

LEGION JUNIORS DATE GAME HERE

Hot Battle Expected When Douglas Team Clashes With Eugene Foes.

Baseball fans are assured of a real battle in the baseball game scheduled for 2:30 p. m. Sunday at Finlay field when the Douglas county Legion Juniors tangle with the Eugene team.

Traditional rivals, as a result of Junior Legion competition over a period of years, the meetings of the Douglas county and Eugene teams always provide plenty of fireworks.

Sunday's struggle is expected to be a battle between pitchers. Coach Ward Cummings is expected to start Glenn Elliott, Myrtle Creek southpaw, on the mound for the locals, while Eugene will probably offer Pete Igoo.

Both of these boys played last year. Igoo pitched Roseburg's early back in one game, and had the team down in a second meeting until a bit of strategy gave the locals a victory and beat Eugene, admittedly a better team, out of the state competition.

Igoo this year is reported greatly improved. He has been playing with the Willamette Valley league and has been turning in victories regularly.

Local hurlers also good. Elliott has been pitching exceptional ball this season and has a formidable strikeout record. He has speed and control, which he couples with fast breaking curves and a change of pace that has left adult batters completely helpless.

Andrews, the lanky Yoncalla twirler, will be available, providing his hand has healed sufficiently. In a recent game Andrews went to the mound and pitched three innings before it was discovered that he was throwing with a hand that was completely raw and bleeding as a result of having thrown a wet ball a few days before the game.

Eugene has for years turned out one of the strong Legion Junior teams of the state and this year the Lane county representatives are centering on one ambition, that of defeating Roseburg.

The feeling between the two squads is ample assurance that

both will put everything possible into the game here Sunday afternoon.

MUNGO HURLS GREAT GAME BUT LOSES

Whiffs 11 Men, But Dogers Fail to Hit Behind Him; Cubs Crowd Cards.

Anything can happen in this game of baseball, and particularly where the Brooklyn team is concerned.

If you don't believe it, picture this set-up: a pitcher equalling a major league strikeout record by fanning seven in a row, whiffing a total of 11 men in the course of the same battle, allowing only seven hits—and then losing the ball game.

That happened to the luckless Mungo yesterday as he dropped a 5-4 decision to the Cincinnati Reds in the opener of a twin bill, all because the Dodgers couldn't hit behind him. The Reds also annexed the nightcap, 5-1, slugging the Brooklynians deeper into the cellar.

Other dizzy doings in the National league race yesterday:

Dizzy Dean Routed.

The lowly Phillies shelved Dizzy Dean off the mound in four innings, winning the opener of their twin bill, 13-4, only to have the Cardinals take the nightcap by the same count. The Chicago Cubs took the first game of their double-header with the Bees, 1-0, although allowed only three hits, and pulled up to a bare half game from the league leading Cards by capturing the nightcap as well, 8-4; and the New York Giants, who were supposed to be all washed up just a week ago, climbed into third place over the Pittsburgh Pirates with a 5-4 victory on the strength of Mungo's three-run homer in the ninth.

The reverse was true in the American league.

The New York Yankees nosed out the White Sox 7-6. The Senators dubbed the St. Louis Browns, 12-5, as expected. The second place Boston Red Sox, paced by Jimmy Fox's 20th and 21st homers, slugged the Indians, 9-4, and the Detroit Tigers pounded the Athletics 13-1.

NEW YORK, June 26.—(AP)—New York writers with the Yankees wire back that the McCarthy-men are treating the west to a better wild west show than Buffalo Bill, even in his prime days.

Leo Gehrig leading the pack with an average of .342, the Yankees are blasting the ball even harder than they did in 1927, when the original "murderer's row"—Ruth, Meusel, Gehrig, etc.—was at its peak. They have scored 87 runs in 11 games and made 139 hits, 19 of which were four baggers.

BOSTON, June 26.—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The demand for wool has slackened in the west and in the east. Manufacturers evidently have found it impossible to get any further advance in the price of goods and this fact has reacted upon wool, which has become relatively dear. Dealers in the west have become less eager for wool, now that they have commenced to accumulate stocks, which can't be sold profitably and they are bidding less for wool."

"Prices here are barely firm, although not notably lower. Foreign markets are easier again and forward sales of tops in Bradford are below the current spot level."

"Mohair is steady on moderate demand."

FARGO, N. D., June 26.—(AP)—Governor Walter Welford maintained a slight lead today in his primary race with former Governor William Langer for the republican gubernatorial nomination. Closeness of the contest indicated the canvassing board check would be needed to determine the result.

Unofficial returns from 2171 of 2342 precincts in North Dakota gave Welford 89,114 and Langer 87,544, giving Welford a lead of 1570 with 71 precincts yet to report.

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

GRANTS PASS, June 25.—At least one business in Glendale, Calif., showed an 8-13 per cent or more business increase last year. A couple from that city said they were "vacationing as long as 13,000 pennies last." They said only 12,000 pennies were turned in at their popcorn stand the previous year.
