DILL STATES WIFE
"SNIPED" AT F. D. R.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 29.—(AP)—Caustic remarks and verbal "sniping" against President Roosevelt caused the first real split between him and his wife, former Sen. C. C. Dill testified in his divorce trial against her today.

It was an outburst at the Chicago democratic convention in 1932 when Franklin D. Roosevelt was nominated, that caused the first rift. After that, he testified, she never lost an opportunity to criticize the president and his policies.

It also was her attitude, he said, which caused him to decline to seek reelection to the senate in 1934.

"I couldn't face the people of this state for reelection with them thinking that Mrs. Dill was a progressive," he declared. "She had crazy ideas about politics."

When they first were married, he added, he got the impression she was an admirer of Franklin D. Roosevelt. "She didn't like the Theodore Roosevelt family—their estate and the estate of Mrs. Dill's family were adjoining," he asserted.

"She thought Franklin D. Roosevelt was all right until some time before the convention when she invited him to make a speech over a national radio look-up she was arranging for the Peace League."

"I advised her—or suggested—she not embarrass him by asking him to make the speech, but she did. He declined with some polite excuse and after that she had no use for him."

The former senator said senators and newspapermen in Washington continually asked while he was in congress:

"What is the matter with your wife? She is criticizing the president and making unnecessary remarks about him."

TOWNSEND SILENT
ON PARTY'S COURSE

CLEVELAND, June 29.—(AP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend, founder of the old age pension movement, declined today to express an opinion on the new union party or affiliation with other groups.

"All of that will be up to the delegates," he said, referring to the national Townsend club convention here, July 15 to 19. "The

union party is a new party, and I am not going to say anything about it."

Dr. Townsend, 67, is a prominent Cleveland physician and a leading figure in the Townsend club movement.

He is the author of "The New Deal," a book published last year, in which he outlined his plan for a national old age pension system.

Dr. Townsend is a member of the Townsend club, a national organization of old age pension advocates.

He is also a member of the National Association of Manufacturers, a group which opposes the old age pension plan.

Dr. Townsend is a well-known figure in Cleveland and is a member of the city's board of health.

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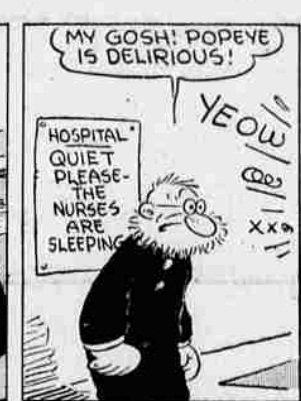
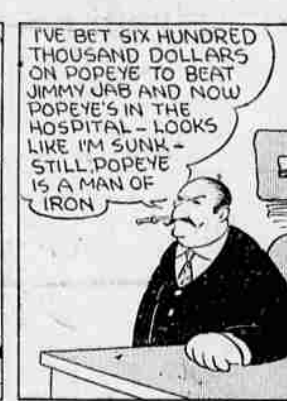
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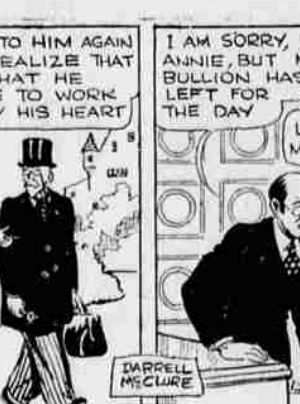
