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FLASHES OF OREGON EVENTS

TILLAMOOK, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—State police opened the racks at the Frank river hatchery to release agitated steelhead which were striking the racks in their anxiety to return to the ocean.

Chinook salmon now coming up the river will be trapped and their eggs taken.

McMINNVILLE, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—A resolution asking the state fish commission to plant more cutthroat trout in coastal streams won the approval of the Yamhill county chapter of the Izank Walton League.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—Horace A. Dryer, president of the Portland realty board, said today work of obtaining a tax limitation measure on the November ballot is going forward rapidly. The petitions must be filed by July 1.

LOW RATE ON FARM LOANS CONTINUED

WASHINGTON, June 25.—(AP)—The farm credit administration said today that the three and one-half per cent interest rate would be continued for one year on \$2 million of outstanding federal land bank loans.

This was announced as the result of President Roosevelt's signing of a congressional resolution amending the farm credit act and the federal farm loan act.

Officials said that, in addition to outstanding obligations, all loans negotiated between now and June 30, 1937, will bear the three and one-half per cent rate. Loans will be written at four per cent, they added, but the new legislation provides an emergency rate of three and one-half per cent for the next fiscal year.

Under terms of the farm credit act the interest rate was to have been stepped up to four and one-half per cent at the end of the fiscal year and subsequently to five or six per cent.

The decision to continue the three and one-half per cent rate was said to have been based on the contention that the emergency period still exists in farm financing.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—Dr. Frederick Stricker, state health officer, has issued a statement advising those working in tick-infested areas to submit to vaccination to avoid infection. Twenty-four cases of tick bite or Rocky mountain spotted fever have been reported to the state board of health this year. Dr. Stricker advised instant removal of ticks, with care not to crush the tick to permit entrance of infective virus.

MEDFORD, Ore., June 25.—(AP)—Gerald Vance, 19, wanted by California authorities for participation in a hold-up and murder at Laguna, Calif., a week ago, was arrested Tuesday afternoon by Sheriff Syd L. Brown, and is held for California officials. Vance was arrested on the J. Thorneley orchard in the Central Point district, where he was employed. Sheriff Brown said that Vance admitted his part in the crime, and had waived extradition.

FUNDS LISTED FOR 3 OREGON BUILDINGS

DI MAGGIO HITS 2 HOMERS IN 1 FRAME

**Yanks Defeat White Sox in
18-11 Runfest; Red Sox
Beaten by Tigers.**

For a youngster just breaking in to the big time, Joe Di Maggio has a surprising way of grabbing off the baseball headlines from the boys who've been around.

Not only is he crowding lots of other stars out of the limelight, but to him and Sluggo Lou Gehrig must go a large share of the credit for the growing conviction that the New York Yankees "murderers' row" can come pretty close to using water boys for hurriers and still coast into a pennant.

Just when "Di Mag's" bat had quieted down to a level with other able, but less sensational sluggers, up he pops again with a record equalling stunt that has been done by less than ten others in the history of the game—hit two home runs in one inning.

In the fifth inning of yesterday's Yankee game with the White Sox, Joe let go his round trip clouts, one with two mates on base, the other with one, provided five runs in the ten-run Yankee outburst in that inning, sewing up the ball game for an 18-11 victory. This, along with the Boston Red Sox 7-6 defeat at the hands of Tommy Bridges and the Detroit Tigers, boosted the New York's American league pace setting edge to 52 games.

Tigers Lose Ground
Despite their victory over the Red Sox the Tigers slipped from fourth to fifth place, for the Cleveland Indians defeated the Athletics in both ends of a twin bill, 5-3 and 11-2, to pull up to a third place deadlock with the Senators, who found the Browns easy behind Newsum's seven hit pitching job and posted a 7-4 win. Feature of the Indians' double victory was Averill's three homers.

Rain washed out warfare on three National league battle-grounds, and it remained for the Pirates and the Giants to provide all the action in splitting their doubleheaders. Hubbell beat Blanton in the opener, chalking up his tenth win by a 4-3 count, chiefly because the Reds' sophomore star served a two-run home run ball to Ott in the first inning. In the nightcap, Weaver finished on top 4-1 with a threehit pitching performance.

Alvin Crowder, whose sore arm and stomach ailment have cut his effectiveness this season, left the Tigers last night after asking for the rest of the season off. He'll be back next year, he hopes.

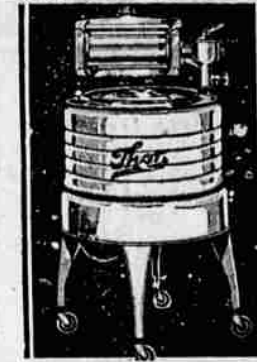
