WOOL BEING HELD FOR HIGHER PRICES

PORTLAND, June 16 — (AP)—The Journal said today a survey indicated that about 20 per cent of the 1936 wool clip of the Pacific northwest was unsold or in warehouses.

The bulk of this supply is held by large interests which expect better prices at a later date, the survey said.

There has been some speculative and eastern mill buying at price limits which the average operator cannot meet through eastern connections, the report declared.

The recent sale of 300,000 pounds of wool of the Condon pool here was viewed as a demand for volume, the price ranging from 27 1/8 to 29 cents. None of it went to local mills.

"These prices reflect what is now actually known in the trade, that Boston representatives have had their price limits reduced," said the report. "While the reduction in possible offers is merely a fraction or so, it indicates that recent extreme values were more or less of a flash and scarcely representative."

FOUR L ASSAILED AT FEDERATION MEET

Laborites of Oregon Also Hear Court Scored for Injunction Order

KLAMATH FALLS, June 16.—(AP)—Prospects of a struggle on the floor of the Oregon state federation of labor convention increased today with the offering of controversial resolutions in connection with organization and policy.

Question of the desirability of the Four L seemed certain to draw fire. A resolution urged that the state federation denounce the organization as "inimical to the interest of workers and a menace to industrial recovery." It asked the convention to pledge its utmost endeavors to assist the organization of workers in the lumber industry independently of the Four L and to "expose the spurious nature of the Four L."

The faction fighting the Four L charged that the organization is a company union on the scale of a whole industry and that it has acted as a strike breaking organization in the workers' fight for higher wages.

A second major struggle appeared imminent over the matter of rigid neutrality and anti-war policy for the federation and the question of labor organization on the basis of industries furnished fodder for a third possible dispute.

Judge Crawford Scored A "dictatorship" by courts threatening unless their powers are curbed, Ben Osborne, executive secretary of the state federation told delegates yesterday.

He assailed what he termed "judicial usurpation" by courts and scored Judge James Crawford's injunction in the Portland auto mechanics' picketing case, Judge Hall Lusk's decision in the case of the Portland cleaning works, and recent United States supreme court decisions invalidating new deal laws.

The state labor head in his annual report called for militant defense of civil liberties, elimination of war and munitions profits, and sented general trade conditions.

The tone of the Willamette valley market was described as quiet, with the 33-cent price received in the sale of the Roseburg pool causing sheepmen to hold for higher offers.

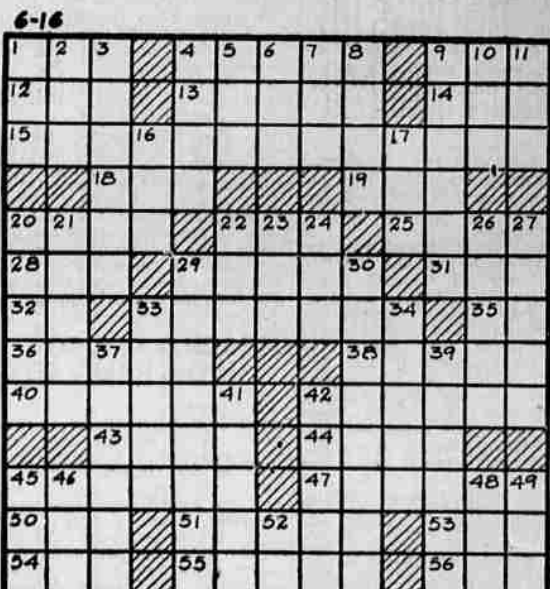
WAINSCOTT'S LEAVE ON EXTENSIVE TRIP
