FUNDS ALLOTTED TO FIGHT HOPPER PEST

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Grasshopper damage over large areas was reported by the agriculture department today as President Roosevelt approved a joint resolution by congress appropriating \$250,000 for control of the insects.

The department planned to use the funds for cooperative control along the general lines of the 1934 emergency control campaign.

A. S. Hoyt, acting chief of the bureau's entomology and plant quarantine division, said the appropriation was not large enough to provide protection against grasshoppers throughout the infested area and that fully effective control so late in the season would be difficult, especially where the insects have moved into the fields.

He added, however, that prompt distribution of poison bait would protect crops in many sections. All the material that can be purchased with the funds available will be shipped to the most seriously affected areas and to places where grasshoppers have not yet advanced so far as to be entirely beyond control.

Field headquarters for the work have been established at Kansas City.

Grasshoppers are reported abundantly abundant this year in Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Montana, California, Colorado, North Dakota, South Dakota, Michigan, Idaho, New Mexico, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Wisconsin and Wyoming.
