istrations for the annual Red Cross
Learn to Swim campaign.

The Red Cross swimming cam-
paign, under the management of
Dr. H. C. Church will begin Mon-
day, weather permitting, and the
opportunity to learn to swim under
expert instruction and at almost
no cost, is at hand.

Every year hundreds of lives are
needlessly lost in this country be-
cause of lack of swimming knowl-
edge. Never a week goes by in
summer without stories of drown-
ings appearing in the newspapers.
With swimming classes available
under Red Cross management
every year, every one in this com-
munity has ample opportunity to
learn to swim.

Classes are scheduled to start
Monday with Stanley Kidder and
Edna Brown instructing. It is nec-
essary that those who wish to
sign up in any of the courses, do
so this week. Registrations are be-
ing taken at the office of Dr. H. C.
Church who says that advance
registration is necessary so that
classes can be properly organized.

Next week is "Learn to Swim
Week" here in Roseburg and young
and old should take advantage of
the instruction provided by the
Douglas county chapter of the
American Red Cross.

will be confused too. The prospect
doesn't seem conducive to clarity

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—
(AP)—The Oregon liquor control
commission revoked two beer dis-
pensing licenses, upended six for
periods ranging up to 21 days, and
denied applications for 10 addi-
tional licenses today.

Sale of liquor in half-plats will
be discontinued.

pensers charged with selling beer
to intoxicated persons were re-
voked.

A decree of divorce was granted
in the circuit court here today in
the case of Audrey H. Guard
against Donald L. Guard on allega-
tions of cruelty. They were mar-
ried December 27, 1933, at Van-
couver, Washington. The plaintiff,
represented by Attorneys John T.
and J. V. Long, was granted the
return of her maiden name, Aud-
rey H. Smith.

Both H. and Audrey were given a
decree of divorce in her suit against
Frank R. Ellison. They were mar-
ried in Roseburg September 14,
1911. The plaintiff, charging cruel-
ty, was represented by Attorney
Ray B. Compton.

NEW ROAD ASKED IN REEDSPORT AREA

Construction of a road from the
Walker ranch to South lake in the
Reedport district was requested
of the county court today by R. J.
Hubbard, W. A. Lovelace and C.
W. Deakin, residents of Reedport
and vicinity. The proposed road
would be approximately three miles
in length and would serve about
six or eight farm families who
have no outlet at present except
by boat to Lakeside.

Mr. Deakin recently purchased a
large tract of land near the lake
and is planning extensive develop-
ment if a road can be secured.
The court is to investigate the
project.

BONDS GIVEN HALF OF VETERANS HERE

Approximately one-half of the
530 World war veterans of Rose-
burg and vicinity who have re-
ceived their bonus bonds have ap-
plied for cash. Postmaster L. L. Win-
berly announced today. Certifica-
tions accepted by the postmaster
yesterday and today number 256
and included 2109 bonds for a total
value of \$105,150, an average of
\$412 for each applicant.

The Roseburg postoffice has re-
ceived 558 packages of bonds of
which number 530 have been de-
livered to the veterans to whom
addressed.

The postmaster has established
a special office on the second floor
of the federal building to handle
the task of certifying bonds for
payment. The number of applica-
tions yesterday kept the force busy
throughout the entire day, but the
work was much lighter today.

TWO 4-H MEMBERS WIN FELLOWSHIPS

WASHINGTON, June 18.—(AP)
—Miss Ruth Durrenberger of Or-
lando, Fla., and Keith Jones, of
Okanogan, Wash., today were
awarded fellowships of \$1,000 each,
providing for nine months' study
with the agriculture department,
for outstanding achievements in 4-
H club work.

The awards were made at a ses-
sion of the national encampment
of 4-H club representatives in the
capital. Recipients of the awards
must have not only an outstand-
ing 4-H club record but must have
completed a four-year college
course in agriculture or home econ-
omics.

The winners were selected from
18 applicants representing 11
states. They are not among the
150 delegates to the present en-
campment.

morning, Secretary Wallace stress-
ed the need for co-operation. He
said that in their consideration of
the constitution, the young men
and women from farms should re-
member that the preamble stipu-
lates consideration of the general
welfare.

VET-BONUS-BOOZE- NEW CAR-TRAGEDY

SALT LAKE CITY, June 18.—
(AP)—Harry Olson, 42, was charged
today with involuntary man-
slaughter in the alleged "bonus
celebration" death of his 72-year-
old mother.
The complaint against the war
veteran on which the charge is
based was signed by Traffic In-
vestigator H. E. Pierce.
He asserted the aged woman,
Mrs. Christine Olson, was run-
down and injured fatally late Tues-
day by a bonus-purchased car driv-
en by her son, allegedly intoxi-
cated.
The badly shaken ex-soldier, re-
leased under \$2,000 bail, tearfully
protested he did not remember
"much about what happened,"
but attributed "this terrible meas-
ure" to "celebration of the bonus pay-
ment."

APRIL NET PROFIT TRIPLED BY COPCO

SAN FRANCISCO, June 18.—
(AP)—California Oregon Power
company more than tripled its net
profit in April compared with the
1935 month, with \$68,348 compared
with \$21,843.
For the first 4 months of this
year the net jumped to \$268,184
from \$83,925 in the like period last
year. Operating revenues increased
sharply, and operating costs and in-
terest charges declined.
