THE Democratic platform, as anticipated, is a compromise designed to gather in the votes of both conservatives and liberals. (Radicals, in this instance, is probably a more accurate term.)

TO THE conservatives, it promises:

A sound currency.

A balanced budget and reduction of the national debt.

To the liberals (or radicals, if you prefer that word) it promises:

A constitutional amendment for the New Deal social program can not be achieved otherwise.

CONSERVATIVES are not apt to be misled by these promises.

They will recall that the Democratic platform of 1932 pledged "a sound currency at all hazards" and a balanced budget to be achieved by economy and reduction of government expense.

They will remember (because no one can forget it) that one of the first acts of the New Deal was to DEBASE the currency and about the next act of importance was to embark upon the most reckless campaign of public spending in the history of the world.

The two New Deal congresses have appropriated more than THIRTY-FIVE BILLION dollars, most of which has been or will be borrowed and will have to be paid

LEMKE RAPS FARM SET-UP OF NEW DEAL

Sec'y. Wallace Target of Attack by Presidential Candidate in Tour of Corn Belt.

DES MOINES, Ia., June 29.—(AP)—Congressman William Lemke, the union party's presidential candidate, wooed the support of corn belt farmers today with an attack on Secretary of Agriculture Wallace and a "guaranteed cost of production" pledge.

Lemke chose Wallace's home town—Des Moines—to open his midwestern drive. Offering his version of the "true story" of the AAA and its processing taxes, he declared:

"The Secretary of Agriculture reached his long, vandalous fingers into the farmers' pocket and took out a dollar. Finally he slipped a dime back into the other pocket and through his propaganda department shouted 'look at the dime I gave you' so loud that the farmer forgot the dollar he took."

He assailed both democratic and republican parties in addresses here and at Burlington. He asserted:

"With either party in power in the national administration—I'm not speaking of congress—you'll get Wall street back of the wheel."

Lemke also moved to present his case through his campaign manager, Congressman Asher Burdick, a colleague from his home state of North Dakota, before the annual convention of the National Farmers Holiday association. Burdick was scheduled to speak before the organization at St. Paul, Minn., tomorrow.

The association, sponsor of farm strikes in 1932 and 1933, called for formation of a "united front" of agricultural groups in 25 states as it prepared to listen to the new party's overtures.

Promises Made.

Speaking under the auspices of the National Union for Social Justice and the Townsend club, Lemke promised to "kick out the brainless trust," guarantee farmers' production costs and adequate

PEACH GROWERS TO RUN OWN CANNERY

McMINNVILLE, June 29.—(AP)—The Oregon Peach Growers association, in a move to protect its market and prices, selected a committee of five today to provide an independent cannery.

The association voted to weight plans for the construction of its own cannery or possibly utilize the Gresham cooperative cannery.

The association, which represents the bulk of the Willamette valley production, also adopted a resolution asking the state department of agriculture to require all peaches to be sold under their rightful trade names.

Prices were fixed tentatively at \$1.50 a bushel, the same as in 1935 and two cents a pound to canneries.

INTRASTATE RATES ON FREIGHT KEPT

SALEM, June 29.—(AP)—The public utilities commissioner ordered today the continuance of intrastate emergency freight rates, affecting virtually all commodities with the exception of agricultural products.

The order was in line with an order issued previously by the interstate commerce commission involving interstate rates.

The emergency freight rates originally were authorized more than a year ago and were slightly higher than those previously in operation.

The original order expires tomorrow.

BATHER DROWNS AT NEWPORT BEACH

NEWPORT, June 29.—(AP)—Edon Haldorf, 34, of Portland, drowned last night at South beach a mile below the highway bridge while bathing in the surf with his wife and Mr. and Mrs. Ted Gowing, also of Portland.

He was caught in an undertow. The coast guard made a search but the body had not been found today.

The Haldorf family had been living here for the summer; the husband traveling here over the week-end. His widow and a son and daughter survive.

As he did his buying a number of customers recognized him and came up to greet the bareheaded, stampanned Kansan.

After an exchange of pleasantries, the governor picked up his sack of groceries and got into a roadster driven by Peggy Anne.

The family attended church at Estes park conference yesterday, after which the governor, held in doors by an afternoon downpour, spent much of the time reading newspapers and other matter.

PLEDGE GIVEN TO DEMOCRATS BY ROOSEVELT

Campaign of Present Year to Be Against Economic Tyranny, Acceptance Speech Asserts.

PHILADELPHIA, June 29.—Democratic leaders scattered to the four corners of the country today to preach economic freedom as the keynote of their campaign to re-elect President Roosevelt.

They carried a pledge to battle "economic tyranny" directly from the president who wound up the party's convention Saturday night by accepting his renomination before an enthusiastic crowd of 100,000 in rain-soaked Franklin field.

Only those near loud speakers heard the last three sentences of the president's address. "I accept," started a tumultuous ovation that all but drowned out "the commission you have tendered me, I join with you. I am enlisted for the duration of the war." It lasted until Mr. Roosevelt drove from the vast stadium.

Halfway through his speech the president sounded his war cry:

"For too many of us, the political equality we once had won was meaningless in the face of economic inequality. A small group had concentrated into their own hands an almost complete control over other people's property, other people's money, other people's labor, other people's lives. . . .

"For too many of us life was no longer free; liberty no longer real; men would no longer follow the pursuit of happiness."

BLACK LEGION'S KILLER SAYS GUILTY

DETROIT, June 29.—(AP)—Deyton Dean pleaded guilty today to charges of kidnapping and murder in the Black Legion "execution" May 12 of Charles A. Poole, young WPA worker.

Asked by Circuit Judge Joseph A. Moynihan why he was pleading guilty, the confessed "trigger man" for the terroristic replied:

"Because I did it."

The maximum sentence possible in Michigan in Dean's case would be life imprisonment. Twelve other men also are charged with slaying Poole, and sentencing of Dean was deferred.

The Poole slaying led to an expanding investigation which has resulted in the arrest of nearly 50 men in Michigan on charges ranging from murder and arson to assault.

"BIG FITZ" ADMITS HAMM KIDNAPING

ST. PAUL, June 29.—(AP)—Charles (Big Fitz) Fitzgerald of Los Angeles pleaded guilty in federal court today to complicity in the \$100,000 kidnaping of William Hamm, Jr., June 1933. He will be sentenced July 7.

The plea of Fitzgerald, indicated as a participant in the actual seizure of the brewing company head, reduced to three the number who will stand trial for the crime July 14. They are Alvin Karpis, Edward G. Bremer, former Benetville, Ill., postmaster in whose home Hamm was held, and John P. Pender, former St. Paul night club operator named as "finger man" in the case.

Dyon Bolton, former Barker-Karpis machine-gunner, who has pleaded guilty, will be a government witness at the trial.

GIRLS UNHURT IN AIRPLANE CRASH

PORTLAND, Ore., June 29.—(AP)—Having miraculously escaped death in a plane crash, two women fliers of Portland rested here today after spending more than a day and a night in the open.

Both were exhausted when searchers found them yesterday, and Miss Irma Westover was suffering from back injuries. The pilot, Miss Alyce Paschberg, escaped with only scratches when their plane crashed into Archer mountain 14 miles northwest of Canby, Wash., in a heavy fog Saturday morning.

A torrential rain Saturday added to the misery of the women, who were headed for the air races at Spokane when their plane crashed up.

WORLD UNREST PUTS BIG JOB UP TO SCHOOL

Situation Both Terrifying and Inspiring, Declares Chancellor Hunter at NEA Meet.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 29.—(AP)—Five thousand school teachers of America, packed into Portland's civic auditorium, held their task of educating the nation's children described today by Dr. Fredrick M. Hunter, distinguished educator, as one set in a scene "both terrifying and inspiring."

Dr. Hunter, chancellor of the Oregon system of higher education, delivering the keynote address of the 74th annual convention of the National Education association, told his fellow workers:

"The worldwide proportions of the issues joined in this, our generation, can easily carry consternation to any but the stoutest hearted."

The chancellor addressed the convention after Miss Agnes Samuelson, state superintendent of public instruction in Iowa and association president, launched the general session and individual assemblies of 18 affiliated groups today in a real Iowa atmosphere.

As the convention gavel resounded to call the meeting to order, hundreds of Portland school children, in a mass chorus, sang the famous Iowa corn song and followed it with the Oregon song.

Miss Samuelson, in her brief address, told the delegates that "one of their greatest problems was 'to conserve American youth and preserve the close relationship between education and democracy.'"

Dr. Hunter, plunging into his address, "We Chart Our Future Policies," without formalities, told the

Two local doctors had already reported finding for the defense, holding Minto not able to stand trial because of heart trouble, colitis and acute cold.

Minto's trial was scheduled to start here this morning, but defense Attorney John Carson moved for continuance. The motion was protested by Special Prosecutor Ralph Moody. Judge Latourette announced he would pass upon the motion after considering the reports of the four examining physicians.

CLAIM OF ILLNESS HALTS MINTO TRIAL

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Sales Of Timber On Revested Land Again Authorized

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—Secretary Ickes revoked today his order of June 3 forbidding authorization of further timber sales on revested and conveyed public land in Oregon.

The previous order, he said, had been issued in the hope congress would give him discretionary authority under certain conditions to dispose of timber on the revested Oregon and California railroad grant and the re-conveyed Coos Bay wagon road.
