E. A. COLLIER GETS HIGHWAY TRANSFER

E. A. Collier, resident highway engineer, who has been in charge of the Roseburg highway district, is to be transferred to Salem to take charge of the newly created district No. 1. It was announced in Salem today by R. H. Bullock, chief highway engineer. Increased activities in the state highway department has resulted in the creation of new sectional divisions, making five instead of four districts in Oregon. The new division, which will be No. 1, includes Hood River county, Multnomah county, most of Clackamas and Columbia counties and portions of Yamhill and Washington counties. E. D. Lytle, now stationed at Bend, will move to Roseburg to replace Mr. Collier. The Roseburg district will be known as No. 2, instead of No. 2.

PROPERTY RIGHTS GRANTED BY SOVIET

MOSCOW, June 17. — (AP) — The soviet government today backed up on the provisions in its new constitution promising protection for private property with an announcement that official aid will be granted builders of private homes. Workers can obtain title to apartments in cooperative buildings either by paying cash in advance or on the installment plan. The new constitution says small private property such as homes and household equipment will be given the full protection of the law. It lists as the irrevocable property of the state only "the essential part of housing in cities and industrial centers," permitting an elastic interpretation which will open the way for large scale building of private homes. Fifteen million copies of the new constitution have been printed and are being distributed throughout the country for public discussion prior to Nov. 25, when the all-union congress of soviets will meet to give its final approval to the document.
