IN OUR county, we are prosper-ous or not depending upon the prosperity of the farmers. Actually the city of Roseburg is but a trad-ing center for the rural population. This is not an industrial city al-though we have several excellent small industries. The great bulk of the money circulated comes from the farms.

When the prune crop is good and brings a fair price, business hums. When the turkeys sell for a good price, when wool and lamba have a good market, when eggs, butterfat and the many other prod-ucts of the farms sell for good prices, we have prosperity.

Consequently it behooves all Roseburg to take a sympathetic and helpful interest in rural activ-ity. This is being done. The Rose-burg Chamber of Commerce has al-ways taken an active part in giv-ing aid in farm problems. This spring when the cauliflower crate trouble developed, the Chamber of Commerce office got into action and fought the thing through along with the growers. Various market-ing meetings and discussions are organized by the chamber.

The Roseburg Kiwanis club, through its committee on rural re-lations has carried on for years a program of fellowship designed to create a better acquaintanceship between the business and profes-sional men of Roseburg and the farm people.

All of these things indicate that the city of Roseburg is fully aware of its dependence upon the farm population for its trade. They indi-cate that Roseburg business and professional people are ready at all times to give every possible aid and cooperation to the country folks.

STILL, it is worth remembering that in another great crisis in our country's history a great lead-er came from the then raw and far Western state of Illinois.

(PERHAPS you will disagree with the statement, implied in the foregoing paragraph, that this is a critical period in our country's history. Maybe our na-tion isn't facing a crisis right now, but if our government spends as much in the next three years as it has in the past three we WILL be facing a crisis.)

THESE words are written in the city (San Francisco) and as might be expected the domination of London is the chief subject of conversation.

Business men generally (as also might be expected) are puzzled, both by the nomination of Landon, who is regarded as "safe and sound" and by the fact that the nomination was accomplished with so little friction. Business men, generally speaking, are for ANY-BODY who has a chance to beat Roosevelt.

Elsewhere than in business of-fices (on the streets, in the parks, etc.) comment is mixed. There is much harping on the fact that Hearst backed Landon, and this doesn't seem to be regarded as a Landon asset.

STILL, as one man sitting on a park bench yesterday remark-ed, Hearst backed Roosevelt in 1932 and didn't get much out of it, and if Landon is elected this fall he may not get much more.

AFTER all, what does it matter who backs candidates? What

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

TOLEDO, Ore., June 18.—(AP)—Less than one per cent of the voters eligible to cast their ballots in the Lincoln county school elec-tion returned W. M. Graves of To-le-do to the county unit school board for a five-year term. Only 13 of the 1,500 eligible appeared at the polls.

NORTH BEND, Ore., June 18.—(AP)—North Bend probably will have a walkout, protest or no protest, it appeared today. The city council in special session re-fused to rescind its action in grant-ing a license to Jimmy Johnson.

Mayor L. A. Cutlip said the con-tract for the event could not be broken easily. The ministerial as-sociation protested the walkout, the council received petitions pro and con.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—(AP)—A war veteran apparently preferred jail today to paying half his bounty to his former wife. Carl King, ordered to split his \$764.99 in baby bonds to pay up past-due claims for the support of a minor child, said:

"Either have Mr. Jackson (city jailor) sweep out a cell."

He told Circuit Judge Clarence N. Gilbert: "Judge, I served on a mine sweeper in the North Sea for tank money and I feel that I should have the right to say something about how it is paid out."

King said he earned but \$225 the past nine months.

PORTLAND, June 18.—(AP)—Two hooded men took a couple for a "walk" after robbing them of \$1. Richard Nelson said he was seat-ed in his automobile with Miss Marie Kortman in front of her re-sidence when the hooding occurred. The couple was forced to walk around the block while the pair escaped.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—(AP)—Good news went out to rain-bow-battered farmers of western Oregon that fair and warmer weather is in store for Oregon to-night and tomorrow.

The weather bureau's prediction also was welcomed by outdoor rec-reationists.

Overabundance of rain has harmed crops and delayed hay har-vesting west of the Cascades, al-though pastures generally have benefited.
