BONDING COMPANY

PAYS ANN HEWITT

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23 (AP)—Ann Cooper Hewitt, 21-year old sterilized heiress, has received more than \$150,000 in an out-of-court settlement from the company which bonded her mother, Mrs. Maryon Cooper Hewitt, as guardian in the girl's interest in Peter Cooper Hewitt's huge estate.

Assessed by Tyler, Ann's attorney, confirmed today that payment had been made by the United States Fidelity and Guaranty company of Maryland, which had bonded Mrs. Hewitt's guardianship for about \$200,000.

"It must be understood, of course," said Tyler, "that this payment is only one small part of the litigation, and in no way affects Ann's suit against her mother for sterilization damages, or her suit in New Jersey against guardians of the Hewitt trust fund."

The money involved in litigation is variously estimated by opposing attorneys at from \$1,500,000 to \$10,000,000.

BUSENBARK TO ACT
IN CONTRACT QUIZ

SALEM, June 24.—(AP)—The "open end contract" used by processors and canneries in signing up tonnage of berries and prunes will be acted by a committee of five named by Governor Martin here at the request of growers who said they believed such contracts unfair.

The initial meeting of the new investigating committee will be held at Salem July 2, the governor's office announced. Those named were John Ramage of Woodburn; Dave Busebark of Roseburg; Paul Carpenter of Corvallis; Louis Hurner of Carlton and L. H. McBee of Dallas.

Solon T. White, director of agriculture, explained the "open end contract" as one in which the produce is contracted for without a definite price, that figure to be set by the purchasers based upon current markets.

In addition to an investigation of the contracts the committee was instructed to study grades and standards of prunes; make a general inspection of the prune industry; practices of canners in receiving and culling green fruits at the canneries; study this season's estimated prune tonnage, including the carry-over from 1935; and to work with the department of agriculture in a survey of the entire berry and fruit industry.

HOUR CHANGED FOR
FINLAY FIELD WORK

Volunteer workers who will aid in improvements to Finlay field Thursday night, are asked by Fred Hartung, chairman of the grounds committee, to report to the field at 7 p. m., instead of 6 p. m., as previously announced. Arrangements have been made to use the lights, if needed, making it possible to start the work at a more convenient hour.

Much hand work was eliminated yesterday, when the use of a power scraper was obtained to completely scrape the surface of the entire field. The grass and weeds have been removed, and work Thursday will consist largely of filling and leveling. It is desired to secure a large number of workmen in order that the task may be quickly and easily completed.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 24.—(AP)—Angling in Diamond lake and the Rogue river improved the past week, fishermen reported.

The best trout fishing in the Rogue was in the upper section above Trail and Prospect near its mouth, the Rogue cleared enough to permit successful salmon trolling.
