DEMOCRATS WILL JUNK TWO-THIRDS RULE

on the
Day's News

AS THESE words are written, this paragraph comes over the wires from Philadelphia, where the Democratic national convention is just getting under way:

"Welcoming the New Deal as the paramount campaign issue, the opening session of the Democratic convention trained its guns on Landon and Knox today and paid its respects, indirectly, to Alfred E. Smith."

THE attack on Landon and Knox, of course, means nothing. It is old stuff. To the assembled and cheering Democrats at Philadelphia, Landon and Knox are the wicked opposition. If they should be elected, these now cheering Democrats would lose their jobs and their power.

Nobody can blame them for whooping it up when Chairman Farley, in the good old Tammany manner, goes after the leaders of the hated opposition.

That is what they are there for.

BUT THE attack on Al Smith is another matter, showing plainly how the old party lines have broken down in this campaign.

Al Smith is one of the old-time stalwarts of Democracy, a former nominee for the Presidency, a fellow Tammany member with Jim Farley. But he has turned against the New Deal, so the New Deal convention is ready to turn upon him and rend him.

It isn't Republican and Democrat in this campaign. It is New

BILLS ON STRIKES
AND ARMY SIGNED

WASHINGTON, June 25.—(AP)—Legislation against strike-breaking, and for expansion of the army air corps, topped a list of 55 bills signed into law today by President Roosevelt.

His signature made it a felony to transport, in interstate or foreign commerce, persons to be employed to obstruct or interfere with the right of peaceful picketing in labor controversies.

Another measure which he signed, authorizing purchase of additional airplanes by the army air corps, is intended to bring the force up to 4,000 fighting planes within five years.

Other approved bills included:

A measure for the control of grasshoppers.

One authorizing the establishment of a game management laboratory.

A bill restoring pension cuts for a number of veterans in the regular army.

In the big stack of legislation still on his desk unsigned were the ship subsidy bill and the Walsh-Healey bill, calling for wage and hour specifications in contracts for government supplies.

Landon in Humorous Mood as He
Responds to Welcome in Colorado

DENVER, June 25.—(AP)—Gov. Alf M. Landon of Kansas, republican presidential nominee, arrived in Denver today with his family to start his Colorado vacation.

Carefully avoiding discussion of any political issues, Landon joked casually with reporters at a brief press conference in the Denver union depot.

The presidential nominee perched on the edge of a table and smilingly parried reporters' efforts to obtain comment on the Democratic national convention in Philadelphia.

"When a woman reporter asked, 'will there be any women in your cabinet?' he responded with a grin, 'Yes, Mrs. Landon.'"

Would he use worms or flies when he fishes the streams near Estes park where he will spend the next 10 days?

JAP AFFRONT
TO AMERICANS
STIRS PROTESTU. S. Demands Explanation
of Bayonet Thrusts by
Soldiers to Clear
Peiping Walks.

PEIPING, June 25.—(AP)—Protest against the "rude, rough treatment" of American citizens during a military display Tuesday was lodged with the Japanese embassy today by Nelson T. Johnson, United States ambassador to China.

The official protest, complaining of the activities of Japanese soldiers, was made on instructions from Washington.

The Japanese embassy replied it would submit the complaint to the Japanese commandant and make a formal answer later.

(Chinese reports told of Japanese soldiers, armed with bayonets, pushing foreigners, including an American, from the roads and sidewalks as 3,000 Japanese troops marched to an army demonstration.)

(The American involved was Capt. Henry S. Jernigan, attached to the United States embassy as a language student. The cavalry officer, in civilian clothes, was reported to have pushed aside a Japanese bayonet to avoid being injured. A French woman was also reported to have been shoved into a muddy gutter.)

Ambassador Johnson's complaint did not name the Americans involved and the embassy declined to disclose them, but one was presumed to be Captain Jernigan. The other was believed to be a woman who was reported threatened with a sword by a Japanese officer to force her from the pavement on a legation street, while Japanese soldiers were marching.

France Also Protests

The French embassy also made representations concerning the unceremonious handling of the wife and child of an officer attached to the French embassy.

All the incidents occurred at a time when virtually the entire legation quarter was under occupation by Japanese troops, who for reasons unstated were posted outside the United States, German, French, Soviet and Belgian embassies and at foreign banks in the quarter.

Ever since the arrival of reinforcements last week, the Japanese soldiers have paraded noisily and daily through the legation quarter, with trumpets blaring, apparently for the purpose of im-

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Roseburg Milk
Price to Go Up
Cent Per Quart

Roseburg milk consumers will pay one cent more per quart for their milk supply after July 1, V. F. Applegate, inspector for the Roseburg milkshed reports, following his return from Portland, where he has been meeting with the Oregon milk control board.

Following a recent series of meetings in all principal cities of the state, the control board has worked out a uniform milk price for the entire state and has issued new regulations covering the standardized control program. The new order goes into effect the first of the month.

All producers and distributors of the Roseburg area are to meet at 1 p. m. Friday at the chamber of commerce office in Roseburg for a discussion of the new rules of the state board. Copies of the orders and regulations are being mailed. Mr. Applegate reports, to all dealers, producers, distributors and others holding licenses in connection with the production, distribution and sale of milk.

CHILDREN CAUSE
\$10,000 FIRE LOSS

MOUNT PLEASANT, Utah, June 25.—(AP)—Three children played with fire today and it threatened to burn down the town.

Their potato roast fire spread from a corral to a dozen barns and sheds in this central Utah village, destroying chickens and livestock, hay and grain supplies and farm machinery. Firemen from neighboring towns were needed to quell the blaze. Damage was placed at \$10,000.

IDAHO MAN SHOOT
WIFE, KILLS SELF

CALDWELL, Idaho, June 25.—(AP)—L. A. Booth, 42, Nampa Locksmith, is dead and his widow is suffering from gunshot wounds, the result of what Sheriff Frank Piersall described today as an attempted murder and suicide. Mrs. Booth may recover.

Booth returned home about 10 o'clock this morning. Piersall said he fired at Mrs. Booth as she lay in bed, she sheriff said, using a revolver. He then shot himself.

STATE RELIEF
'MUSTS' COME
FROM MARTINFive-Point Program Issued
to Committee Imposes
Limit on Spending,
Bans Loafers.

PORTLAND, June 25.—(AP)—Embattled members of the state relief committee declared today that the relief program will halt in July unless Governor Charles H. Martin permits indebtedness certificates to be drawn against anticipated liquor profits.

Governor Martin, who said yesterday he would attend today's meeting here, received sharp rebukes from several committee members for sending his executive secretary instead.

Wallace Wharton, the governor's executive secretary and director of the budget, read a lengthy statement outlining the governor's position and issuing a five-point program under which the governor directed the commission to operate.

The program:

Expenditures of state funds for relief, exclusive of old age and blind assistance, must be kept within \$1,800,000 a year, the amount expected from liquor profits.

Relief must be given only to those unable to work.

Expenditures must be on a proportionate basis to the actual funds available.

The committee shall incur no indebtedness to pass on to taxpayers. The committee must keep administrative costs low and make material reduction in the present administrative costs.

PROGRESS OF
UPPER RIVER
HIGHWAY EYEDSummer Extension of More
Than 5 Miles Expected
on North Umpqua
Road Project.

From five to seven miles of new road should be added to the eastern end of the North Umpqua highway during the coming summer, according to members of the county court, who this week inspected the road work being done in the Diamond lake area.

The court went to Diamond lake Monday and the judge, commissioners and engineer were guests of the forest service at Big Camas Monday night.

Tuesday an inspection was made of the two miles of completed road westward from Big Camas and of the route for the extension.

From the end of the existing road for a distance of seven miles the construction is easy, the members of the court report, and the new grade should be completed this season. The most difficult part of the job is the clearing of right of way, the court states, and as soon as the ground is cleared the grading can be done with bulldozers and tractors, with but little hand-work necessary.

Side Camp Planned.

A side camp of from 30 to 40 men will be maintained at Big Camas by the CCC company at Diamond lake, and the men will work almost exclusively on the North Umpqua road, unless called into service as fire fighters.

It is the hope of the court that the seven miles of grading in contemplation will be completed this season.

The Steamboat crew, working eastward, will have much harder going, as the grading there is almost entirely heavy rock work.

However, if both camps can put out efficient work during the season there should be only six to eight miles remaining to build after this year, the court states.

INJUNCTION BARS
PORTLAND PICKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—A permanent injunction barred picketing of three Portland automotive firms today.

Circuit Judge Crawford made the previous temporary restraining order permanent on agreement by attorneys. The case is on appeal to the state supreme court.

The three firms established there was no quarrel between the companies and their employees. The mechanics' strike was called off Tuesday but union leaders said the concerns affected by the injunction remained on the "unfair list."

DIES IN ROSEBURG

Charles Ogle Pyle, 50, died here last night at the home of his sister, Mrs. John Lewis. He was born in Hartford, Iowa, October 12, 1885, and made his home in Roseburg since 1925. A surviving brother, Aden R. Pyle, lives in Hartford.

The body was removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors and is being prepared for shipment to Hartford for burial. The body will be accompanied by Mrs. J. F. Opald and Mrs. Verna Zimmerman, nieces of the deceased.

Plans for Oregon's New Capitol

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—Architects began preparation of working drawings and specifications for the new statehouse today after the preliminary plans were considerably altered and approved by the Oregon capitol reconstruction commission.

The addition of east and west end entrances and the addition of numerous windows were the only exterior changes.

The main interior changes were continuance of the previous dead-end main floor corridor the entire length of the building to connect with the new east and west floorways, elimination of four of the nine suggested elevators and rearrangement of many rooms.

Economic Recovery Retarded by
Supreme Court Rulings, Senator
Robinson Tells Demo Convention

PHILADELPHIA, June 25.—(AP)—A ringing summons to democrats to "advance to the battle of 1936" with confidence that "the voters of the nation will not turn back to the defeated and disheartened leadership" of the republicans was made last night by Senator Joseph E. Robinson to the Democratic national convention.

Addressing the gathering in his role as permanent chairman, the senate leader of his party assailed the republican platform and presidential candidate, defended the democratic record and asserted that supreme court decisions "have had the effect of slowing up national recovery."

Robinson, the running mate of Alfred E. Smith in 1928, did not refer to the statement by Smith and four others urging the convention to turn away from Roosevelt and nominate a "genuine democrat."

The Arkansas senator said that Governor Alf M. Landon, the republican presidential nominee, had "indicated a disposition to bolt on five or more subjects on which his platform had spoken."

He said this was the first time

that had been done in American history and that "the principal concern" of the republican convention "was to reconcile its candidates with the declarations embraced in its platform."

Says Pledges Redeemed

Contending that the Roosevelt administration had "faithfully complied with the spirit of the Chicago platform promises," Robinson concluded with a fervid pronouncement that the democrats entered the campaign "on our record of pledges honestly redeemed, of services faithfully performed and under as gallant a leadership as ever raised a political banner."

Any "partial departure as to the letter of the planks in that platform relating to economy and balancing the budget," he attributed to "constantly changing conditions and necessities, and to the guerilla warfare of the republican party."

Court "Blunders" Decried

Robinson said that "in spite of" the supreme court rulings "the American people are going forward."

SCOUT, 4-H CAMP
IN JULY PLANNED

The Roseburg Kiwanis club, co-operating with E. A. Britton, county club agent, will sponsor a 4-H summer camp at the Boy Scout camp on Wolf Creek, July 5 to 12, it was announced today.

The camp will be open to any boy of 10 years of age or more. It is not required that he be a club member. Each boy, however, will be required to enroll in a 4-H club or project at the camp.

Boys will be required to furnish their own food and to pay a fee of \$2 toward camp expenses. If the full amount of cash is not used, the balance will be prorated back to those attending. Each boy attending will be expected to arrange his own transportation to and from camp.

The courses to be taught will include camp cooking, first aid, swimming and outdoor recreation.

FATHER KEENAN
DIES OF INJURIES

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—Father Thomas V. Keenan, pastor of the Holy Cross church of Portland, died in a hospital here today as a result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident several weeks ago.

The pastor formerly was a member of the state parole board and chaplain of the state prison.

He was injured May 5 when a car went over a bluff near the University of Portland. Father Michael Mulcaire and Father John Tiernan, both University of Portland instructors, were injured in the same mishap but have recovered.

COMPROMISE
REACHED WITH
DIXIE STATESSuggested Planks to Alter
Constitution Rejected;
Oregon, Idaho Join
in Demands.

PHILADELPHIA, June 25.—(AP)—A dogged but diplomatic new deal leadership labored productively today to clear the way for renomination of Roosevelt and Garner, achieving a death sentence for the two-thirds rule by compromise and approaching agreement on a platform to be presented to the Democratic convention tonight.

Suggested planks for constitutional amendment to fortify federal powers were rejected in a policy subcommittee, while the rules committee voted unanimously with a bow to the south—to recommend reappointment of the presentation in future conventions.

Both stands were expected to get before the convention itself for action in the evening session. The poorly attended day meeting was brief and barren of major action.

Attention of the constitution in the platform was expected to infer, at least, that new deal difficulties in the supreme court result from interpretations of the document, not its scope. All planks were kept secret.

Minority Placated

An implacable southern minority in the rules committee forced a concession, if the 104-year-old nominating rule is to be abrogated tonight, as expected.

Outvoted 36 to 13 in committee, they obtained the unanimous consent of a subcommittee for the recommendation of a plan whereby by convention representation in the future would be apportioned on a basis of democratic strength in the states instead of total population as now.

Southern friends of the two-thirds requirement said there would be no minority report by them; but a minority report on endorsement of the Townsend plan in the platform was still discussed in the Washington state delegation.
