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NORTHWEST TOPS RESOURCES ZONES

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—(AP)—Marshall N. Dana, who resigned Saturday from the national resources board, said today the study and research of the northwest planning commission has shown Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho to warrant "a progressive and liberal policy" of national development.

He said the four states were the richest of any in natural resources, contained more than one-half of the saw timber in the United States and more than two-fifths of controllable water power.

Dana's resignation automatically relieved him of his duties as chairman of the northwest regional planning commission.

He said the northwestern states "need have no fear" that they will not be developed, that there would be markets for all the power produced, and that regional planning surveys had been and would continue to be invaluable in ascertaining and bringing to the attention of the nation the resources of the four commonwealths.

OREGON CITY, Ore., June 23.—(AP)—A lustily swung baseball bat cracked Walter Chapman, 28, on the head, fracturing his skull. Hospital attendants said he was expected to recover from the accident.

PORTLAND, June 22.—(AP)—Federal Judge John McNary upheld the constitutionality of the Taylor grazing law today in ruling against eastern Oregon sheep men accused of violating the federal measure.

Defendants were Joe Odago and Clato Achabail. "All public lands are held in trust for the benefit of the whole country," Judge McNary held. The act (Taylor grazing) does not delegate legislative powers but creates administrative duties.

"The setting of boundaries to prevent over-grazing and soil deterioration are matters of detail and are necessary subjects of inquiry and determination by administrative officers."

CORVALLIS, June 23.—The cost walnut control board will propose several changes in the walnut marketing agreement at a public hearing in Berkeley, Calif., June 24, extension service officials here said today.

Establishment of a new surplus percentage, new methods of handling surpluses, bonding of packers and altering grade specifications will be proposed.
