

Cubs Supplant Cardinals at National League Top

DOUBLE SHUTOUT DEALT TO GIANTS

Larry French Hurls One of Blanks; Brooklyn Mauls Dizzy Dean.

Well, the boys from Chicago have gone and done it.
One month and four days after signing up the extra starting pitcher they needed, the Cubs are back on top of the National League heap, after a drive that came close to paralleling the skyrocketing spurt with which they wound up with the pennant a year ago.

The laugh they handed the experts who said St. Louis was the only outfit in the race drew a lot of echoes today, for the Cardinals were knocked out of first place by the one outfit you'd never expect to turn the trick—the Brooklyn Dodgers.

While Larry French and Bill Lee were shutting out the Giants on behalf of the Cubs yesterday, 3-0 and 6-0, Casey Stengel's boys landed on Dizzy Dean like a ton of bricks, hatted him all over the lot, and turned in a 5-1 victory that slid the Cards right out of lead.

And, although Manager Charley Grimm has often said it's the plot of the game to have to do with the worrying, just where his fretting can begin is hard to see. It seems to have ended when the Cubs took over Curt Davis from the Phillies, for since his arrival in late May, bolstering the pitching staff, the Cubs have gone to town at a better than 750 pace, winning 23 of 31 ball games.

Pirates Hold Third
Their double win over the Giants yesterday, shot the New Yorkers out of a third-place deadlock with the Pirates, for the Reds, with Blanton turning in a four-hit trick, belted the Bats in the opener of a twin bill, 11-3, and held onto third position, despite a 6-4 trimming in the nightcap. The Reds, idle because of rain in Philadelphia, were only a game back of the Giants, in fifth place, when the day's warring was over.

In the American league, the New York Yankees' home-run battering was more or less stifled for a day, and the lovely St. Louis Browns split a doubleheader by doing some long range clotting of their own to win the opener 6-3, after which "murderers" row took the nightcap 7-4. The Tigers and Indians kept on in their third-place deadlock, the former shelling the Athletics 10-4 for their fourth straight victory, while the tribe was turning the trick again on the apparently "vanishing" gold-plated Boston Red Sox, 11-3, despite Jimmy Foss's 22nd homer.

The Senators sank out of the hitherto three-way third place tie by getting no better than a split with the White Sox, dropping the nightcap 4-1 before Sugar Cain's four-hit pitching, after clotting out a 12-9 edge in the opener.

GLENDALE DEFEATS KLAMATH RED SOX
GLENDALE, Ore., June 28.—The Glendale Loggers came back to life Sunday when they pounded out enough base hits to drop the Klamath Red Sox by the wayside with a 6 to 5 count.

Under the leadership of their new manager, Jake Gilpe, the Loggers landed on Clyde Carlstrom, Klamath flinger, for 10 hits to earn all their runs, while the Red Sox got only two earned runs.

The game was close all through, the Red Sox starting out with two runs in the first inning, two in the fifth and one in the sixth. The Loggers got two in the second inning, tied the score in the fifth with two runs, and again in the sixth with one. They made one more in the eighth, giving them the victory.

DOUGLAS JUNIORS BEAT EUGENE, 4-3

Poor Support Mars Mound
Duel Between Southpaw Elliott and Igoe.

A pitching duel, marred only by ragged fielding, gave baseball fans plenty of excitement at Finlay field Sunday afternoon as the Douglas County Legion Juniors defeated the Eugene Juniors 4 to 3.

Glenn Elliott, Myrtle Creek southpaw, outpitched Pete Igoe, Eugene ace, but both pitchers were given poor support, Roseburg making three errors and Eugene six.

Elliott allowed four hits, two for extra bases, while Igoe gave only five hits. Elliott fanned nine batters and Igoe seven.

Only one runner for each team got on bases in the first three scoreless innings.

In the last of the fourth McLean, Roseburg catcher, was hit by a pitched ball, stole second, and scored on a Texas leaguer by Anlauf.

Eugene tied the score in the sixth, when Saunders hit a home run over right field.

Game Won in Sixth.
Two errors, coupled with three hits, gave Roseburg the game in the last of the sixth. After Crouch had fanned, Morgan reached first on an error and advanced on Ball's single. Ball was out at second as McLean reached first on a fielder's choice, Morgan scoring on the play. Anlauf's fly into left field was dropped and two runs came in on Neal's single. Holbrook also singled, but scoring stopped when Vleck made the third out.

Eugene staged a determined rally in the eighth, scoring two runs. The first batter was out on an infield play, and Saunders, second batter went first on an error at shortstop and advanced to second on an overthrow, scoring on Austin's triple, after Palanuk had popped out to Elliott. King walked, putting the tying run on base, but Igoe popped an easy fly into Elliott's hands for the third out.

Roseburg had two men on bases in the last of the eighth but failed to score. Eugene batters went down in order in the first of the ninth.

The game was played in very fast time, and was full of thrills. Both teams made two double plays.

Eugene is to play games here on the 4th and 5th of July as a part of the program for the V. F. W. celebration.

SEATTLE CLIMBS TO LEAGUE'S TOP

A new league leader was left in the wake of week-end coast league ball games. After a fruitless week against San Francisco's Seals, Seattle reposed in first place, while the Missions, leaders last Thursday, were faced with a fight to stay in fourth place.

Batters went on a two-day spree and cuffed pitchers unmercifully, with Oakland's 27-6 victory Saturday over the Reds the highlight. The Oaks got 30 hits Saturday, while over the league the total was 103.

In Sunday doubleheaders, there were a few low-scoring games, but batters managed to pile out 162 hits. In spite of Oakland's unusual feat of finding Mission pitchers for 198 hits during the series, Manager Meyer's men had to relinquish the league lead to Seattle, who lost only a single game all week.

The Indians took two from the Seals yesterday, 6-2, 7-3. Oakland split with the Reds, copping the first game, 10-3, and losing the seven-inning finale 4-8. Los Angeles and Portland divided, the Beavers winning the opener, 4-3, and dropping the nightcap, 1-6. San Diego took the first game against Sacramento, 14-7, but the Solons won the second 4-3, in eight innings.

Schulmerich's three-run overthrow of third gave Portland its win over Los Angeles, but the Beavers couldn't do anything with Prim in the second contest. The Angels clinched the game with a five-run outburst in the sixth.

teachers that historians of the future will write that in these days of the 20th century "there were giants in the earth."

"A no time in history have conceptions of such import to the entire race been exposed by the millions of individuals constituting great nations or groups of nations and set in battle array, one against the other, as in the past two decades," he said.

"In these two decades of tragic disillusionment, one nation after another, numbering population by the millions, for the false assurance of economic security turns in its frantic desperation of fear and dire need to the despotism of class dictatorship.

"An America and the nations of the western European seaboard, where the democratic philosophy

of life had created its real strongholds, the battle seems to be joined for final decisive determination."

Popular Rule "Weak"
Examining momentarily the American system of government, Dr. Hunter observed that the theory of a unified central government modified by the development of local self-government, has been applied "too thoroughly" that today there are 185,000 different units of self-government in the nation.

The weaknesses and "imperfections" of the localized system are only "too apparent" in the multiplication of the agencies of corruption, prevalence of gangsterism, graft and the multiplicity of taxing organizations, he said.

"In this scheme, the schools must plan their policies only in the face of sharper criticism," he remarked, recalling that extremists on the one hand charge that education is being permeated by radicalism among the faculty, while the leftists hold that schools and colleges have developed a breed of materialist.

3 Essentials Cited
If the teaching profession accepts the responsibility which the nation places upon it, three fundamental ideas must be kept before it, he said. They are:
1. The spread of knowledge has a creative rescue power for the ills of society.
2. Our American origin and the total of our life experience commits us irrevocably to the democratic philosophy of Lincoln.
3. The methods of science applied to the realm of economics confirm the conception that widespread economic prosperity is to be found in the constant increase of the levels of living and culture of the people.

SPRING PIG CROP SHOWS INCREASE

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—An increase of about 25 per cent in the spring pig crop of 1936 over the very small crop of 1935, was announced today by the department of agriculture.

The government's pig crop report said there was a prospective increase of about 14 per cent in the number of sows in farrow in the fall season of 1936 over the number farrowed in the fall of 1935; an indicated increase of about 24 per cent in the total farrowing in 1936 over the total of 1935, and a moderate increase in the number of hogs over six months of age on June 1, 1936, over the number a year earlier.

Although the number of litter farrowed in 1936 promises to be substantially larger than the normally small numbers in both 1934 and 1935, it will be nearly 2 per cent below the average of 1931 and 1933, and probably below any other year in the last 20 years, at least, the report said.
