TWO MORE PICKETS FEEL HAND OF LAW

PORTLAND, Ore., June 17.—(AP)—Circuit Judge James Crawford fined J. C. Rayburn, 23, \$250 today for contempt of an anti-picketing order at a garage here. Rayburn's attorneys filed notice of appeal.

John Welshart, 22, arrested at the same plant, was given a suspended 30-day jail sentence on contempt charges. He said he was new in the union and did not understand the injunction.

The state supreme court now is considering three separate appeals attacking the anti-picketing injunction Judge Crawford issued for three automobile plants where workers did not join in the strike of the mechanics' union.

New disorder in the auto strike was reported to police today when Mrs. Otis Hook said two bottles filled with oil crashed through windows at her home and stained walls and furniture. Her son is involved in the strike, she said.

PORTLAND NOW HAS FERRYMEN'S STRIKE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 17.—(AP)—A strike of the ferryboatmen's union tied up freight boats, tugs and pulp barges of the Western Transportation company here today.

Robert A. Hickox, secretary of the local union, said the 75 men were ordered out because the company refused to acknowledge a request for collective bargaining. The boats operate in the Portland harbor.

L. R. Gault, general manager of the Western Transportation company, branded the strike an attempt to force the Crown Williamette Paper company to employ members of the ferrymen's union to load and unload barges and freight vessels. This work, he said, has always been done by Crown Williamette employees.

SOLDIER-SAILOR BOARD ABOLISHED

SALEM, June 17.—(AP)—Governor Martin, by proclamation today, abolished the soldiers and sailors commission of Oregon as a result of the bonus payment. The formal notice stated the commission had fulfilled its mission, and the abolition will be effective August 31.

Further work involving assistance to veterans and dependents in preparing claims for pensions, bounties, or other relief from the federal government will be handled by the adjutant general of the state, the executive stated.

The commission was created in 1919. Since its creation it has spent \$121,265. Unexpended money, approximately \$3,300, will be returned to the general fund.

ARMY AIR RESERVE MEASURE SIGNED

WASHINGTON, June 17.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today signed a bill authorizing the calling of not to exceed 1,350 army air reserve corps officers to active duty for periods of not more than five years.

It provides that upon the termination of active duty of not less than three years, such reserve officers shall be paid a lump sum of \$500 in addition to regular pay and allowances.

PATRIOTIC WOMEN MEET AT MEDFORD

MEDFORD, Ore., June 17.—(AP)—Two hundred and fifty delegates to the state convention of the Daughters of Union Veterans, Women's Relief Corps, and affiliated organizations were in session here today.
