

WINNING STREAK OF CUBS BROKEN AT 15

Brooklyn, in Cellar, Turns Trick Behind Fine Mound Work of Mungo.

The peeling winning streak of the Chicago Cubs, like all good things, has come to an end, but lingering on is the evidence that Charley Grimm and company are more than ever the outfit to beat in the National League pennant wars.

After four other clubs had failed, it took the lovely Brooklyn Dodgers, deep in the cellar, to stop the Cubs' victory run at 15 straight yesterday, with Mungo, one-man revolution and Dodger "boat" of only last week, cast in the role of hero.

But, with the league-leading Cardinals' pitching staff, except for Dizzy Dean and possibly Roy Parmelee, growing weaker and weaker, the Cubs' 24-week winning streak, and its accompanying tight hurling and heavy hitting, makes the Windy City clouters the pick of the circuit, with odds slightly above 2 to 1.

The Cubs went down fighting yesterday, losing 6-4 in the nightcap of a twin bill on the strength of two three-run spurges by the Brooklyn, after Curt Davis had turned in a neat 5-hit pitching job to take the opener 7-2.

Lead Chance Lost

By losing the second game, the Cubs missed out on a chance to break into the league lead, for the Cardinals got their ears pinned back by the Giants for the second straight day, dropping a 6-4 decision when Jackson's homer with two on sewed up the New York victory.

As it was, the Cubs stayed a halfgame back in second place, just a game in front of the bounding Pittsburgh Pirates, who nosed out the Phillies 7-4 in a battle of homers in which Vaughan hammered out a pair.

A homer also decided the other National league game, with Berger clubbing the four-bagger to give the Boston Bees their series over the Reds with a final 3-2 win.

Tigers Beat Yanks

The Yankees, meantime, were dropping their second straight decision to the supposedly slipping Detroit Tigers, 7-4, despite Di Maggio's home run. The loss, however, only cut a halfgame off the Yanks' five-game American league lead, since the second-place Red Sox could get no better than an even break in their double bill with the cellar-dwelling St. Louis Browns, who won the nightcap 6-3, after Ferrell turned in the day's best pitching performance in the opener, allowing but two hits in a 3-0 shutout.

Detroit's victory over the Yanks boosted the Tigers into a fourth-place tie, as the Cleveland Indians trounced the Senators 8-3 to drop them out of a third-position deadlock. Rounding out the program, the Athletics, after hearing that their old teammate, Dykes, had just resigned as White Sox manager, clouted his Chicago club 11-5.

DUST AND DRYNESS FORCE CATTLE SALE

BROADBENT, Mont., June 22.—(AP)—Waterless water holes, dust storms and increasing insect pests were reported to be forcing southeastern Montana stockmen to dump their cattle onto the market or rush them into areas where water is available.

Dense dust storms enveloped Broadbent like a fog for three days last week as cowboys and not-men crickets apparently increased in number.

Reports from the surrounding sparsely settled territory said stockmen are selling their cattle and rushing them to railroad points by truck as water holes on the range are dry.

LINN COUNTY CROPS HEAVILY DAMAGED

ALBANY, June 22.—(AP)—County Agent Floyd C. Mullen said rains and winds have so battered vetch and pea crops in this area that many farmers have abandoned harvest plans and are signing up for soil conservation work binding them to plow under the legumes. Hay and peaches also have been damaged.

CHILD WELFARE IS KIWANIS OBJECTIVE

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(AP)—Members of Kiwanis International launched four days of conferences on child welfare, education and government efficiency as their annual convention opened.

The Oregon delegation was prominent in the Pacific northwest district division headed by Irwin H. Jones, of Wenatchee, Wash., governor.

Oregon lieutenant governors were Fred E. Schmidt, Pendleton; C. O. Gengelbach, Portland; Dr. John G. Manning, McMinnville, and Dr. E. J. Wainwright, Roseburg.

"America is a land of plenty and opportunity," President Harry Truman of Madisonville, Ky., told the delegates. "We have the necessary capital, land, building materials, skilled labor, leadership and courage for complete recovery."

"We have seen years of depression, but recovery is here. New clubs and new members have brought manpower to Kiwanis and we will go ahead with greater achievements."

General Secretary Fred C. W. Parker of Chicago, said Kiwanis must "be responsive to present day social, economic and governmental problems" and "educate members in public affairs and the solution of problems."

"This is not politics; it is militant citizenship," he said.

FINLAY FIELD NEEDS VOLUNTEER LABOR

BEAVERS IN SIGHT OF LEAGUE'S LEAD

Double Victory Over Seals Puts Portland in Third Place in Race.

Surging upward on a winning streak which gained 12 victories in the 14 starts, the Portland Beavers stormed into third spot today, less than a half game from the Seattle Indians and San Francisco Missions.

The Beavers climaxed a rip-snorting week by trouncing the San Francisco Seals, 7-2 and 8-4, in a Sunday doubleheader to sweep the series with the loss of only one game.

Portland's rise from a poor fifth two weeks ago to within striking distance of the league lead, has been the result of fine pitching and dandy clouting by the supporting cast of players. In Sunday's games the Beavers pounded out 22 hits including a homer and three doubles by Holt, while Posedel and

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Flynn restricted the Seals to 13 scattered blows. Liska rescued Flynn in the second game when the Seals made their four runs in the seventh, but the Portland lead was too big to overcome. Saturday night Ginter blanked the Seals with four hits.

Seattle and the Missions remained in a first place tie when both suffered twin defeats in series finals. The Indians lost to the re-awakened Los Angeles club 5-2, 5-1, and Sacramento's Senators, strengthened by new players, overcame the Missions 10-5, 3-0. San Diego completed the rout of Oakland, winning a doubleheader 20-1, and 3-2.

Seattle lost valuable ground against the Angels, who wound up the week in hostile ground with the odd-game margin in the series.

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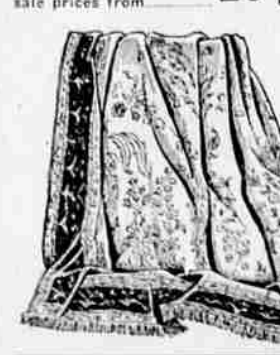
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
