# COURT BLOW HITS LABOR RELATIONS BODY

## WPA MINERAL SURVEY WILL CONTINUE HERE

### Sewing Project Also to Go On This Summer; Other Relief Work to Be Shut Down.

The mineral survey now in progress in Douglas county under WPA sponsorship will be continued through the summer months. C. D. Fies, WPA engineer for Douglas county, announced today.

Mr. Fies reports he has been informed from state headquarters that it is planned to complete the mineral survey without interruption, if possible.

The sewing project, which is employing a number of women, will also be continued.

Other WPA projects are to be closed down for the period of seasonal labor. During the summer season and until after fruit harvest there is expected to be ample work available for all able-bodied men. Mr. Fies states, and as a result work relief will be discontinued except in a few cases.

The WPA rolls are carrying a few men who are aged or physically handicapped and therefore unable to compete with able-bodied and younger men for work.

These men are to be retained to clean up the few WPA jobs yet remaining. They will be used principally to finish the grading of the grounds at the senior high school and to finish the city's dead-end street job.

The street work will require only a short time, Mr. Fies reports, as there is little grading left to be done.

## TRAIN KILLS THREE SINGING IN AUTO

PITTSBURG, Calif., June 30.—(AP)—Three men, singing loudly, were killed almost instantly when a passenger train struck their automobile at a crossing near Knightsen, west of here.

The victims were Leonard Van Winkle, 27, and Marvin Crippen, 28, both of Okmulgee, Okla., and Joseph Lopez, 40, Brentwood, Calif.

The men, apricot pickers at Brentwood, had been visiting friends and were returning to their homes when the accident occurred last night.

Lowell Bixley, Brentwood, a witness to the accident, saw Van Winkle, driving the automobile, approach and crossed the railroad tracks in second gear while he and his companions sang lustily.

Bixley said the approaching train was plainly visible, its headlights being seen for two miles.

The victims' automobile was dragged 140 feet by the passenger train.

## Lehman, Yielding to Pressure, Consents to Run for 3rd Term

Governor of New York Unable to Longer Resist Appeals of Party in State and Nation, He Says.

ALBANY, June 30.—(AP)—Governor Herbert H. Lehman announced today he will yield to party pressure and run for a third term.

The chief executive of President Roosevelt's home state called newspapermen to his office and gave them a statement declaring he could "no longer resist the pleas of my party both in the state and the nation."

The governor's decision came with surprising suddenness, and within a few days after the democratic national convention had staged a wild 17-minute demonstration for him, and the president had invited him to Hyde Park for the week-end.

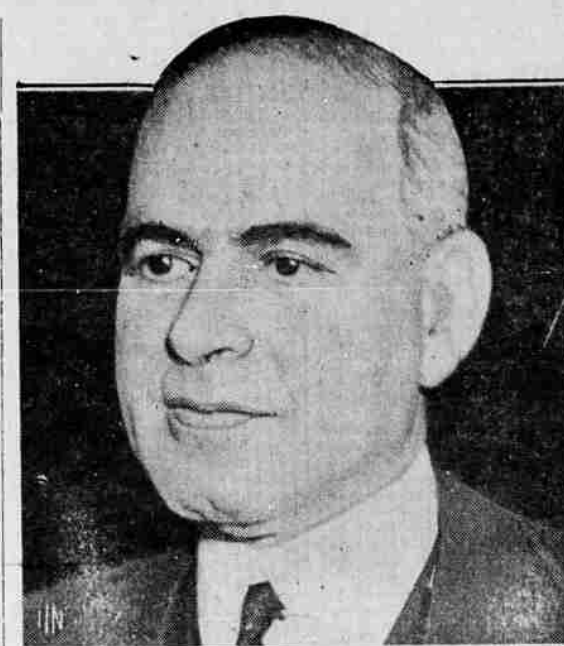
The decision means that Governor Lehman has reconsidered his announcement of this spring that the time had come for him to ask relief from the cares of office.

He also was yielding to pressure of a democratic nationwide movement to induce him not to retire, Democrats in 35 states joined the movement. The governor summoned newspapermen to his office shortly after the noon hour.

"Regardless of personal considerations, however compelling," he said, "I feel that I can no longer resist the pleas of my party both in the state and in the nation or of those with whom I have worked in closest association for many years and with whom I have waged the fight for equal opportunity and social justice."

"Therefore, if my party in this state chooses to nominate me again and if the people of the state again call on me for service, I shall proudly accept the call and shall during the coming two years devote myself wholeheartedly to the interests of the people of the state."

The governor said his decision on May 20 to not seek reelection

was made "with an earnest desire to be relieved of the cares and responsibilities of the governorship in order to return to private life and the enjoyment of my family."

Reports were current last week that President Roosevelt himself would ask Governor Lehman to reconsider his refusal to become a candidate.

The two met last week-end, both at Philadelphia and at Hyde Park, where the governor had breakfast Sunday at the Roosevelt home.

Governor Lehman has been closely associated with Mr. Roosevelt since the latter became governor in 1928. He and Alfred E. Smith, former governor, were

## BIG SUM READY FOR WISCONSIN'S IDLE

MADISON, Wis., June 30.—(AP)—Twelve million dollars, contributed by 3,000 Wisconsin employers the last two years under the nation's first state unemployment insurance law, will be available to beneficiaries tomorrow.

Employers of ten or more persons have been contributing up to two per cent of their monthly payroll to the fund since 1934. July 1 was set as the date when the full amount would be subject to withdrawal for the benefit of workers laid off through no fault of their own.

The 400,000 workers potentially eligible for assistance, if they are laid off as of those earning an average of \$1,500 or less annually. Benefits based on salary size range from \$5 weekly minimum to \$15, the maximum. Duration of benefit payments is based on the length of service of the employee.

## FARLEY WILL QUIT CABINET, RUMOR

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—James A. Farley's dual role as postmaster general and chairman of the democratic national committee—and the question whether he may quit the cabinet post—aroused new interest today as the autumn election campaign hit its stride.

Farley was reported by one source to have sent his resignation to President Roosevelt, and another source said he might take a leave of absence from the postoffice department.

In Atlantic City, where he went for a rest, Farley said last night: "I have not resigned as postmaster general and beyond that I have no comment to make."

He parried a question as to whether he planned to resign later on, repeating that he had no further comment to make.

The New York Times, however, said in a Washington dispatch that Farley had sent his resignation from the cabinet to President Roosevelt in order that he might concentrate on the duties of his political post.

The newspaper added that the resignation would be accepted and that William W. Hawes, first assistant, would become acting postmaster general. Some democrats were said by the newspaper to believe that if Mr. Roosevelt is re-elected Farley would be reappointed to the cabinet post. Opposition to this plan also was reported along with indications that the president's reelection might mean a new postmaster general.

## DROUGHT-STRICKEN AREAS TO BE AIDED

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—Federal agencies moved ahead today with plans to aid drought-stricken areas while Secretary Wallace set out to make an inspection tour of northwest states.

Financial relief and the question of another federal livestock purchasing program were discussed. The livestock situation was said not to be as serious as during the drought of 1934, when the government spent about \$500,000,000 for relief.

As relief plans were drawn up, J. B. Kincaid of the weather bureau, said that only substantial rains during the next two months would keep the current drought from approaching the last one in severity.

## ZIONCHECK ON HIS WAY WEST UNDER GUARD

### Congressman, Now Docile, Informs Audience as He Leaves for Seattle "I'll Be Back."

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—Off toward the west went Representative Marion A. Zioncheck today and a seasonal calm settled once more over the green slopes of Capitol Hill.

The congressman from Seattle, perhaps more docile than has been his wont in many months, boarded a train for Seattle, shortly after midnight as police braced themselves for a sigh.

Then came a parting thrust—"I'll be back, you wait and see."

The effect was to check the sigh and set some of the curious spectators gasping.

Homeward bound he was under guard.

Zioncheck has been the center of great activity in between the time of his escape Sunday from Sheppard and Enoch Pratt private hospital at Towson, Md., and the hour of his departure.

From the institution where he had been confined for mental treatment he fled to his office in the new house office building in the early hours of yesterday. There he remained for many hours with Kenneth Romney, house sergeant-at-arms, who posted a bond to assure Zioncheck's freedom on an assault charge, and while preparations were made for the westward journey.

Says He Was Shattered  
After the legal barriers were thrown down, the young legislator issued a statement saying he had been "shattered" into both the Gallinger hospital here and into the Maryland institution.

He declared that had he not escaped from Towson, "I am certain that I would have qualified for an insane asylum in the very near future."

With the departure arrangements completed, Zioncheck, Romney and George Bishop, a Zioncheck appointee to the Capitol police force, proceeded to the union station, accompanied by a squad of policemen.

Zioncheck, dressed in a blue shirt and white linen suit, removed his straw hat but refused to wave.

## DICTATORSHIP ON TEACHING ROLES N. E. A.

### "Red Rider" Clause Repealed Demanded at Conclave; Compulsory Oath of Allegiance Hit.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—(AP)—Cheers at attacks on threats to academic freedom hardly died away today when delegates to the 74th annual convention of the National Education Association prepared to nominate officers to carry on a militant program for independence in the nation's schools.

Criticism of congressional action in limiting the mention of governmental science in the District of Columbia, a call for "solidarity and militancy of the education profession" and the presentation of a life membership in the teaching organization to the N.E.A. president, Miss Agnes Samuelson, Des Moines Iowa, comprised the highlights of initial sessions yesterday.

John W. Studebaker, United States commissioner of education, told delegates, "I am certainly not contending for the establishment or advocacy of communism. But I do wish to point out that the implications of the situation in the District of Columbia are of great significance. . . . If democracy means freedom to inquire, to learn, to express oneself. . . . then we can tolerate no dictatorial censorship of thinking and learning."

Thomas W. Gosling, national director of the Junior Red Cross, in commenting that District of Columbia teachers "are required each month to state under oath that they have not taught communism to their pupils," said "until we remove dictatorships from the schools, we cannot with good grace attack it elsewhere. . . . The restraint imposed by fear supplants the joy of free inquiry. Compulsory oaths of allegiance and compulsory salutes to the flag are flagrant examples of dictatorships."

"Red Rider" Scored  
The legislative commission of the national association sent to the general convention yesterday its vote that the asserted "Red rider" clause, subject of widespread dispute in Washington, be repealed by congress.

The clause, written into an appropriation bill, requires teachers

## REFORM SCHOOL FLOGGINGS EYED

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 30.—(AP)—Governor H. H. McAlister and Institutions Commissioner C. L. Pardue conferred today on complaints that inmates of the state reform school were flogged with metal-studded lashes and served food containing insects.

The county grand jury continued its investigation after reporting yesterday that 20 boys, chosen at random, showed "scars and lacerations" from whippings and that some told of being flogged by drunken guards.

Others said a wagon wheel spoke frequently was used for the beatings.

"Several boys testified that one guard, under influence of liquor, told them on one occasion that if any of them had any rabbit in their feet, start running and he would shoot them down in a hurry," the jury reported.

The jurors told Criminal Judge Chester C. Hart an examination of food served for lunch showed cockroaches in the bread, flies in the pudding and other evidences of uncleanness.

## TRUCK UPSHOT HURTS FIVE CCC MEMBERS

Five members of the CCC company at Steamboat camp suffered minor injuries early Monday morning when the truck in which they were returning from a Sunday trip to Roseburg turned over at the intersection of Jackson street and Second avenue south.

The truck, city police report, apparently attempted to take the turn at an excessive rate of speed and rolled over almost against the Page Lumber company building.

Although the truck was loaded with passengers, some asleep, no one was seriously hurt. Five were taken to the veterans hospital for treatment of cuts and bruises.

## Motion in Gore's O. & C. Suit Asks For Definite Data

MEDFORD, Ore., June 30.—(AP)—Jackson county today filed a motion in circuit court directing that W. H. Gore, pioneer farmer and former banker, make more definite and certain, allegations in his \$88,000 suit against Jackson county for services purportedly rendered in securing passage by congress of the O. & C. tax refund bill in 1926.

Gore claims in his action that the then Jackson county court agreed to pay him a "reasonable percentage" of all monies collected in the event the bill was passed.

The motion asks that Gore give time and place, where the agreement was entered into, whether it was written or verbal, and to give an accounting of money allegedly expended in behalf of the bill while Gore was in Washington, D. C.

## UNION PARTY MAKES DEBUT IN OREGON

SALEM, June 30.—(AP)—The "union" party definitely made its bid for recognition in Oregon today.

Notice of intention to organize the new party was filed with the secretary of state, and listed a proposed state central committee composed of Peter Zimmerman, Yamhill county; G. W. Thelissen, Milwaukie; J. Henry Jacobson, Hillsboro; Frank C. Fluke, Beaverton, and Frank Saffeld, Gervais.

Organization petitions must carry signatures of not less than five per cent of the total number of votes cast for the three Oregon congressmen at the last election. This would require 14,250 names.

Certificates of nomination must be filed by September 15, to insure candidates of the party a place on the November general election ballot.

Reports here indicated Zimmerman would probably be the party's candidate for United States senator, and John A. Jeffrey, Portland, for congressman from the third district.

## COCKTAIL COLLEGE LOSES ON APPEAL

SALEM, June 30.—(AP)—The so-called "cocktail colleges" are illegal as far as Oregon is concerned.

The state supreme court today affirmed the conviction of Barney Pearlman, professor of "mixology" in the short-lived cocktail college at Portland, on a charge of unlawfully selling liquor. He had been sentenced to six months in the Multnomah county jail and fined \$500.

Pearlman, with four others, was charged with selling intoxicating liquor by the district attorney after they had opened a "cocktail college." The information was based upon accusations that the "students" apparently "absorbed their lessons" too well. Two of the others pleaded guilty and two were acquitted in the circuit court.

## TRAILER FIRM WINS IN TEST OF AUTHORITY

### Board Lacks Right to Give Labor Orders in Cases Not Having Inter-State Status.

CINCINNATI, June 30.—(AP)—The U. S. circuit court of appeals held today that the national labor relations board lacked authority to issue orders affecting companies whose business "does not directly affect any phase of any interstate commerce."

It dismissed a petition of the board asking enforcement of an order it issued to Fruehauf Trailer Co., of Detroit and directed that the order be set aside.

The Fruehauf company attacked the constitutionality of the national labor relations act in appealing from the order of the board. Authority for the national labor relations act, the court said, "is claimed under the commerce clause of the constitution. Since the order is directed to the control and regulation of the relations between the trailer company and its employees in respect to their activities in the manufacture and production of trailers and does not directly affect any phase of any interstate commerce in which the trailer company may be engaged, . . . the congress has no authority or power to regulate or control such regulations between the trailer company and its employees, the national labor relations board was without authority to issue the order."
