against the school district for payment for transporting his own children six miles to the other district. The lower court, presided over by Judge J. W. Knowles, sustained the district's demurrer and dismissed the case. The plaintiff appealed for compensation for transportation since the suspension in 1933.

Justice Campbell held the demurrer should be held overruled. The case was reversed and the cause remanded for further proceedings in compliance with the opinion.

The opinion did not pass upon the legality of the suspension of the school, which was done by vote. The only phase ruled upon was that by suspension of the district must make provision for the school children within the district, since it is the "public policy of the state to afford all children of school age a reasonable opportunity to attain, at least, a common school education."
