LAKELAND, N. J., June 17.—(AP)—While Joe Louis won't predict the outcome of tomorrow's fight with Max Schmeling other than to say it won't last long, his managers, John Roxborough and Julian Black, have plenty to say.

"Joe will win in four or five rounds," says Roxborough. "He is better now than he ever was. He has developed something you never saw him use before, a right uppercut and that's the punch with which I expect him to finish Schmeling."

Adds Black: "It's my belief Schmeling will try to rush Joe and land a lucky punch in a round or two. I think it will be a quick finish. Joe can handle a rusher."

NAPANOCH, N. Y., June 17.—(AP)—After reviewing his training activities, it is evident that Max Schmeling must be in tip top condition for tomorrow's 15-round battle with Joe Louis at the Yankee stadium.

In six weeks of training Max has sparred a total of 95 rounds. He wound up his heavy work yesterday and had only five miles of road work on today's schedule. He expects to scale between 191 and 192 pounds when he weighs in at the Hippodrome tomorrow.

NEW YORK, June 17.—(AP)—While the gate for the Louis-Schmeling fight isn't expected to reach the hoped-for \$1,000,000 mark, the battle will be worth \$2.

BONUS BONDS NOW GOING TO VETERANS

Where a veteran is unable to call for the package immediately, he may send a notice to the postmaster who will hold them for any desired length of time.

In any event, where a veteran is known to have his residence here and may be expected to call for the bonds within a month's time, the bonds will be held at the local postoffice, Mr. Wimberly states. The only bonus to be re-

turned immediately will be those addressed to veterans known to have moved away.

A special office will be opened Thursday morning on the second floor of the federal building to start certifying bonds for payment. Veterans desiring to secure cash may present any number of bonds to the certifying officers.

The veteran must be able, if not personally known to the postal officer, to furnish proof of his identity. Fingerprints will be taken only in extreme cases, or where a veteran, through injury or for other reason, is unable to sign his name, the postmaster states.

Where Money Will Go
A major percentage of money received by Douglas county veterans will be spent to retire old debts and on homes, statements indicate.

A national survey made by the American Legion, shows from answers to hundreds of thousands of questionnaires, that 37 per cent of the bonus payment will go to pay off indebtedness.

Thirty-four per cent is the national figure set to be spent in the purchase, repair or improvement of homes, or the purchase of furniture, household devices, etc. It is believed this percentage will be even higher in Oregon, where, through operation of the state loan to veterans for home ownership a greater number of veterans own property than in any other state.

Six per cent is the national estimate of money to be spent for automobiles, both new and old, and for automobile accessories.

Veterans will spend 24 per cent of their bonus money for clothing for themselves and 4 per cent for clothing for other members of the family, the national survey shows.

Seven per cent will go into business investments, while 12 per cent will go for life insurance, time deposits and for personal use.

CARDINALS' LEAD IN NATIONAL CUP

The St. Louis Cardinals' National league lead was clipped to 24 games yesterday when they were kicked around 16-4 by the Boston Bees, while the second place Chicago Cubs were chalking up their 12th straight victory, 4-1, over the Phillies.

After holding Pittsburgh hitless for five innings, Mungo, Brooklyn hurling ace, was shelled from the mound under a five-run barrage that clinched a 9-2 win for the Pirates, behind Lucas' five hit pitching.

While the Dodgers were keeping a firm grip on the National league cellar, the St. Louis Browns were doing as well in the American by losing out, 9-4 to the Athletics.

In the American, the New York Yankees were trounced 8-4 by the Cleveland Indians, Lou Gehrig's two home runs, and the second place Boston Gold Sox were losing out to Sugar Cain and the Chicago White Sox, 4-2, in spite of Fox's pair of circuit smashes. The Indians' win was largely the work of Campbell, who batted out three singles on his return to active duty after a spinal meningitis attack that nearly took his life.

Winding up the program, the New York Giants returned home from an unsuccessful road trip and turned back the Cincinnati Reds 5-2 behind Hubbell's seven-hit pitching, while the Washington Senators outlasted the world's champion Tigers through ten innings, winning 9-8 on Reynolds' homer with two on in the first extra frame.
