JOHN HAMILTON, a 41-year-old country lawyer, returns to Topeka (Kansas) to receive the congratulations of Governor Landon for his successful management of the Landon campaign for the republican nomination for President.

HAMILTON CLAIMS G. O. P. TRIUMPH

NEW YORK, June 18.—(AP)—The republican party's campaign strategy in the crucial eastern states was mapped today as John D. M. Hamilton, national chairman, conferred with state leaders.

"We're going to carry the east," Hamilton predicted. "I think Roosevelt ought to carry 41 of the 48 states. I'll be rather generous about that."

The republican chairman indicated he would give special attention to swinging New York's 47 electoral votes into the republican column.

Hamilton said the party's outlook in the west had brightened since the Cleveland convention.

"The country out there is on fire," he said. "You haven't seen anything like the middle west."

"We're going to carry the mountain states and two at least on the coast, if not all three."

He said there was "no question" about republican success in New York and New Jersey.

Sanctions Lifting Leads to Uproar

JEERS GREET EDEN'S TALK IN COMMONS

Easing of Attitude Toward Italy Means Anarchy and League's End, Says Lloyd George.

LONDON, June 18.—(AP)—Prime Minister Baldwin declared in the house of commons today that collective security has failed and called for a peace alliance of Great Britain, Germany and France.

Prime Minister Baldwin warned the house: "We, as trustees of the people, ought to remember if there is a war against this country nearer than the Mediterranean, they will pay for it on the first night with their lives, the first blow may come from the air."

Saying collective security had failed, Baldwin declared: "If possible, it shall not last again. . . I regard it as of first importance that Germany, France and ourselves should work for peace throughout all Europe side by side."

LONDON, June 18.—Opposition members of the house of commons shouted "Shame! Resign!" at Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden today when he announced Great Britain would lead a move for the lifting of league of nations sanctions from Italy.

From government benches there came a little loyal cheering, but the roar of "Shame!" created turmoil in the house.

David Lloyd George, World war prime minister, declared Eden was going to Geneva to smash the league of nations and asserted:

"There is nothing but anarchy as an alternative! There will be in-

DRUNKEN DRIVER IS JAILED AND FINED

Death Takes Maxim Gorky, Noted Russian Author, Once Spurned by American Hotels as Social Outcast

MOSCOW, June 18.—(AP)—Maxim Gorky, 68, most famous of contemporary Russian writers, died today of lung complications.

Although regarded as soviet Russia's leading writer and holding office as a member of the central executive committee of soviet Russia, Gorky was not a member of the communist party.

Gorky rose to fame for his revolutionary writing. During the first year of communist power in Russia he was opposed to communism but later he became its leading propagandist.

Gorky was personally a revolutionist from his earliest years. His tender years were passed amid such bitterness that he revolted against the social order as it stood in czarist Russia, and as he grew into manhood he became a socialist.

The son of a poor journeyman upholsterer, he was left an orphan at the age of five. His grandfather, a clerk to a lawyer, a clerk to a lawyer, a clerk to a lawyer.

At an age when most boys have few greater cares than learning the alphabet Alexis became a ragpicker. Later he was an apprentice to a mechanical draughtsman, an assistant cook on a Volga river steamer, a clerk to a lawyer, a tramp on the steppes, and a day laborer.

Sometime within this succession of varied occupations he learned to read. Thereafter he disposed every book he could get hold of. This indefatigable reading and his own kaleidoscopic experiences gave him the background for his future books.

At the age of 15 he went to the university town of Kazan, imagining that an eagerness to learn and a willingness to study were the sole qualifications one needed to enter the university. He was refused admittance, and got a job in a bakery.

The unbroken misfortune that assailed the young enthusiast so preyed upon his mind that he attempted suicide in 1888 by shoot-

ing himself. The bullet remained in his body and troubled him in later years.

From almost the beginning of his literary life in 1882, Gorky worked revolutionary ideas into his books. His favorite character was the man in revolt against society. When he turned directly to anti-government socialistic propaganda he was cast several times into prison. After one term in jail at Ufa in 1905 he spent practically eight years in exile.

It was then that he made his only visit to America—the spring of 1906. At first he was met with an idol's welcome. But then society learned that the "Mme. Gorky" with whom he traveled was really "Mlle. Androleva," and treated him as a social outcast. New York hotels refused to admit him.

He went back to Europe, bitterly denouncing America. The following year, Gorky, then staying at Capri, Italy, married Mlle. Androleva.

CLERGYMAN FLAYS ALCOHOLIC TRAFFIC

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—(AP)—A clergyman presented his version of problems today at the annual convention of the Pacific Coast International Association of Law Enforcement officers.

The Rev. Mark A. Matthews of Seattle told the convention that enactment of sterilization laws as a crime prevention measure was essential in every state.

The Presbyterian pastor said there are 5,000,000 morons in the United States who are walking the streets as potential criminals because they are morally irresponsible.

He cited crime as the third largest industry in the nation.

In an interview, the Rev. Mr. Matthews said "there never was a day during the old-time, disgusting saloon period when the traffic in alcoholic beverages was as dark as it is now. . . The repeal of the 18th amendment wasn't the result of public opinion, but was accomplished through a conspiracy."

"Today the liquor interests are inviting women and girls to come into their saloon stores and taverns. In fact, in many places they advertised for women to work in these establishments. The idea of prostituting a woman to make a hellish place respectable is so revolting that these ads have been withdrawn."

Officials said the cafe proprietor was not connected with the slaying but the mob, enraged over being baffled by the officers' prompt action, raved vent to its fury by firing the scene of the crime.

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CHEATED OF PREY, MOB BURNS CAFE

EL CAMPO, Tex., June 18.—(AP)—A mob of about 200 persons, balked in an attempt to lynch nine negroes, gave up a search for their quarry today to return here and burn the cafe where a white officer was slain while trying to quiet a bonus celebration.

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THIRD PARTY PLANS HIT BY HUGH JOHNSON

Move Too Late, Can't Win, Ex-Head of NRA Says; Proponents Called 'Lunatic Fringe.'

NEW YORK, June 18.—(AP)—Hugh Samuel Johnson, the one-time NRA administrator, dusted off his 15-month-old "lunatic fringe" accusation today and plopped it in the lap of the potential third party presidential campaign to which the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin tentatively has lent his voice.

"It can't win," said the retired brigadier general in a hotel room interview. "It's too late."

He enlarged the "lunatic fringe" charge which he first flung at the following of Father Coughlin and Senator Huey P. Long in an address here March 4, 1935, to cover all divisions of an entente announced Tuesday in Chicago by the late senator's political heir, the Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith.

These, besides the Detroit priest's National Union for Social Justice and the Long-Smith Share-the-Wealth clubs, are the followers of Representative William Lemke (R., N. D.) and the pension-seeking adherents of Dr. Francis E. Townsend, Mr. Smith said.

"I certainly do consider them the lunatic fringe," Johnson declared. "No 'Danger' Seen."

In a mood different from that which marked his attack on Father Coughlin and Senator Long as "piped pipers" threatening to lead the United States into "dictatorship or chaos," Johnson said he felt that "the republican adoption of a counterfeit New Deal platform at Cleveland indicated the electorate is sanely liberal."

This, he asserted, indicated there is "no danger of its going either to a lunatic fringe of extreme radicalism."

BONUS AWAITING 44 OREGON 'CONS'

SALEM, June 18.—(AP)—The 44 prisoners at the state penitentiary who received bonus bonds ranging from \$100 to \$1,500 will be unable to cash them until they have served their terms, Warden James Lewis said today.

The bonds were placed in a safety deposit box to be turned over to the recipients when they leave.

Representatives from 13 of the 18 O. and C. land grant counties of Oregon assembled here today for a conference to consider pending federal legislation and claims of W. H. Gore for money alleged by him to be due from Kansas county for services in connection with the passage of the O. and C. bill making cash grants to counties in lieu of taxation.

While defense against the claims of Gore will be given consideration, the principal issue to be considered, it was announced by Guy Gordon, attorney for the association of land grant counties, will be the protection of tax equities of Oregon counties in the acquisition of private lands by the federal government.

Congressional legislation authorizing extension of the national forests threatens to remove large amounts of timber lands from tax rolls, Attorney Gordon stated, and steps to protect the tax equities are contemplated by the counties.

Due to late arrival of representatives from several counties, a meeting was not called to order until after a luncheon at the Umpqua hotel.

Louis-Schmeling Fight Postponed Until Tomorrow

NEW YORK, June 18.—(AP)—Rain today caused postponement of Joe Louis' 15-round heavyweight bout with Max Schmeling at the Yankee stadium until tomorrow night.

The postponement followed the weighing in of the fighters which showed Louis outweighed Schmeling by six pounds. Louis weighed 198, Schmeling 192.

Promoter Mike Jacobs said that in the event of further rain tomorrow he would try to hold the fight Saturday, possibly in the afternoon if that can be arranged.

STRIKERS ATTACK PLANT WITH GUNS

KENT, Ohio, June 18.—(AP)—Striking union employees of the closed Decker and Black Electric company, in an outburst of violence, today besieged the plant with rifle fire for nearly four hours. At least five men were wounded, one seriously.

The snipers ceased firing on orders from A. F. Wasslak, picket line captain, who said William Crayford, union president, had obtained warrants charging two score men in the plant with inciting a riot.

Wasslak with the armed strikers, estimated by Police Chief St. Clair West to number between 100 and 150, would permit the besieged men to leave, provided Sheriff E. L. Burr first "unarms them."

Crayford claimed bloodshed resulted because two moving vans occupied by about 25 men roared through company gates under a tear gas barrage affecting a score of strikers.

Observers said probably a score of sympathizers, armed with rifles, were firing at the factory from vantage points near a high fence surrounding the premises.

The plant's large water tank, plowed by bullets, was leaking. Authorities said this constituted a fire hazard.
