SPRECKLES MAY NEED SURGICAL PATCHING

SEATTLE, June 17.—(AP)—Dr. William C. Spedel said today Adolph B. Spreckles, 28, wealthy sportsman and member of the California sugar family, injured in a motorboat accident here Sunday, was in a "satisfactory condition."

Dr. Spedel said skin grafting might be necessary to heal the wound in Spreckles' left arm caused when he was hurled against a climbing spike of a telephone pole as his boat ran ashore.

The physician indicated plastic surgery might be necessary to restore parts of Spreckles' injured face.

ARCHEOLOGY USED AS PULPIT THEME

Evangelist Teddy Leavitt spoke Tuesday night to the largest audience yet assembled in the evangelistic campaign in progress at the First Christian church. His message was on the subject, "Archeology and the Bible," an evidential sermon showing how discoveries by archeologists have proved the authenticity of the Bible.

The speaker told how critics of past years had pointed out many historical statements in the Bible which had no apparent corroboration in profane history and were therefore declared by them to be untrue. He showed how subsequent archeological research has proven each of these statements beyond doubt and declared that no discovery had ever disproven any portion of the Bible, but, rather, that all discoveries united in supporting Biblical record.

At the close of the service eleven young people were immersed in the church ordinance of baptism.

The church is inviting the general public to attend the remaining services of the campaign which is to close soon.

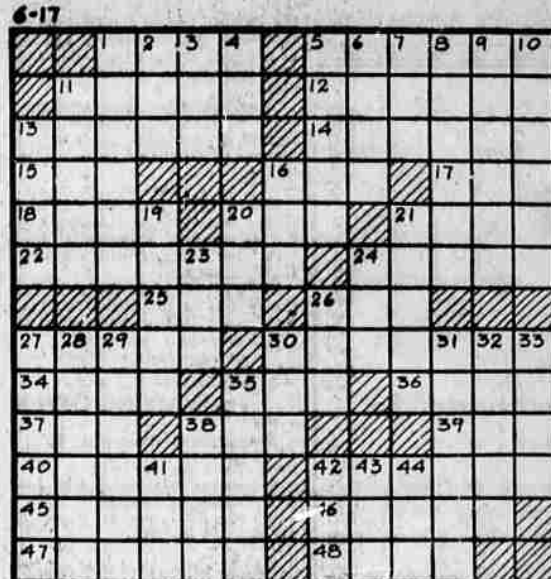
