PENNANT PROSPECTS OF TIGERS POORER

Absence of Greenberg and Cochran Keeps Champs Behind in Race.

They're tuning up the swan song of the Tiger reign in the big league baseball jungle. The experts are pretty much agreed now that even if, as when Mickey Cochran's glands and Hank Greenberg's wrist are once again in working order, only the slightest kind of pinch can save either the American league pennant or the world's title for the badly-battered Detroit club.

The Tigers are at a low ebb for the year. They've just lost their sixth straight start, equalling their longest losing streak in three seasons, and with the Yankees' pounding power and the Red Sox' million dollar lineup hitting their stride as July 4 approaches, it seems a miracle is necessary to bring the Detroiters in.

The surprising Washington Senators made it three straight over Detroit yesterday with a 12-4 win, to put the Tigers 11 games off the pace of the New York Yankees. And with a three-game series with New York, and another with the Red Sox in the immediate offing, the outlook is anything but rosy.

Gehrig Leads Swatters
The Yankees are in Detroit starting today, with three fresh wins over the Cleveland Indians in their bags. The last was chalked up yesterday by a 6-5 count, as Sluggo Lou Gehrig hammered a homer, two doubles and a single to go to the head of the big league batting parade with a .399 average.

The Yankees' victory boosted their league lead to 4½ games over the Red Sox, who were handed a 1-0 trouncing by Whitehead's three-hit hurling for the Chicago White Sox. These results left the Senators, in third place, but sank the Tigers to just one percentage point above the fifth place deadlock between the Indians and White Sox. The St. Louis Browns drew near to their exit from the league cellar by outclubbing the Athletics, 7-2. Meantime the St. Louis Cardinals' lead in the National league was put on the fire. The Boston Bees, who have had their stingers working this week, made it three out of four over the Cards with a 4-0 shutout.

With the second-place Chicago Cubs rained out in Philadelphia, the Cards' edge was sliced to a 4-0 shutout.

GLENDALE WINS ON PROTESTED GAME

GLENDALE, Ore., June 18.—A letter has been received by the manager of the Glendale Loggers from the president of the Southern Oregon Baseball League, in reply to the protest filed by the Grants Pass Merchants against the umpire's decision on an altercation at first base, during last Sunday's game. The umpire's statement, "the players were in position and ready to play, but their manager, Ken Williams, would not allow them to play because the altercation at first base was not settled to his satisfaction" was upheld by President Gordon MacCracken, who answered as follows: "The umpire, according to his statement, gave Grants Pass ample opportunity to resume the game after his decision had been made. This Grants Pass refused to do. The umpire then forfeited the game to Glendale as was within his rights. Your protest then must be disallowed and the decision of the umpire sustained."

The above decision makes a three-way tie for first place in the league between Grants Pass Merchants, Klamath Red Sox and the Glendale Loggers.
