ESTATE FACES TAX CLAIM OF MILLION

CHICAGO, June 25.—(AP)—Although the death of Arthur W. Cullen, famous market trader, wiped out federal charges of income tax evasion, his estate today faced a tax and penalty claim totaling almost \$1,000,000.

A few hours after the 66-year-old "fiddle giant" of the grain pits died yesterday of heart disease, Assistant U. S. District Attorney Carl R. Perkins said the criminal charges would be stricken but that civil action would be started in an effort to collect \$644,469 in payments and \$322,235 in penalties for 1929, 1930 and 1933.

Callen is head of the department of mining and metallurgical engineering at the University of Illinois.

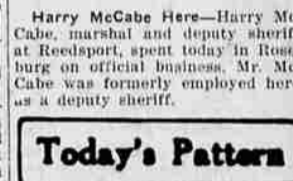

PROPERTY MUDDLE CONFRONTS EUGENE

EUGENE, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—Numerous errors, arising from the old city lien docket, threatened today to plunge the city into a controversy involving the city council, city treasurer's office and makers of abstracts.

Many people have made complaints, stating they had received bills for street and sewer assessments which date back many years and of which they were entirely unaware. In other instances persons have received bills for claims against property which they never owned or on properties long since sold under title supposedly entirely clear.

In some instances the city has been obliged to waive the interest on the claims and in a few cases it has waived the entire claim. The situation, according to some city officials, is confusing and is plunging the city administration into an expensive and troublesome muddle.

The newly discovered delinquent liens which now confront many property owners have been unearthed through an engineer's audit of the lien docket in 1935.

While City Treasurer Fred Wentworth said the percentage of errors in the assessments was relatively small, Councilman Sam Bond placed the blame squarely on the treasurer's office, declaring:

"The difficulty, as I see it, is due to mistakes made in the treasurer's office."

Pointing out he had requested an audit when he took office two years ago, City Recorder Cal Bryan placed blame for the muddle on the council for permitting a million dollar business to go for ten years without an audit.

VETS CASH NEARLY FOURTH OF BONUS

WASHINGTON, June 25.—(AP)—Postal officials estimated today that more than a half billion dollars was paid to veterans this week on bonus bond trade-ins.

C. B. Ellenberger, third assistant postmaster general, said most veterans were apparently cashing part of their bonds, and keeping part as an investment. The bonds will draw interest at three per cent a year.

With reports of 1,574,000 veterans applying for cash up to last Saturday in 119 of the 248 paying postoffices, Ellenberger said indications were that most of the 3,000,000-old veterans who received their bonus "baby" bonds last week had applied for cash on at least part of their bonds.

The half-billion dollars paid out is slightly less than one-quarter of the total value of the bonds.

STORM DOES BIG DAMAGE IN BAKER

BAKER, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—A terrific rain, hail and wind storm that struck this section Wednesday afternoon filled roads with debris, ruined small trees, killed chickens and flooded vegetable gardens in many sections of Baker county.

A total of 54 of an inch of rain fell in Baker following a strong wind storm.

Much hay in Baker county, cut and drying in the field in preparation for stacking, was soaked by the down-pour.
