

### FLOOD CONTROL AND ROAD BILLS SIGNED

WASHINGTON, June 16.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today signed the Overton bill authorizing \$272,000,000 for flood control work in the lower Mississippi valley.

Remaining before him for action was the omnibus flood control bill authorizing expenditure of more than half a billion dollars in many sections of the country, including the east, which was hard hit by floods several months ago.

The president signed 38 other bills, including one authorizing \$186,000,000 for federal aid highways in the 1938 and 1939 fiscal years.

The president's signature was placed on measures:

Authorizing him to invite foreign countries to participate in the San Francisco Bay exposition in 1939.

Providing for the care and treatment of members of the national guard, organized reserves, reserve officers training corps, and citizens military training camps who are injured or contract disease while engaged in military training.

### U. S. DEBT PASSES 34 BILLION MARK

WASHINGTON, June 16.—(AP)—Bonus bonds and treasury financing operations today had jumped the national debt up \$2,700,000,000 to a peak mark of approximately \$34,400,000,000.

The bonus bonds issued for delivery to veterans increased the debt by \$1,500,000,000. Sale of treasury obligations to supplement reserves increased the debt by \$1,200,000,000.

The treasury yesterday retired \$1,025,000,000 in maturing obligations through conversion into new obligations. The turnover of funds also included payment of \$70,000,000 in interest on the debt.

### GIGANTIC POWER OF GASOLINE REVEALED

The great trans-Pacific flying boat "China Clipper," weighing 51,000 pounds, was held in the air and transported one mile by only 6 pounds (or one gallon) of gasoline. Such is the almost unbelievable power of modern motor fuel, as now refined, according to Ted Snyder, Roseburg branch manager of General Petroleum corporation.

### COMEDIAN FIELDS GAINS IN HOSPITAL

RIVERSIDE, Calif., June 17.—(AP)—W. C. Fields, pneumonia-stricken film comedian, showed "distinct improvement" early today, Dr. Jesse Citron reported.

Fields' temperature dropped a degree to 99, the lowest since he entered Riverside community hospital last Friday for treatment.

### CIRCUS DATED FOR LEGION CONVENTION

The Gilmore circus, which is attracting widespread attention over the Pacific coast, is to be in Roseburg as a feature of the state convention of the American Legion here in August, the convention commission reports.

The circus will be shown in connection with Douglas county day, Wednesday, August 12, preceding the actual convention, which opens on the 13th.

Help from 65 high school boys and girls will be required to stage the circus, which features 11 large inflated animals and 15 comic heads. A parade will be held in the business district, and the circus will be staged at night at Finlay field.

The circus will remain in Roseburg during the convention period and will participate in parades. E. A. Britton is chairman of the committee in charge of this feature.

The Gilmore lion and clowns will be in Roseburg several days before the showing and will tour the county prior to the main show here.

### SUBSTITUTE FOR COAL BILL PASSED

WASHINGTON, June 16.—(AP)—By a vote of 161 to 99 the house today passed the Guffey-Vinson price-fixing substitute for the outlawed Guffey coal control bill.

The bill now goes to the senate, where leaders have predicted it will be acted upon before the end of this week. It already has been approved by the senate interstate commerce committee.

The most important of the new amendments adopted by the house was one limiting the life of the bill to two years instead of four.

The vote came after debate in which the measure was denounced as an obnoxious form of price-fixing and defended as essential to stabilization of the soft coal industry.

It was urged by the United Mine Workers and some coal operators in congressional hearings.

### OREGON RANCHER DIES OF GUNSHOT

THE DALLES, June 16.—(AP)—Charles A. Knowles, 75, prominent rancher of the Kingsley district of Wasco county, was found today with a wound in his head and his rifle by his side. He lived more than an hour after shot.

Police said members of his family reported he had been despondent for some time.

He is survived by three sons, Guy and Raymond of Kingsley, and Elmer of The Dalles, and a daughter, Mrs. Josie McAllister of Dufur.

He was born in Kentucky and came to Oregon when a young man.

### BRIDEGROOM OF 70 DIES AT CAR WHEEL

REXBURG, Idaho, June 16.—(AP)—Louis A. Jones, a honeymooning bridegroom of 70, died suddenly here today of a heart attack at the wheel of his car. He succeeded in stopping the automobile before he died.

Jones, a railroad engineer of Astoria, Ore., was returning to Oregon after a honeymoon trip with his wife, Mrs. Charlotte Cummings Jones. They were married three weeks ago.

Postmaster and Mrs. W. J. B. Dieckman attended the state convention of third and fourth class postmasters at Grants Pass the last of last week.

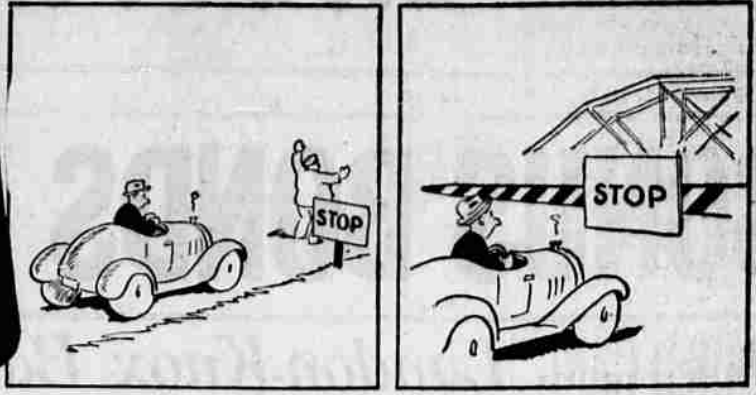

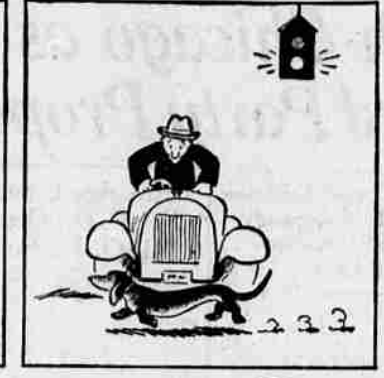

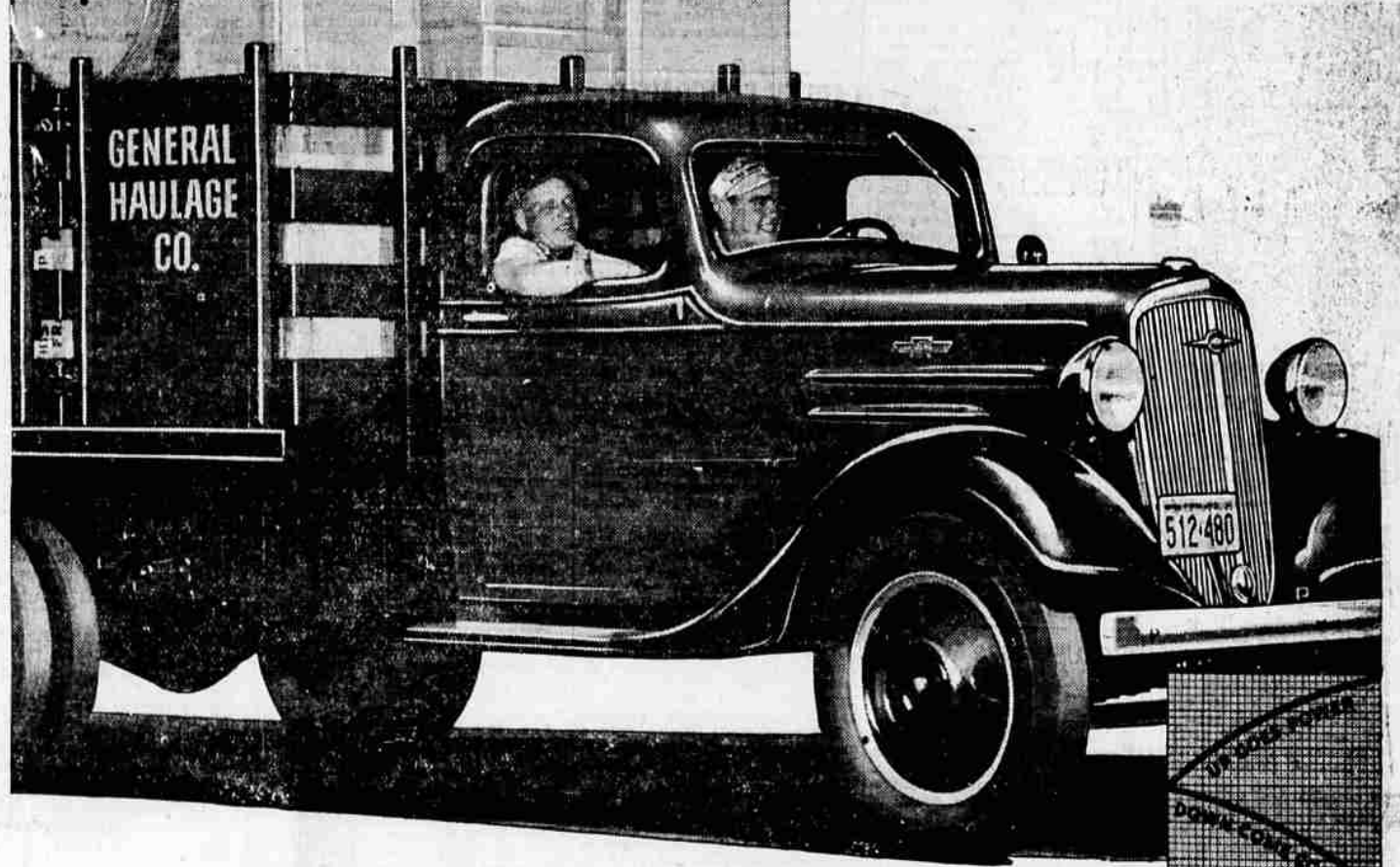
