AGED MAY PLEDGE PERSONAL PROPERTY

SALEM, June 20.—(AP)—Personal property may be pledged to secure repayment of money advanced for old age assistance, should the state relief committee so desire, Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle ruled today.

The statute does not make property pledges mandatory, Van Winkle held, but left it discretionary with the committee. The opinion was sent to Elmer R. Goudy, state relief administrator.

In a second opinion today Van Winkle held that peddler's licenses are required of bakery manufacturers and distributors when those firms sell their own product from "door to door."

OREGON PRISONER SAID ESCAPED 'CON'

THE DALLES, Ore., June 20.—(AP)—Sgt. Frank Grimm, of the state police, said today that a man arrested June 16 has been identified through fingerprints as Riley Herndon, alias Roy Hill, who escaped from the Florida state prison, where he was serving a life term for murder, on May 1.

McKENZIE PASS TO BE OPEN MONDAY

SALEM, June 20.—(AP)—The state highway commission today reiterated its announcement that the McKenzie pass, blocked by snow during the winter would be opened to traffic Monday. No traffic will be routed that way, however, until that time.

The commission stated many inquiries had been received concerning the condition of the pass for travel between Bend and Eugene over the weekend. To this commission announced that the "pass will be closed until Monday." Snow plows were at work on the highway bridge today.

12 CHILDREN DIE WHEN BOAT UPSETS

LUBEC, Me., June 20.—(AP)—Bewildered, grief stricken parents arranged today to bury 12 Lubec school children, drowned when a small boat upset in windswept Lake Gardner, 20 miles from here. The tragedy broke up the annual picnic of children from five Lubec elementary schools yesterday. Only five of the 17 occupants of a 14-foot dinghy, powered by an outboard motor, escaped death. More than 150 pupils, teachers, parents and friends who made up the picnic party watched, horror stricken and helpless, as an sudden gust of wind capsize the little boat.
