

DOUGLAS JUNIORS TROUNCE CORVALLIS

Finlay Field Game Results
in 23-2 Score; McLain
Stages Swatfest.

Landing on three pitchers for 20 hits, the Douglas county Legion Juniors defeated the Corvallis Juniors 23 to 2 in a baseball game at Finlay field Thursday. Six Corvallis errors in tight spots added to the victory for the Douglas county sluggers.

While the local team was smacking the ball around the lot, the visitors were limited to two lone hits, both off Elliott, Myrtle Creek southpaw, in the fourth inning. Neither of the two Corvallis runs were earned, coming as the result of two errors. Morris relieved Elliott in the fifth and pitched hitless ball. Elliott fanned nine and Morris three.

The Douglas county team scored in each of the seven innings, batting entirely around in the third for a total of nine runs and again in the sixth for seven runs.

McLain Enjoys Swatfest. Curley McLain, catcher for the local team, was on a batting rampage, lashing out four hits in five trips to the plate, all for extra bases. He hit two doubles, a three banger and a homer and walked once, scoring five runs for a perfect day at bat.

He was closely seconded by Holbrook, who made four hits, one a double, in five trips to the plate.

Morris and Anlauf also hit for home runs during the course of the afternoon. To make it a complete day for Douglas county, the intermediates defeated the Corvallis second string 19 to 1 in four innings, the local youngsters cracking out 13 clean hits. Each team made only one error.

Winberly started the fireworks for the home team by lifting out a home run with two on in the first inning.

WALMSLEY TO QUIT HIS MAYORAL POST

NEW ORLEANS, June 25.—(AP)—Mayor T. Semmes Walmsley of New Orleans announced today that he would resign his office next Tuesday.

Walmsley, bitter political foe of the late Senator Huey P. Long, refused to resign while Long was hammering for control of the city administration.

But last March 8, with city con-

trol virtually taken over by the state under laws which Long had passed in the legislature, Mayor Walmsley announced he would step aside provided the legislature enacted laws "restoring home rule" to New Orleans.

The legislature has revised the statutes affecting New Orleans.

SHARKEY DECISIONS BRUBAKER IN TEN

BOSTON, June 26.—(AP)—Jack Sharkey, the man of a thousand flaccid moods, projected himself back into the heavyweight picture today as the result of a close but convincing ten-round victory over young Phil Brubaker, California's latest contribution to the boxing wars.

Sharkey got up off the floor at Fenway park last night, gave the 22-year-old Brubaker an artistic boxing lesson, and promptly served notice that he's serious about making a comeback, three years after dropping the world championship to Primo Carnera.

The upshot of this contribution to the dizzy developments in the fight industry is that Sharkey probably will collide with Max Baer, now likewise on the comeback trail, in New York this summer.

James J. Johnston, matchmaker for Madison Square garden, said last night he hoped to arrange a Sharkey-Baer bout.

Knocked down, cut and battered by Brubaker's first round rush, Sharkey rallied to outbox, out-punch and out-point the California clouter. The 33-year-old ex-champion, all things considered, waged one of his best fights to score an uphill victory.

Carrying 199 pounds, much of it around the mid-section, Sharkey nevertheless showed surprising agility and actually got better as the fight progressed.

In the sixth round Brubaker opened a bad cut over Sharkey's left eye but again the former champ rallied to weather the storm and frustrate the youngster's most aggressive efforts to land a hay-maker.

PORTLAND LOSES TO ANGELS IN TWELFTH

Defeat Shoves Beavers to
4th Place; Oakland Goes
Back Into Lead.

Los Angeles, in seventh place but playing bang-up ball, again thwarted Portland's attempt to take the coast league leadership, as first division teams interchanged positions once more.

Oakland was back at the top today, but only because Los Angeles won a 13-inning, 6-5, contest from Portland. Had the Beavers triumphed, they would have been leading the league by a .502 margin. By losing they dropped from second to fourth place.

The Acorns supplanted San Francisco's Missions in first by pounding out an 8-6 victory over the Reds, and Seattle went into a second-place tie with Kamm's team by scratching out a 2-1 win over the San Francisco Seals.

Sacramento made it two in a row over San Diego when Don Rosa, their new fuzzy-cheeked moundsman, pitched the cellar denizens to a 6-1 triumph.

Circus finishes predominated in the games up north. The Angels went into the ninth inning with a 4-1 lead over Portland; only to have Brucker tie up the game by homing with two on. Relief pitchers Salverson and Liska battled on even terms until the 12th, when Los Angeles shoved over two runs, and Portland could get back only one.

Homer Wins in Ninth. A mound duel between Gibson, the Seal ace, and Osborn at Seattle, saw the Seals leading 1-0 for seven chukkers. Then Hunt singled the tying Indian run home in the eighth. In the next inning Gyselman, Seattle's third sacker, lifted the ball over the fence and the game was over.

Tobin led an early Oakland attack against Thurston to give the Acorns a winning margin over the Reds. Tobin tripled with the bases loaded in the second to feature a five-run rally, but was driven from

the hill himself in the seventh. Haid finished.

With Ross pitching five-hit ball, Sacramento needed only a four-run spurge in the sixth to win. Head sparkplugged this uprising by tripping with the bases clogged, and Dohbins, who got three hits during the afternoon, sent the catcher home with a single.

Mike Jacobs today gave a cold shoulder of Walter Rothenburg's offer of \$150,000 to buy the contract for the proposed Jim Braddock-Max Schmeling heavyweight boxing championship bout.

"Apparently Rothenburg doesn't understand the situation in this country," said Jacobs. "I have Schmeling under contract and Braddock is the property of Madison Square garden."

"I'll gladly pay the garden \$150,000 for Braddock's contract, or I'll sell Schmeling's to the garden for the same price. If the garden accepts my offer I'll promote the fight in this country."

"It's a cinch that the fight will be held in the United States regardless of who promotes it."
