NORTH ENTRANCE TO CRATER LAKE OPEN

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., June 29.—The north entrance highway to Crater lake is open to traffic and the rim road around the lake will be ready for traffic in a few days.

Snow plows have been engaged in opening the two routes for the past month, cutting through drifts ranging from 10 to 25 feet in depth, the result of winter long snow accumulation.

The Crater Wall trail from the rim to the shore of Crater lake is now open to visitors. CCC labor opened the 13-mile route from the rim to the shore, shoveling through deep drifts to make it accessible to foot travel.

NEWS-REVIEW MAN

TEN HOURS from Roseburg to Crater Lake and back is not bad time, as the average goes for travel, I suppose, but yesterday a party of us made the round trip in an hour and twenty-five minutes.

At half past nine yesterday morning Alton Walker, in charge of the Byrd Antarctic Expedition ship which has been barnstorming here the past several days, called and said there was room for one more passenger in the plane, headed for Crater Lake, and would I care to go along.

We sailed high over Dodson mountain, cut across the headwaters of North and South Umpqua creeks, crossed the South Umpqua above Tiller, cut over the Union creek road several miles above its junction with the Rogue river highway, paralleling its precipitous gorge for a little while, then on to the rim of Crater.

Soon after we had gained considerable altitude, and had gazed wonderingly at the wild jumble of hills and lesser mountains with their meandering valleys which constitute this lovely county of ours, the great snow peaks appeared before us, thrusting their white masses high above the horizon.

Crater Lake, hidden for so long below the crazy ramparts which encircle it, burst suddenly into view as the plane, ascending with a roar, passed over the lookout peak on the western rim and satiated like a great bird suspended midway between the blue of the heavens above and the miraculous indigo of the lake waters below.

When finally the plane turned back for home and started on the downhill grade, as someone put it, a feeling of regret passed through us all, that we couldn't remain forever, coasting suspended above the beautiful waters of this wonderful lake. From our great height, above Crater, most of our little world lay exposed. Far to the west were the hills and valleys of the Umpqua; southerly yet, the Rogue; to the immediate south beautiful Wood River valley and Klamath lake, with the busy smokestacks of the Klamath Falls beyond; to the east a sagebrush valley and mountain range of eastern Oregon and to the north, lovely and friendly Diamond lake, lying invitingly in the near distance, guarded jealously by its two sentinel peaks; to the north, and the south, the majestic line of snow peaks—a never to be forgotten sight.

WALLACE'S ORDER BANS LITTLE PEARS

SACRAMENTO, June 29.—(AP)—R. W. Gray, the manager of the California tree fruit marketing agreement, today announced Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace issued an order effective yesterday confining the shipments of Bartlett pears to size 180 and larger.

The order will prevent the shipping to eastern markets of pears of smaller size and will have a tendency to cause growers to select ripe and mature fruit.

CLING PEACH PACK SUPPLY ESTIMATED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—(AP)—W. J. Edinger, secretary of the California Canning Peach Growers, estimated today there would be 219,501 tons of No. 1 cling peaches available for canning this year.

This estimate compares with a total pack last year of 244,000 tons, no distinction being made between No. 1 quality and culls and No. 2.

Should all of this No. 1 fruit be canned, it was expected the pack would run near 10,000,000 cases. The 244,000 tons packed last year
