COAST LOOP RACE STILL WIDE OPEN

First and Seventh Teams Separated by Only Seven and Half Games.

Fourth of July is nearing and the Coast league baseball race is still as wide open as a western mining camp on payday. The baseball vicarage say the leader on July 4 is practically "in" as far as the season is concerned, but unless one of the leading clubs stages a terrific upset, the odds will be a failure to hold true this year.

Yesterday's games were no help in clearing the situation for the league-leading Oaks took their second trimming from San Diego, 8-3. Seattle lost a chance to move into first by losing to Los Angeles, 1-4, and the Missions strengthened their hold on third by a 9-7 triumph over Sacramento. The up-and-coming Portland Beavers downed San Francisco, 5-4, to solidify their fourth place position.

San Francisco again lost a tough luck game, Pete Coscarart's double scoring the winning run for Portland in the ninth. It was Portland's second straight over the Seals. The fifth-place Seals are only 11 games out of first, while Los Angeles, occupying seventh place, is only 7½ games behind. This is significant, since the Angels are potentially powerful, and of late have begun to show their true power. Last week they took five from the Missions, and to date have split with Seattle, so they are definitely in the pennant race.

Oakland's lead was only saved by the Angels, who hit well behind Salveson to tomahawk the striving Indians.

The Missions had to use three pitchers to subdue the pestiferous Senators. Joost combed two Sacramento pitchers for three hits including a home run and a double. The second straight win put Kamm's boys only a game and a half out of first place.

GAME AT GLENDALE IS UNDER PROTEST

GLENDALE, June 18.—Southern Oregon league officials must hand down the final decision on the baseball game which was forfeited Thursday over Grants Pass at Glendale Sunday. In the last of the tenth inning, with the score tied, 2 to 2, Grants Pass protested an umpire's decision and when they refused to play ball at the umpire's command, the game was forfeited to the Loggers. Grants Pass has filed a protest to the league president.

The game was tightly played with both teams getting four hits. Next Sunday the Loggers go to Grants Pass.

JOHN HENRY LEWIS BEATS TONY SHUCCO

ST. LOUIS, June 18.—(AP)—John Henry Lewis, Phoenix, Ariz., negro light heavyweight champion, won by a technical knockout over Tony Shucco in the eighth round of a scheduled 15-rounder here last night. Lewis' title was not at stake.

A looping right bowled Shucco over, and as he fell he injured his ankle so badly he was unable to continue. He regained his feet at the count of five, but dropped to

his knees before Lewis hit him again. Lewis was ahead by a clear margin when the referee stopped the battle, but had been warned by the referee about hitting low.

BONUS BOND WORK HERE GOES NICELY

Certification of veterans' bonus bonds for payment was put into operation in a smooth and orderly manner at the local postoffice today. It was estimated by Postmaster L. L. Wimberly that 100 or more applications would be handled at the office during the day, in addition to the large number being prepared at the veterans facility.

Postmaster Wimberly personally directed the work of the special office set up on the second floor of the federal building to handle applications, being assisted by C. B. Calkins, postal clerk. Assistant Postmaster Clyde Carstens and Clerk C. C. Miles were assigned to certification work at the veterans facility.

Veterans desiring cash for any or all of their bonds are required to present them at the certification office, where the proper application will be prepared. The application and bonds to be cashed will be forwarded to the pay-off station at Portland and a check mailed directly to the veteran's home address.

The local postoffice has so far received 588 packages of bonds for veterans in Roseburg and vicinity and at noon today all except 105 had been placed in the hands of veterans to whom they were addressed.

The additional work caused by the handling of the bonds has made it necessary to put all available substitutes assigned to the local postoffice on duty.

Mr. Neuner, who formerly practiced law in Roseburg, and who is here looking after property interests, made a general talk showing trends in improved social and economic conditions.

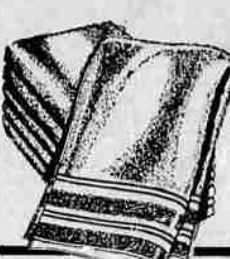
